Announcement was made Tuesday of the sale of Williams Funeral Homes of Robert Lee and Bronte to George Newby, formerly of Ballinger, who has recently moved to Robert Lee with his wife and is building a new home there.

Williams, his wife, Ruth; their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Sherman Williams; and another son, Gary, have made Williams Funeral Home a family affair during the almost five years they have operated the firm. They have all worked at it to provide funeral direction and ambulance service for both Bronte and Robert Lee.

Newby is an experienced funeral director, having been engaged in the business in Ballinger for many years and having served other funeral home owners in Eden, Winters, Bronte and Robert Lee. He is well known to many residents of the county and area.

He and his wife are building a new home in Robert Lee, north of the school. They have two daughters, both married: Mrs. A. J. Bryan of Eldorado, whose husband is a teacher, and Mrs. James T. Cooke, whose husband is a doctor in Ballinger.

This Atomic World Coming to R-Lee

Atomic energy and its uses will be demonstrated Oct. 18 at Robert Lee High School.

"This Atomic World," a demonstration lecture designed by the Atomic Energy Commission, will acquaint Robert Lee students with basic principles of nuclear energy, its sources and role in industry, agriculture and medicine.

Donald V. Jensen conducts the 40-minute program sponsored by Texas A&M University and Oak Ridge Associated Universities.

Using student terms, Jensen will describe structure of atoms, radiation, reactors and fusion. Special equipment will show radiation sources, how nuclear energy is harnessed for electrical power, diagnosis and treatment of diseases and life process studies using radioisotopes.

A blackboard talk to Robert Lee High science classes will go into atomic structure, radioactivity, radiation biology and nuclear science careers in more detail.

Jensen earned a masters degree at A&M after undergraduate study at Youngstown (Ohio) University and trained in the Oak Ridge, Tenn., Institute of Nuclear Studies.

Reporter News chose Wylie and Robert Lee to finish neck and neck for second place in the district.

Absentee Voting Starts

Absentee voting for the general election started this week in the office of Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, Coke County clerk. Any qualified voter who will not be able to go to the polls on Nov. 5 may vote absentee.

The voter may go to the office of Mrs. Waldrop in person and cast his ballot or he may request a ballot and necessary forms will be sent through the mail.

The big ballot which will be used contains names of candidates for president and vice president for three parties: Hubert H. Humphrey and Edmund S. Muskie, Democratic; Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew, Republican; George C. Wallace and S. Marvin Griffin, American Party. Griffin's name had already been certified as Wallace's running mate in Texas before his announcement of the selection of Gen. Curtis LeMay and LeMay's name will not appear on Texas ballots.

Both Democratic and Republican candidates' names appear on the ballot for the following offices: governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, state treasurer, commissioner of general land office, commissioner of agriculture, railroad commissioner and state representative, 66th district. All other offices have candidates only from the Democratic Party.

Voters who want to vote a straight party ticket may mark a square at the top of the column of candidates, while those who want to split their vote must mark each square alongside the name of the candidates of their choice.

In addition to candidates for various offices, Texas voters will cast their ballots to decide the fate of 14 proposed constitutional amendments.

County Agents News Column

Most of you read daily some article about the screwworm situation in Texas. We cannot emphasize too much nor too often the threat of still greater screw-worm numbers in the State. Luckily, freezing weather is not too far away, and, too, to date no large build up has occurred in this area of the State.

Coke County has spawned seven cases to date with the last case reported coming about two weeks ago.

We still need to be watchful for possible cases. The time left until the weather lends a helping hand could prove to be a long period.

Some operators may be basal spraying mesquite with a knapsack and hand spraying rig. This is a good practice and one we hope many operators will be able to use for spot treatment to control mesquite.

But, we do want to mention one point. Best results are usually obtained when basal spraying with 2, 4, 5-T when the application is made in the summer or winter. There is a period during the time the tree sap is going down that basal spraying has not given the results anticipated. This likewise can happen during the early spring when the sap is rising.

This period of physiological change in the tree is difficult to pinpoint exactly. But, during the late fall this transition of tree fluid can make a difference in the results received from basal treatment of mesquite with 2,4,5-T.

4-H CLUB OFFICERS

The Coke County 4-H Club Council held their first meeting of the year recently, electing officers for the year and making tentative plans for 4-H programs.

Officers selected were Joy Cervenka, chairman; Marshall Millican, vice-chairman; Rebecca Walker, secretary. The group selected the following delegates to represent Coke County on the District 4-H Council; Rebecca Walker, girls delegate; Sheri Pitcock, alternate; Marshall Millican, boy delegate; Lane Beaty, alternate.

