



#### Home Economic Facts

Evaporated milk is fortified with vitamin C. Nonfat dry milk powder that is sold abroad has been fortified with vitamins A and D. Just recently nonfat dry milk powder sold within the United States has been fortified with Vitamin A and D in the amounts of 5,000 International Units and 500 International Units respectively. This indeed provides a more excellent product.

The number one nutritional problem in the United States is obesity. The major cause is a divergence between the intake of food and the outgo of energy However, research has found that in the obese person, the satiety mechanism (signal you are full) is not as responsive as in the lean, and not as responsive in the sedentary as in the active person. The satiety mechanism is located in the hypohtalamus of the brain.

In regard to desire for food, studies have shown that obese persons are more dependent on external signals (smell, taste) than internal signs (stomach contractions), whereas lean persons respond more to internal signals.

Doy ou know what happens when you gain or lose weight? The fat cells of the body enlarge or diminish when weight is gained or lost, respectively. The absolute number of fat cells does not change.
