RL School Audit In This Paper

A copy of the statement of cash receipts and disbursements for Robert Lee Independent School District is being published in this week's Observer. School officials invite the attention of tax payers and other interested citizens to the statement which can give them a good idea as to the school's financial condition.

The statement summarizes the annual audit of the school which was made last year by Harold Von Simpson, certified public accountant of Austin. The audit covers the period from Sept. 1, 1967, to Aug. 31, 1968.

School money is divided into six funds: local maintenance, rental, building, interest and sinking, and special funds.

Last year's audit shows a large amount of cash on hand at the end of the fiscal year. Reason for the big figure is that \$738,878.92, which is designated for use in construction of new buildings, is included.

The statement shows that total cash receipts, including bond money, amounted to \$1,143,597.76, while expenditures were \$398,639.88, leaving a balance in all funds of \$757,418.65.

Roscoe has a 1.2 district record, same as the Steers. The Plowboys, however, are one notch above the Steers in season records with a 6-2, compared to Robert Lee's 5-3. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Hospital Named For Federal Grant

A story in the Tuesday morning San Angelo Standard Times announced that West Coke County Hospital had been approved for two grants by the federal Hill-Burton health facilities construction program. The first is for \$16,000 for modernization and the second is \$55,000 for a 22 bed long care unit or nursing home.

The State Board of Health announced the grants, along with 40 others in Texas, nine of which were to six West Texas hospitals. The Hill-Burton money is channeled through states for disbursement for up to 50 per cent of costs for modernizing and building health facilities.

A report in Robert Lee Tuesday

Democrats made a clean sweep from the top to the bottom of the ballot in Coke County, in the general election held Tuesday. A total of 1113 ballots were counted in the five voting boxes and in the absentee box.

Coke County voters approved of only three of the 14 constitutional amendments which were on the ballot. They okayed one, nine and 14 and turned thumbs down on the other 11.

Hubert H. Humphrey and Edmund S. Muskie received 563 votes in their race for president and vice president, while Republicans Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew received 387 and American Party candidates George C. Wallace and Curtis LeMay received 208.

Democrat Preston Smith won handily in his race for governor with 849 votes, compared to Paul Eggers' 278.

Ben Barnes received the greatest majority of any opposed candidate in Coke County. In his race for lieutenant governor, he received 952 votes to 162 for Doug De. Cluitt.

Crawford Martin, seeking reelection as attorney general had 898 votes to 179 for Sproesser Wynn.

Humphrey, Other Demos Win Texas

Some Texas votes were still uncounted Wednesday afternoon, but apparently the state went for Hubert H. Humphrey and Edmund S. Muskie in their bid for president and vice president.

However, the country as a whole didn't vote the way Texans did, as Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew Wednesday morning passed the magic number of 270 in the number of electoral votes won. Humphrey conceded defeat and Nixon made a short speech acknowledging the victory before noon Wednesday.

Democratic candidates won all their races for statewide jobs in Tuesday's election.

Preston Smith, governor; Ben Barnes, lieutenant governor; Crawford Martin, attorney general; Robert S. Calvert, comptroller of public accounts; Jesse James, state treasurer; Jerry Sadler, commissioner of the general land office; John C. White, commissioner of agriculture and Jim C. Langdon, railroad commissioner, all had Republican opposition, but easily won their races.

Congressman Omar Burleson, congressman from this 17th Congressional District, was unopposed and racked up a big vote for another two years in the house of representatives.

**Make It with Wool
Contest Now Open**

SAN ANGELO — The Home Economics Department of Angelo State College again will sponsor the District 4 "Make-It-Yourself-With-Wool" competition which is conducted annually on a state and national basis by the Women's Auxiliary to the National Wool Growers Association and other organizations.

The district contests will be held at the college Dec. 7. Dr. Allena K. Pace, head of the home economics department, has announced. Deadline for entering is Nov. 23.

Entries will be various garments made by girls and women who wish to compete. Competition will be held in four divisions—sub-deb (10-13 years of age), juniors (14-16), seniors (17-21) and adults (over 21), Mrs. Pace said.

Fabric used in the costumes must be of American wool although it may contain up to 5 per cent of some other fiber. Mrs. Pace explained. Also, trimming, linings and interfacings may be of some other fiber.

Each contestant must model her own garment before judges at a district fashion show to be held as a climax to the competition. The garments first will be judged on their makers and then will be examined carefully for inside construction and durability.

Judging in all four divisions will be based on coordination of design and fabric with the individual, beauty of design, fashion, workmanship and appearance.

Prizes will include a two-week trip to Europe, college scholarships and other gifts, Dr. Pace said. Entry blanks may be secured from fabric departments of various stores, home demonstration agents, and schools which have home economics departments.

District 4, for which the Angelo State competition will be held, includes Upton, Brown, Sterling, Coke, Coleman, Runnels, Comanche, Glasscock, Concho, Tom Green, Nolan, Irion and Reagan counties.

State competition will be held Dec. 14 at Texas Tech and the national finals will be Jan. 16, 1969, in San Francisco.

Third Quarter

Lane Beaty kicked off to the Hornets and they couldn't return the ball and had it on their 35. The Steers held at the 38, forcing the Hornets to punt to the Steer 42. The Steers made a 1st at the Hornet 45 and then a miscue and the Steers fumbled at the 45. The Hornets made a 1st at the Steer 44, then a hard tackle shook the ball loose and James Fields recovered for the Steers at their 35. The Steers made another 1st at their 47 and on a pass attempt the ball was intercepted at the Aspermont 45 and returned to the Steer 18. Aspermont was penalized to the 22 and the Steers held at their 19 yard line. The Steers drove for a 1st at the 40 and then they were forced to punt. Aspermont had the ball at their 32 as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

The Steers held the Hornets and they punted to the Steer 35. Robert Lee couldn't go and Mumford punted to the Aspermont 42 yard line. The Hornets went for 1st downs at the Steer 44 and then the 34, and then the 24. But another hard tackle shook the ball loose and Fields recovered again at his own 24.

The Steers drove for a 1st at the 40 and then the Hornets held. Mumford kicked to the Hornet 31 with no return. Aspermont got off a beautiful 40 yard pass to the right end which carried

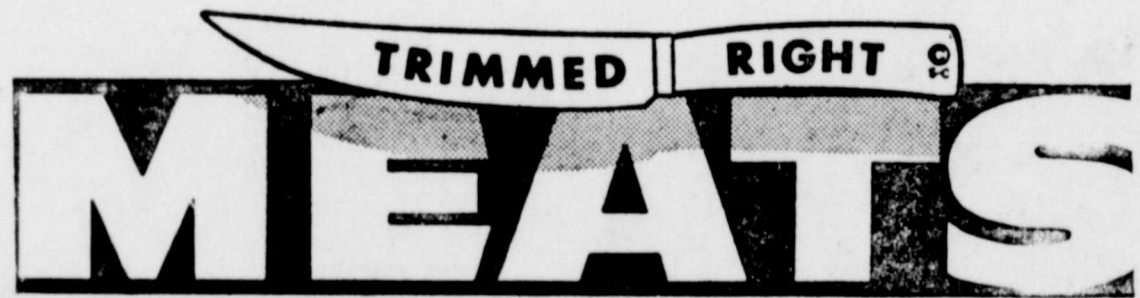
