### Lake And Dam To Be Dedicated

It will be a big day in Robert Lee Saturday, June 14, when dedication ceremonies will be held for the Robert Lee Dam and E. V. Spence Reservoir. The program will be held immediately upstream from the north end of the dam. Congressman Omar Burleson will be the principal speaker on the program.

The public is invited to attend the program which will begin at 1:30 p.m.

#### Ticket Deadline June 11

A barbecue lunch will be served at noon, prior to the program, and tickets are on sale at the city hall in Robert Lee for \$1.55 each. Deadline for purchasing tickets to the barbecue is 5 p.m. next Wednesday, June 11.

ter District, builders of the new dam and reservoir, said in a telephone conversation this week that everybody is invited to attend the dedication program, and "we are especially anxious for citizens of Coke County to be there."

Ivie said that a large number of state and national officials, in addition to Congressman Burleson, have been invited and are expected to attend.

The dam, which was contracted to Clement Bros. of Hickory, N. C., for \$8,686,440, was begun in the fall of 1966 and was completed in approximately 2½ years. Much of the work was sub-contracted to Terry Construction Co. of Greenville, S. C.

The huge dam is over four miles long and rises to a height of 136 feet above the stream bed. It is 28 feet wide at the crown. Capacity for impounding water is 488,769 acre feet, which is 159.2 billion gallons of water. A total of 14,950 acres will be inundated when the water reaches spillway level. Having a shoreline of 137 miles, the lake will have a drainage area of 2,700 square miles.

CRMWD supplies water to the cities of Snyder, Big Spring, Odessa, Midland and Stanton, and recently has entered into an agreement with San Angelo to supplement its water supply. Water also is sold to industrial users in the area. The district also owns Lake J. B. Thomas in Scurry and Borden counties and has an elaborate pipeline system to deliver water to its customers. All of the \$53 million dollar investment in lakes, pipelines, pump stations and other necessary equipment has been financed by revenue bonds without the need of any taxation or assistance from state or federal funds.

### Tuesday Clouds Dump Moisture

Rains fell over the area Tuesday morning leaving an official measurement in Robert Lee of 1.56 inches. Some residents of the city reported receiving up to two inches, however.

To the south on the J. O. Rudd Ranch, 1.1 inches fell. One inch was recorded in the Divide community, while .8 inch was reported at Sanco and on the Finis Harmon place west of town.

Voters of Robert Lee Independent School will go to the polls Saturday and decide whether the school will be permitted to levy up to the maximum of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation for maintenance and operation of the school.

Balloting will be conducted at the school, with Horace L. Bloodworth serving as presiding judge. Mrs. Bobby Roberts and Mrs. Raymond Bloodworth will serve as clerks. Miss Mildred Wallace has served as absentee voting clerk.

The proposition to be voted on would allow the school district to use its maximum tax levy of \$1.50 per \$100 for use in operat-

ing the school, and allow an additional levy of up to 50 cents per \$100 for the purpose of retiring bonds.

Those who will be eligible to vote in the election include qualified resident voters who have property located within the school district and who have rendered it for taxation.

The election was called May 8 when a petition bearing the names of 25 persons was presented to the school board, requesting the matter be submitted to the people for a vote.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley said shortly after the board called the election that passage of the new tax is essential for continued quality education in the district. He said that more tax money is needed to take care of rising costs of education, bond retirement and decline in oil valuations in the district. The superintendent added that the only alternative to passage of the tax rate increase is an increase in property values.

School officials urged everyone to vote.

The present pastor, the Rev. Bobby Palmos, was assigned to First United Methodist Church in Eldorado. Palmos, his wife and children will also move Thursday. Palmos replaces the Rev. Dempsey Salter, also a former Robert Lee pastor, at Eldorado. Salter was assigned to Ganado.

The Palmos family came to Robert Lee in 1967. They were honored at a covered dish supper Wednesday night, given by members of the church as a going-away party.

Other appointments of interest to Robert Lee residents sent Bill McKinley to Krestview Church in Austin and Travis McNair returned to Big Lake.

