Safety

There are safety practices all family members should follow when using electrical appliances. Some of these are:

-Avoid overloading circuits.

-Never knot appliance cord or bend it sharply.

-Never wrap cord around a warm appliance because the insulation may become scorched and eventually crack.

-Check type of current recommended for operating equipment before connecting it the first time to avoid overheating and damaging appliance. (See manufacturer's instructions.)

-Dry hands thoroughly before connecting or disconnecting electrical equipment.

-When washing immersible appliances disconnect first.

-Use portable appliances in uncrowded areas on firm, level

-Never tack cords to the wall use insulated staples.

-Plug cord in appliance first, then in wall outlet - to prevent sparks and arcing of terminal pens, and to lengthen the life of the appliance.

-Always disconnect cord from wall outlet before removing from appliance, otherwise a "hot" plug will be exposed.

-Avoid using small appliances in area where they could accidentally fall into a sink while connected.

-Disconnect small appliances when not in use to avoid danger of shock or of accidentally touching the "on" switch.

-Allow hot appliances to cool before storing.

-Have defective appliances repaired before next use.

-Follow manufacturer's directions for lubricating motor driven appliances (even those not in daily use).





Prime emergency is in the 'welfare' situation. Texas' program of minimal assistance to families with dependent children is growing thinner and thinner because of the constitutional spending limit of \$60 million.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) now gets \$6.15 million of the \$60 million. But grants to individual families are going down because of increases in the number of families applying.

These increases are due to court decisions broadening the program: a Medicaid requirement that aplicants for that program be on welfare; and poverty workers informing poor people of their right to AFDC.

In September, the Department of Public Welfare had to cut maximum grants for a family with four or more dependent children from \$135 a month to \$123. Another cut scheduled for May will reduce benefits paid 8,234 families and will eliminate from the program another 2,470.

In 1967, the Legislature proposed raising the ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million, but the voters defeated the proposition.

LEGISLATIVE PROGRESS Legislative pace slowed last week as lawmakers devoted Monday to eulogizing the late President Eisenhower, and took off at mid-week for an Easter holiday.

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