The four delegates and alternate delegates, along with Joy Cervenka, secretary of the District 4-H Council, represented Coke County in the District's first council meeting of the year held in Ballinger Saturday. The group assists with various 4-H events held on a district basis and provides leadership for the Counties participating.

A young man with just a few minutes' instruction quickly pulled the wool from a sheep in a recent demonstration at USDA's Beltsville, Maryland, research center. The sheep had been dosed with an experimental chemical previously used mainly in cancer therapy. This innovation was made possible by biologist Dr. Ethel H. Doinick and colleagues in USDA's Agricultural Research Service.

Larvae of the most important pest of peaches, the peach tree borer, feed on the inner bark of the trunk of the peach tree. Their

presence may be detected by the masses of gum mixed with brownish grass or sawdust which exude from the trunk of the tree. The larvae usually feed in an area 2 to 3 inches below the surface of the soil to 10 inches above.

When the peach tree borer is not controlled, it will kill peach trees within a few seasons. Control of this insect can be obtained from October 20 to November 15 when soil is dry and soil temperature is above 55 degrees. Paradichlorobenzene crystals (P. DB) are placed on the surface around the trunk of the tree. For 2 and 3 year old trees, use 1/2 ounce of crystals; for 4 to 5 year old trees, 3/4 ounce; for mature trees, 1 ounce.

The procedure for applying the PDB crystals is fairly simple but to obtain effective control should be followed closely. First, all leaf material and grass should be cleaned out of an area about one foot from the tree trunk. The

PDB crystals are then placed in a narrow circular band about two inches from the trunk of the tree. The band is then covered with soil free of leaf or grass trash and the soil is mounded around the trunk so as to form a cone shaped pile about six inches high around the base of the tree. Care should be taken to see that none of the PDB crystals come in contact with the tree, since crystals in contact with the tree will cause injury. Then compact the soil in the mound. The mound of soil should be removed in the early spring.

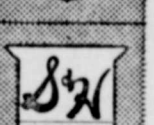

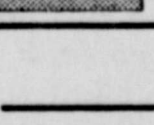

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Steers Top Bronte, 30-15

The drought is over! After three years of defeat by the Bronte Longhorns, the Steers became the new county champs. Again the bumble bee defense stung as the running game of the Longhorns was controlled. Putting 37 passes in the air, the Longhorns made quite a few yards in completions, but for only two of them, the passing game also was controlled. The stars in the contest were many as the whole Steer lineup was hungry for steak after being eaten for three years themselves.

The offensive star, which was very evident, was Roy Blair, who ate up the yardage and fought for it much of the time. The offensive line of Pitcock, Sockwell,

Burns, Fields, Green, Cole, Millican, Thomason and Beal opened holes for Blair, Key and Preslar to total of 262 yards rushing.

The defense, aided by Jack Thomason, Randy Smith, Jim Ballard and Mike Denman stopped the Horns with only 40 yards rushing. Mike Mumford did an outstanding job at quarterback with his ball handling and faking.

First Quarter

The Steers received the opening kickoff and Joe Key made a good return to the Steer 38 yard line. With Key and Burns rotating their carries and Preslar at the blocking back, they went for a 1st at the Bronte 49, then another at the 39. A burst through the middle carried for another 1st at the 23, another at the 7 and the Steers had goal to go. They pounded to the 2 yard line where Mumford kept and rolled in for the score. The extras failed and the Steers led 6 to 0.

Andy Cole kicked off to the 35 where the Longhorns took it and went to their 40. The Longhorns drew a 5 yard penalty on first play and on the next play, a little razzle dazzle and a 65 yard pass put the Longhorns on the scoreboard. The kick for extras was good and the Bronte boys led, 7-6.

Blair took the kickoff and returned to the 37, but a penalty hurt the Steers and they were forced to kick. Bronte mishandled the punt and Jack Preslar recovered for the Steers at the Bronte 43. The Steers made a 1st at the 31, then Bronte held and Mumford kicked into the end zone. Bronte got the ball at the 20, but lost back to the 11 and

had to kick. Mumford took the punt and returned to Bronte's 48 yard line. One play and the quarter ended at the Bronte 43.