Fred Brown was returned as pastor at Bronte.

New appointments in the Methodist Church take effect in June of each year.

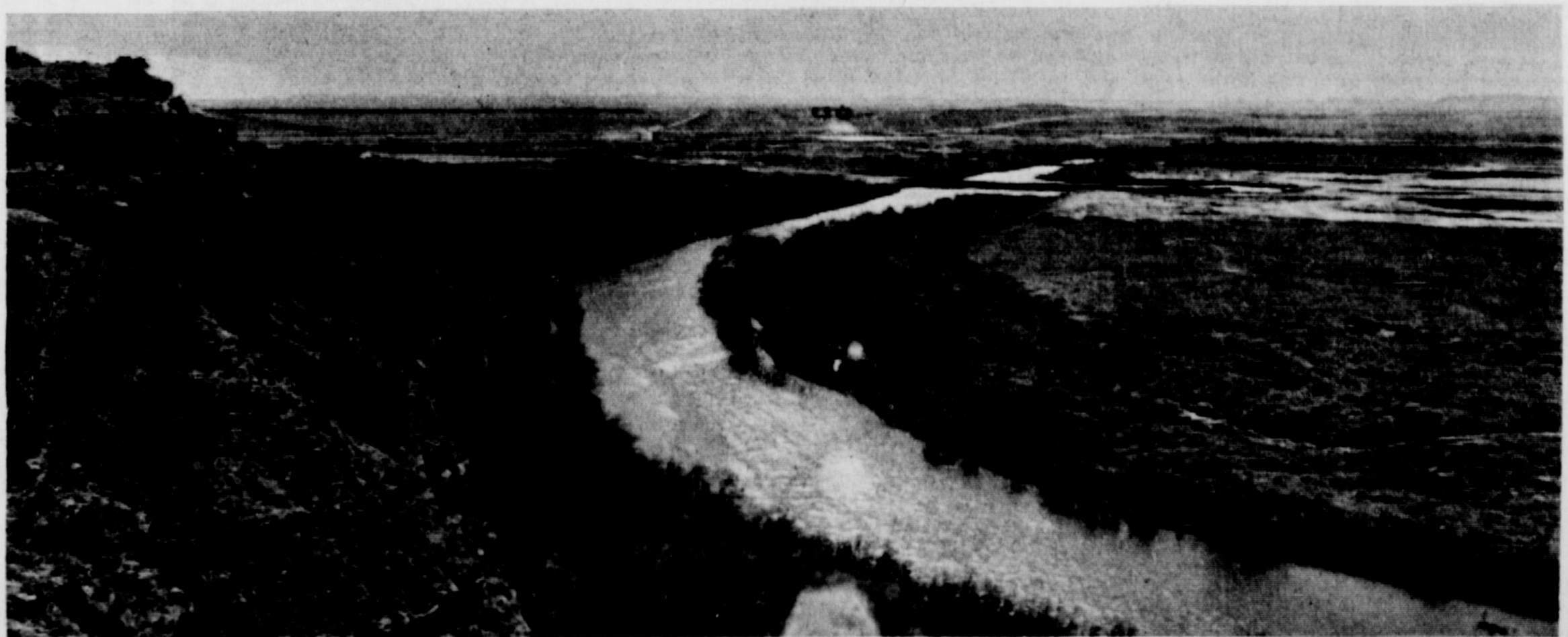

AUSTIN, TEX. — Texas lawmakers have written the record of the 61st regular session, but their toughest job — levying the taxes to pay for what they have ordered — remains to be done.

In adopting a \$2.8 billion one-year state budget (for 1970), they invited a special session to complete appropriations for 1971 and to decide on the inevitable major tax bill. Legislative leaders, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and House Speaker Gus Mutscher, claim the latter will be smaller if the finance showdown can be delayed until next year.

Gov. Preston Smith, who holds the key to the timing of the special session, has made it clear from the start that he feels the Legislature should face up to a biennial budget and the raising of needed revenue. He could veto the single year bill and call another session immediately — or accept it and schedule the remaining financial work whenever he pleases.

