There will not be enough phy sicians, dentists, engineers and physical seientists, according to a Department iof Labor survey. A surphis of school teachers, mathmaticians and life scientists is expected.
About 6.2 million college gradates will be needed by 1975. rofessional and technical fields will call for 4.3 mulion; manaerial occupations .9 million; sales and clerical .7 million and 3 million will be needed in othfields.
Nation's colleges and universiues are expected to confer about 6.5 million bachelor and first proessional degrees over the nineyear period. About 1.7 million master's degrees and doctorates are expected to be conferred rom June 1966 to June 1974, more than 100 per cent more than in the previous nine-year eriod.
Expected surplus of teachers is currently the largest occupation for women graduates. The survey suggests that unless a larger proportion of women enter other high demand professions, the outlook for employmont for college-educated women may be less favorable than in recent years.

"We believe the forced consolidation of small school dissolidation of sman school disof the Governor's Committee on Public School Education, will go
a long way toward destroying rural life as it is now enjoyed in Texas," Schreiner declared in a news conference at noon Wednesday.

Schreiner pointed out that the Governor's Committee recom-
mends the forced consolidation of Texas' 1,218 school districts into a total of 353.
'"This would virtually wipe out 865 community centers, since mary symbols of community mary symbols of community
identification," Schreiner said. He refuted the claim that bigHe refuted the claim that big ger school districts would auto
matically provide better educa tion for students. "More bigness is not an absolute guarantee of is not an absolute guarantee of
excellence," he said. "The Little Red School House Committee has been formed to awaken rural landowners an residents of small communities to solidation and to acquaint con lators in Austin with the feeling of the rural people of Texas, Schreiner said.