Second Quarter

The Steers made a first at the Bronte 33, but the drive was stopped when Bronte intercepted at the Longhorn 44. The Steers were tough again as they held at the 48. The Steers got the ball at their own 27 after a short kick and then made a 1st at their 40. After moving the ball to the 46, Blair burst the middle again, shook off a few tacklers and 54 yards later he was in the end zone for another TD. A Mumford to Pitcock pass was good for two and the Steers lead, 14-7.

Cole kicked to the Bronte 20, and with a return to their 40, the Longhorns started their march. Four 1st downs and a pass interference later they were at the Steer 9 yard line. Bronte quarterback McCutchen hit Randy Barbee with a quick flat pass and the Longhorns had scored. A pass to Nicky Arrott was good and the Longhorns had scored their last points but were in the lead, 15-14. Bronte kicked off to the Steers but they misplay it and Bronte took over on the recovery at the Steer 29 yard line. With little time remaining, the Longhorns can't advance and the half ended.

Third Quarter

Bronte received the 2nd half kickoff and have no chance for a return, and took over at their 31 yard line. The Steers had new life now and moved Bronte back to their 27. On the attempted punt, Lynn Beal broke through and blocked the kick. Jim Ballard fell on it at the 17 yard line.

The Steers ran two plays and then Andy Cole got the call and straight and true he put a field goal through the uprights for 3 points and the Steers lead again, 17-15.

Cole's kickoff went to the Bronte 11 with no chance for a

return. Bronte made a 1st at the 35 on a fine pass play, but that was all, as the Steers held again. Attempting to punt again, the Longhorn line didn't hold and once again Beal broke through and blocked another one at the 33 yard line.

The Steers punched for a 1st at the Bronte 23, another at the 9, and at the 6 yard line, Roy Blair fought his way into the end zone for another 6 points. Cole kicked the extras and it was 24-15 for the Steers.

Then luck for the Steers and disaster for the Horns as the ball took a crooked bounce, hit a Bronte player, and Bill Burns recovered at the Bronte 15.

The Steers drove for a 1st at the 5 and quickly, Mumford faked and swept the end for a TD. The try for extras on a pass failed and the Steers ended their scoring with the score 30-15.

Bronte held and Mumford punted one into the end zone. At the 20, the Longhorns moved, and made a 1st at the 30, another at the 45 and two more to the Steer 25. All mail to overseas should be wrapped strongly and a slip should be enclosed showing the contents, and the name and address of both the sender and the addressee.

Domestic parcel post to distant states should be mailed before Dec. 2, and parcel post to local and nearby addresses should be sent before Dec. 14.

Cards to distant states should be mailed before Dec. 11 and to local and nearby places by Dec. 16.

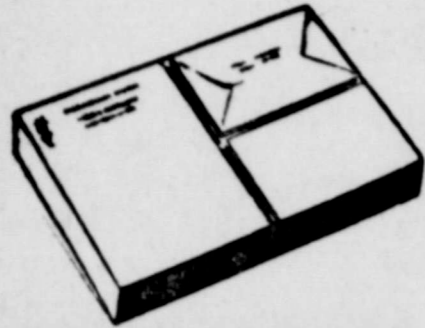
Lewis added that all return addresses should show the ZIP code of the sender, and of the addressee, also, if possible.

Baker Speaks To Coke Lions

George Baker, Fort Stockton candidate for the Texas Legislature's 13-county 66th district, was guest speaker Tuesday night at both the Bronte and Robert Lee Silver Lions clubs. They scheduled their meetings to permit him to drive from one town to the other between meetings.

His talks were on two major subjects — the importance of voting on proposed constitutional amendments, and aspects of the proposed school reorganization plan as they apply to the West Texas area.

Baker had a busy week's schedule with six speaking engagements in four days. He spoke Monday night to the Imperial Lions Club. Wednesday he was scheduled for a reception at 10 a.m. honoring Ray Howard, Midland Democratic candidate for another House seat, and Gus Mutscher.

Baker was to address the Monahans Rotary Club at noon Wednesday and Monahans Kiwanis Club Thursday at noon, with a talk Thursday night in Imperial to the Permian Basin Tax Officials Association.

"The Governor's School Study Commission devoted a great deal of time and effort to the school study, and many of its provisions are needed to improve the quality of education in our state" Baker said. "There are several areas, however, in which our part of the state, with low population density and vast distances, would suffer real hardship unless reasonable exceptions are provided in the school program."

He emphasized the need for careful study of the program, and regard for the position of the smaller towns in drafting any new school legislation.

Increased emphasis on vocational education is especially needed to help equip more people for the skilled jobs created by increasing industry in Texas and the growing use of mechanized equipment in all areas — agriculture, business, transportation and services, Baker pointed out.