Many all-time legislative records have toppled at this session.

Certainly, the 61st session passed more legislation than any before it, and it was committed in advance to spending more money.

A multitude of laudable ends were attained. Giant strides were made in the field of education. Teachers got a \$61.9 million pay raise. Overhauls were ordered in the field of vocational and technical education. Three new medical schools, a dental school and two new nursing schools were authorized. Also, three new universities, plus an experimental upper level branch college in Laredo. Never have so many new higher educational facilities been launched in a single session.

A master plan got all the legislative support it could expect. Workmen's compensation laws were updated. Sweeping controls were approved over air and water pollution. A constitutional amendment to legalize the sale of liquor by the drink was submitted, along with many other proposed changes in the constitution. State employees got a 6.8 percent pay raise.

Texas' 61st Legislature was a busy, productive session. It was a liberal spending one with the bills yet to be paid.

"The citizenship of Texas will applaud our work at this session and give us their full support when we return to appropriate and finance the second year of the biennium," concluded Speaker Mutscher.

**LAW ENFORCEMENT PLAN ADVANCED** — Texas' new State Criminal Justice Council has recommended a comprehensive \$1.1 million law enforcement plan that covers a wide scope of activities. Governor Smith will analyze it before it goes to the U. S. Department of Justice for approval and funding under the Federal Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968. Funds for a two-year operation must be committed by June 30.

Texas received \$234,000 for riot control and \$830,350 in planning money six months ago.

Council voted priority funding to these programs: Prevention of juvenile delinquency, education and training in all elements of the criminal justice system, regional and statewide information and communications systems, community relations programs, experimental and demonstration projects to test and evaluate new approaches to solving problems in criminal justice system.

Approved funds will be disbursed to 21 geographical planning regions of the state. Congress now is considering funding which would provide Texas more than \$11 million in action money, plus planning aid for next year to develop a long-range plan and begin putting it into effect.

### Advanced Course Set for Welders

An advanced course in oxygen-acetylene welding will be offered at the vocational agriculture department of the Robert Lee High School beginning at 7 p.m. June 9. The course will run for four nights, June 9, 10, 11 and 12. Charlie H. Yeates from Texas A&M University will be the instructor.

The course is made possible by the Adult Education Specialist program of the Texas Education Specialist program of the Texas Education Agency and coordinated by the Department of Agricultural Education of Texas A&M University. It is sponsored by the Vocational Agriculture Department of the Robert Lee High School.

A course for beginners in oxygen-acetylene welding was conducted May 19, 20 and 21. Mr. Yeates was the instructor for that course. The advanced course will take up where the beginner course ended and offer additional techniques and laboratory work.

"We are fortunate in being able to follow up so soon after the beginners course with the advanced course," said L. R. McDaniel, local vocational agriculture teacher. Most schools have to wait a much longer time, he said. Yeates was scheduled to conduct a class in the Panhandle area of Texas, but since the grain harvest is in operation now, the schools have canceled their welding course at this time.

Yeates and McDaniel said that anyone who missed the beginner course, but would like to take this course is invited to come and they will work with them.

Those wishing to enroll may do so by contacting McDaniel or Supt. Jimmy Bickley. There is a \$10.00 fee which goes to pay for the material and supplies used by the students.

McDaniel said it would be a great help if those interested in enrolling in the course would call him or Bickley. This would allow the lab work to be planned in advance.

Main item of business at Tuesday's meeting of the BCD was a discussion of the "Welcome Signs" which are proposed to be erected on the four highways coming into Robert Lee.

Cumbie Ivey Jr., chairman of the sign committee, showed BCD members a final drawing of the signs. The wording reads:

Ivey read a rough draft of a letter which is to be sent to members, business firms and individuals, requesting donations to finance the signs. Total cost of the four signs will be between \$1100 and \$1200, Ivey said.

The BCD voted to pay the expense of printing 100 copies of a picture of the signs to enclose with the requests for donations.

