How does it feel to be 100 years old? Most of us in all probability will never know but after Dec. 12, 1968, just ask Mrs. A. S. (Mary) Chapman and she can tell

Believed to be Coke County's oldest citizen she will observe her 100th birthday on this date after a long career as housewife, pioneer, mother and ranchwoman.

Her surviving five children, Al. ice, Nanny, Bill, Susie and Cooper will gather at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Susie Shelton, who lives in Burleson, on Sunday, Dec. 8, to celebrate this memorable occasion along with as many in-laws, grand children, great grandchildren, and great. great grandchildren as can be present. Although saddened by the recent death of a son, Sam, she looks forward to the intervening days with the same faith and courage she exhibited in pioneering in West Coke County before "the turn of the century."

School Schedule Changes Told

A couple of changes were an. nounced in the schedule of Robert Lee Schools during the next month by Supt. Jimmy Bickley.

The Christmas vacation period has been extended one day which will give students and teachers 17 days off during the holidays. Originally, the schedule called for classes to resume Jan. 6, but that has been changed to Jan. 7.

Another change is in the date of Coke County Livestock Show which has been changed from Jan. 13 to Jan. 6. Since the school will still be out for Christmas vacation on that day, no holiday will be set for the stock show.

Robert Lee students will enjoy the longest Christmas vacation they have had in many years, the superintendent said, and he asked that parents note the changes and make their plans to coincide with







On Membership in COKE COUNTY LIVESTOCK PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION

- The membership dues of The Coke County Livestock Protective Association are as follows: 2c a head each on sheep, goats and swine; 10c a head each on cattle and horses, or \$3.00, whichever is the greatest figure.
- Members of The Coke County Livestock Protective Association shall not be reassessed for additional dues until after said association has paid a reward.
- 3. Membership in The Coke County Livestock Protective Association shall be limited to Coke County, Texas, and for stockmen with a livestock operation on and/or adjoining the county line of said county.
- 4. The word livestock is defined by The Coke County Livestock Protective Association as sheep, goats, swine, cattle and horses.
- 5. All members of The Coke County Livestock Protective Association are encouraged to have their brand or brands and other livestock identification placed on records in the Clerk's Office in Coke County, Texas.
- All thefts of livestock from a member of said association should be reported immediately to the Sheriff's Office in Coke County.
- 7. The Coke County Livestock Protective Association shall pay a reward to any person or persons providing information and/ or other assistance that prove useful in the arrest and conviction of a person or persons unlawfully taking livestock from a member of said association, and shall pay a reward only on cases involving members of said association.
