NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

| BE: IT RESOLVED BY THE <br> LEGISLATURE OF THE <br> STATE OF TEXAS: <br> Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: <br> "Section 51-a.