President Garland Davis expressed regrets to Bobby Palmos who is leaving Robert Lee to serve as Methodist pastor at Eldorado.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley reminded BCD members that Saturday is the date of the maintenance tax election for Robert Lee Schools. He gave a brief rundown on tax rates and valuations.

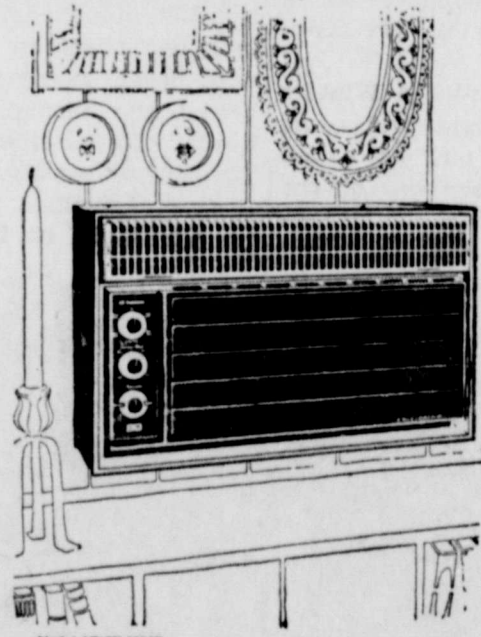

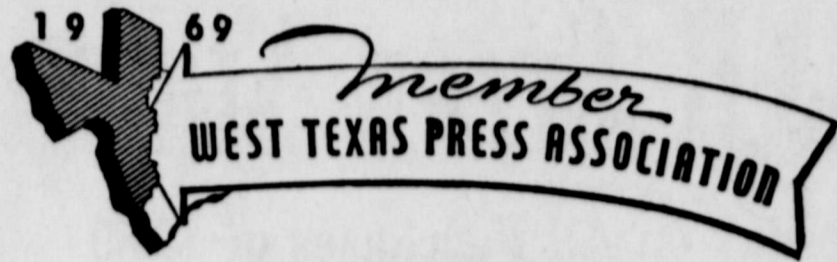

## H D Agent's News Dept.

Calcium content alone is enough reason for drinking milk.

Calcium is needed all during life for healthy bones. Along with calcium, though, milk contains many other nutrients — minerals, vitamins, sugars, protein elements — which altogether make milk a very special food for the well being of everyone from infants to the senior citizens.

The simplest way to get milk into family meals is to serve it as a beverage. You have a wide choice to suit the tastes of your family — fresh whole milk, fresh skimmed milk, buttermilk, chocolate or flavored milk, reconstituted dry milk and canned milk products. Whatever you prefer, chill the milk thoroughly to enhance the flavor.

If you use nonfat dry milk as a beverage, reconstitute it several hours before serving and keep it cold.

Almost all fresh milk and cream on the market is pasteurized to protect you. In pasteurizing, milk is heated briefly to kill harmful bacteria. Then it is chilled rapidly.

In addition most fresh whole pasteurized milk on the market is homogenized. The homogenizing process disperses the fat evenly through the milk.

June is dairy month. Milk and dairy products are in plentiful supplies in all areas of the United States. In using milk in cooking, remember to heat milk slowly. At high temperatures, the protein in milk coagulates into a film on top and a coating on sides of the pan. Prolonged high temperatures also cause off-flavors and — sometimes scorching. Milk mixtures thickened with flour or cornstarch need constant stirring during cooking to prevent lumping.

Dairy-fool salads make tempting summer fare. This one makes six servings.

1 3 oz. pkg. lemon flavored gelatin  
1 cup boiling water  
1 cup cold water  
½ cup process Cheddar cheese, coarsely shredded

2 cups canned pineapple chunks, drained  
1 cup halved seedless grapes  
½ cup whipping cream  
6 lettuce leaves  
6 small grape clusters  
6 mint sprigs

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water, then stir in cold water. Chill until thick but not set. Fold in cheese, pineapple chunks, and grapes. Blend thoroughly.

