Election 80 Years Ago

An election was held April 23, 1889, to create Coke County out of Tom Green County. Prior to the organization of Tom Green County in 1874, Coke County was part of the tremendous Department of Bexar which comprised approximately half of the state. The Bexar territory was reduced to its present size as Bexar County, with San Antonio as its seat of government, as other areas of West Texas formed into sovereign counties, just as Coke County did.

Hayrick was the county seat of the newly-created Coke County. It was situated near the mountain which presently bears the same name. In 1891, an election was held to move the county seat, and Robert Lee won by a 48-vote margin. Robert Lee has continued as the county seat since that time.

Removal of the county seat from Hayrick placed county offices in small rented buildings until a courthouse was built later in 1891. This building served the citizens until 1956 when voters approved bonds to build the present courthouse.

Anniversary Edition

The Robert Lee Observer is planning an 80th Anniversary Edition to be published some time in the summer or fall of this year. It will depict much of the county's history, as well as to emphasize the promising future of this area.

Blair Named Steer Coach

Larry Blair, who has served as assistant football coach for the Robert Lee Steers this year, was promoted to head football coach this week. Kenneth Rasco was named by the board to continue as head basketball coach and was given additional duties as head track coach. The action was taken at a meeting of the school board Monday night.

Blair will succeed Kenneth Mitchell as head football mentor. Mitchell has resigned his position to take the job as superintendent of schools at Rochelle.

Prin. Garland Davis told the Observer that the school administration has been well pleased with the work Blair has done with the football team while serving as Mitchell's assistant. "We all feel that he will make us a fine coach," Davis said. Blair will begin work with his prospective charges in the near future, as allowed by Interscholastic League rules.

Blair is a graduate of Angelo State College and Rasco graduated from Howard Payne.

Davis said that an assistant coach for Blair, as well as a girls assistant coach to take the place of Clifford Wilson, will be named at a future date. Wilson recently took over new duties as elementary school principal, following the resignation of Bob Jameson.

Ivey to Show New Maverick Today

Ivey Motor Co. will have the county's newest car on display Thursday when they unveil the 1970 Maverick. Tagged as "the first American challenge to the imported economy car," the Maverick will sell for a suggested retail price of \$1,995.

Cumbie Ivey Jr., partner and manager of the local Ford agency, said that everyone in this area has a cordial invitation to attend the open house and showing of the Maverick. Coffee and donuts will be served all day.

John Naughton, Ford Motor Co. vice president, said the new car is designed to expand Ford's share of the American small car market which is being lost to foreign cars.

In size, Maverick takes a measurement between the subcompact imports and the domestic compacts. With a 103-inch wheel-base and 179.4 overall length, the new car is 19 inches longer than its principal foreign competitor. It is nine inches wider than most imported small cars, and comfortably seats four persons.

Luxury features are optional and include such items as 120 hp engine, and automatic, semi-automatic transmissions, radio, air conditioner, and various dress-up options.

In commenting on the Maverick Ivey said, "We are happy to have this new car among the models manufactured by Ford, for we feel it will fill a definite need in today's market."

Outside Lights For Courthouse, Highway Okayed

Robert Lee soon will be a better lighted city, according to announcements made at Tuesday's meeting of the BCD.

Commissioner Fern Havins told the group that the commissioners court has decided on the outside lighting around the courthouse. Havins reported on the outside lighting demonstration conducted last Thursday night by West Texas Utilities Co. In addition to installing lights to reflect on the courthouse, lawn lights will be installed, also.

W. D. McAdams, local WTU manager, reported that lighting fixtures had been approved for the new part of Highway 158 which runs through town. McAdams said the new fixtures would be installed from the Y to the new river bridge.

Hugh Lewis Jr., chairman of a committee to work up a new brochure for advertising the city and area, stated his committee members have collected a large number of sample brochures from other cities and are studying them for good ideas to incorporate into Robert Lee's new advertising piece.

President Garland Davis said the hearing in Austin to discuss a proposed new interstate highway will be held sometime early in May. The president said he thought it very necessary for a large group from Robert Lee to attend the meeting.

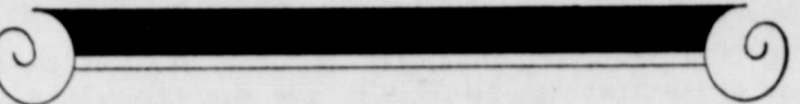

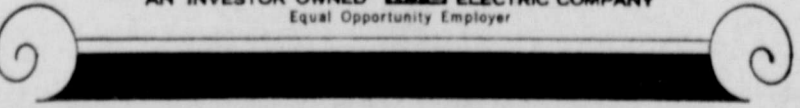

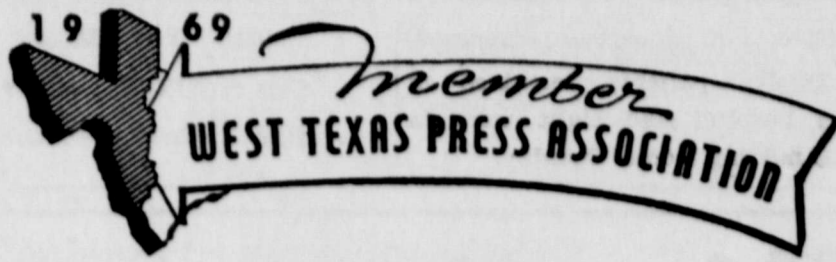

Williams Receives Proficiency Award

AUSTIN — An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Billy Sherman Williams, plant operations specialist for the Robert Lee water supply system. The citation reflects the regard in which Williams is held by state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

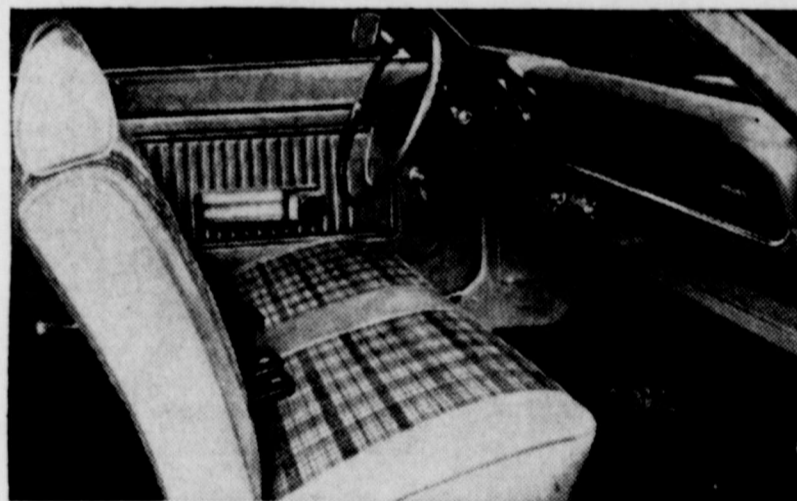