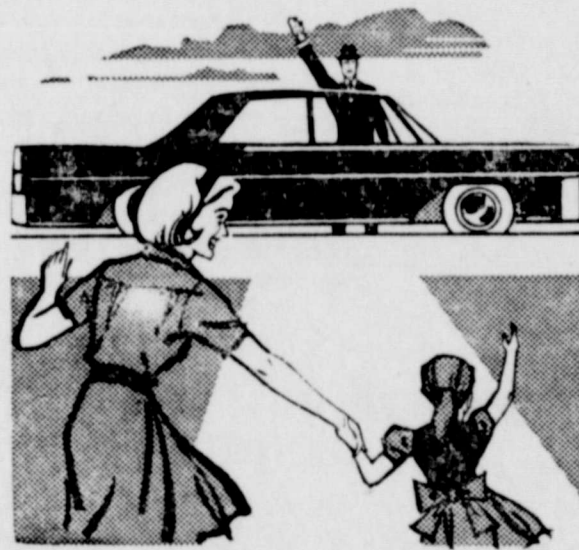

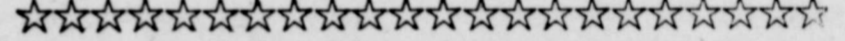

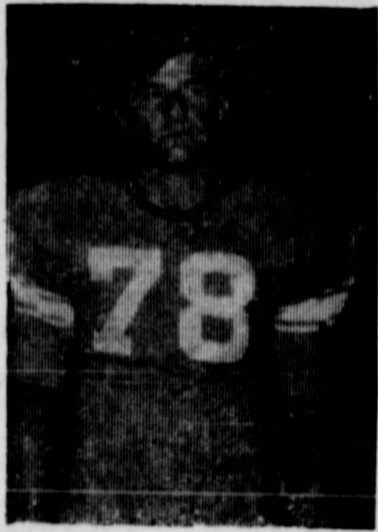

Parcel Post Rates To Be Increased

Parcel Post and catalog rates go up effective October 19. The rate increase will average 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents per parcel. The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel post delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 cents to 60 cents. Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1.10 under the present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 per cent of all parcel post.

There will be a 15 cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4.00, and 20 cents on parcels now charged over \$4.00. Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the parcel and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four per cent of operating costs, as required by law. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth class mail, on a break-even basis.

Band Booster Club Has 141 Members

The membership committee reported 141 members in the Band Booster Club when they met Oct. 8 in the school music room.

Winners of the contest on selling the most calendars and listings were announced. First prize of \$5.00 went to David Wilks, who turned in \$35.00. Second place winner of \$3.00 was Jan Green who turned in \$17.00 and third prize of \$2.00 went to Mike Davis with \$16.25.

Sixteen members were present for the meeting. It was reported that the band will go to Odessa Nov. 23 for a contest.

Lewis' query about the problems which will confront every businessman, city officials, BCD officials and others when he said he thought it was time to make some concrete plans to give the inquirers some honest answers and some answers that will promote growth in this area.

The mayor noted that more letters, more phone calls and more personal visits will be received all the time, and anyone in the city or area who is asked should be able to present some solid information about opportunities.

J. E. Quisenberry spoke on the land owners organization which was formed a short time ago, with Marvin Simpson Jr. as secretary and Bob Gulley as president. The organization is working with the Colorado River Municipal Water District on lake frontage which will be available to the public, restrictions, zoning, etc.

Quisenberry also noted that the City of Brownwood has been confronted with many of the same problems which now face Robert Lee. Officials of that city have been contacted for ideas that could be put to use here.

It was also pointed out that one of the big obstacles in the way of development such as the one around Robert Lee Reservoir is the sub-division law which has to be closely observed by everyone connected with development of the area.

It was announced that from six to a dozen developers had been in Coke County recently, which brought home the idea that the problem is acute and needs some work and discussion as soon as possible. President Lewis asked that every member present give the matter some thought and report any ideas at next week's meeting.

County Judge W. W. Thetford said that he and Quisenberry had made a list of land owners who have property on or near the lake. He offered this list to the BCD, to mail along with the previously printed BCD fact sheets about the Robert Lee area and brochures from a major developer in the lake area, to take care of inquiries until new brochures can be prepared by the BCD. The BCD plans to print a new brochure early in 1969 after the dam is completed.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough reported on the manner in which the County Historical Survey Committee has handled inquiries and told of a recent meeting she attended at Fredericksburg.