Whip cream and fold into gelatin mixture. Pour into six individual molds. Chill until set. Unmold on lettuce and garnish with grape clusters and mint sprigs.

If you prefer, liquid drained from the canned pineapple may be substituted for part of the cold water.

### Jewel Fruit-Cream Mold

1 3 oz. package cherry-flavored gelatin  
1 cup boiling water  
1 cup cold water  
1 cup canned pineapple tidbits, drained

½ cup shredded process Cheddar cheese

½ cup whipping cream  
1 cup canned dark sweet cherries, drained and pitted

½ cup chopped walnuts  
Several lettuce leaves.

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water, then stir in cold water. Chill until thick but not set. Divide into two equal portions. Add pineapple and cheese to one portion. Whip cream and fold into pineapple mixture, blending well. Pour into a 1½-quart mold or six individual molds. Chill just until set. Add cherries and walnuts to the second portion of the gelatin mixture and pour over the thickened first layer. Chill until firm and unmold on lettuce.

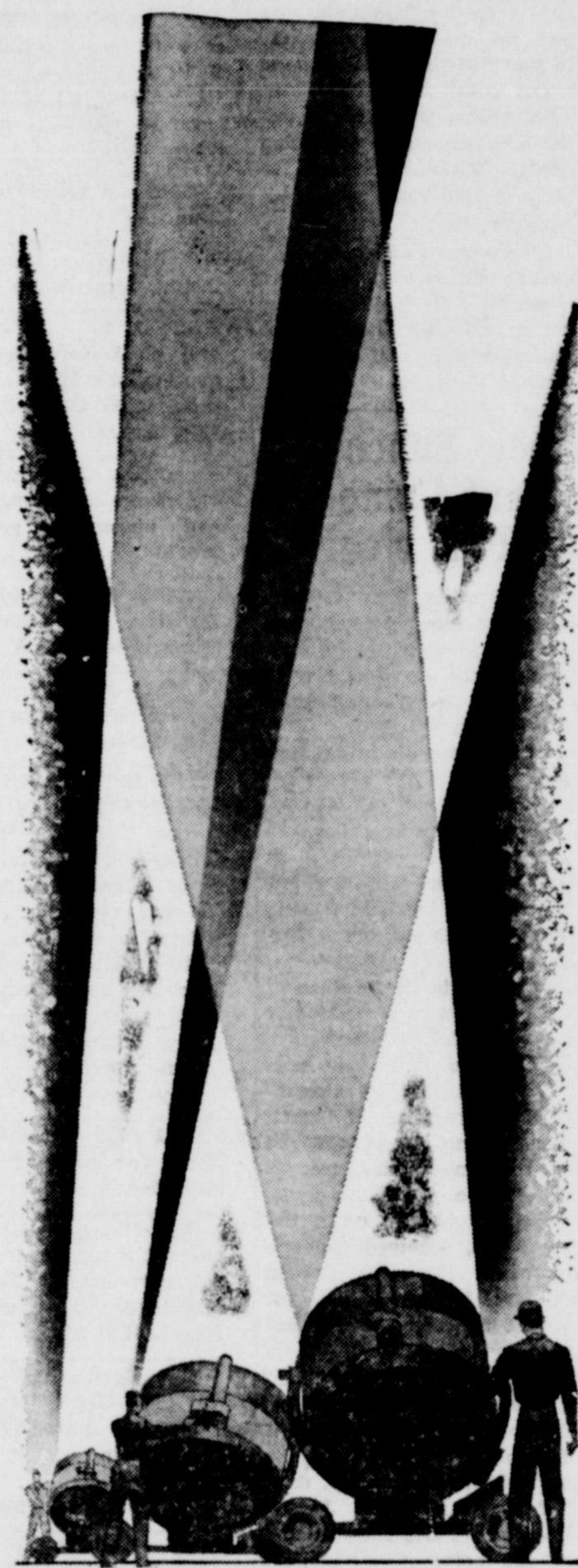
