





## **Vaughan Wins** Trip to Mexico

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Vaughan left Tuesday for Dallas where they boarded a jet for Mexico City. The trip is being sponsored by the Chevrolet Division of General Motors and Vaughan won their tickets by selling the most new car units in his group during May and June.

The Vaughans will have three days in Mexico City and four more in Acapulco.

Robert Lee is in Group 9 for the Chevrolet sales setup and the local agency had to compete with such towns as Daingerfiled, Commerce, DeLeon, Anson, Clarksville, Graham, Teague and Carthage. Vaughan's sales amounted to 142.1 per cent of his quota. Daingerfield came in second with 125.6 per cent.


