Historical Association Has Successful Meeting

From over the 22-county area known as the Edwards Plateau, a group interested in pulling the stories and lessons of the past into use in the present, met in Robert Lee Saturday — the Edwards Plateau Historical Association.

The Coke County Historical Survey Committee, with other interested local people, were hosts to the all-day meeting. Three papers were presented at the morning session.

In the afternoon, a business session chose officers for the ensuing year. George Stoepler of Melvin, former Blackwell school superintendent, was elected president.

Dramatizing the story of the past as a constructive contribution in building the future was key-noted both morning and afternoon. The work of Texas Tech's department of Arid and Semi-arid studies in depicting the ranch development in West Texas was presented by Jerry L. Rogers, historian in charge of this work. He traced the development from the first dug-outs to modern spreads. Funds for the work are largely from private contributions, now around \$150,000. There are 76 acres set aside for placing early buildings, museum and other related structures.

Following the program was a conducted tour of the Robert Lee Dam and Spence lake basin area.

Officers besides Stoepler who were elected included: Fred Matheisen, Fredericksburg, first vice president; Mrs. Ralph Wierhausen of Marble Falls, second vice president; Mrs. F. Luckenbach of Menard, recording secretary; Mrs. Edgar Boelsche of

Ballinger, corresponding secretary; Elton Mims of Water Valley, historian, and A. A. Willman of Mason, associate historian. Those present voted to have the next association meeting at Brady.

Ulmer Bird of Sanco was the first member of the Coke County Historical Committee to give a report. Bird's talk was on the geography and economy of Coke County, and he related how geographical conditions already are drawing people back into the open country, away from crowded cities. Bird mentioned that several counties in the Edwards Plateau area showed a gain in population in 1960 and that this trend is expected to increase in the next decade.

Bird told in his talk how Coke County was rapidly settled about the turn of the century and how population has since increased. He brought out that the completion of Robert Lee Dam and Lake

Spence are expected to be a strong drawing card in reversing the decline in population.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough gave a paper on early day history of schools, county government and other items of interest. She said at one time Coke County had 30 or 31 schools where there are only two today. She also brought out that there have been 15 post offices in the county, and now there are only five.

Mrs. Yarbrough gave some of the history on the organization of the county, telling how the county seat was first located at Hayrick and later moved to Robert Lee.

Elton Mims, who served as master of ceremonies for the meeting, gave some vignettes of Coke County history. He related how Sam Maverick happened to have lands located in favored places for the location of pioneer forts, including some 47 80-acre plots

School Audit Published In This Week's Observer

A copy of an audit of the books of Robert Lee School District is being printed in this week's Observer. The audit was made by Harold V. Simpson, certified public accountant of Austin.

Figures in the financial statement are unusually large this year, due to the building program and its accompanying bond issue.

The balance in the building fund makes up the biggest part of the \$296,835.17 balance shown in all funds.

Balance at the beginning of the fiscal year, receipts, disbursements and balances at the end of the year are shown for seven funds, including state and county available, local maintenance,

Extra Hour Sleep Coming Sat. Night

Coke County residents will be able this weekend to make up for the hour of sleep they lost last spring when the country went on Daylight Saving Time.

The official time for making the change is 2 a.m. on the last Sunday in October. However, it will probably be all right if readers set back their clocks one hour before they go to bed Saturday night, even though it may be before the official 2 a.m. time.

The change back to Central Standard Time will give earlier morning light to early risers, but they will have to give up an hour of daylight in the evening. As of Sunday sunset will occur right at 6 p.m.

Location is on a 483.5 acre lease, 660 feet from the north and 685 feet from the east lines of Section 397, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

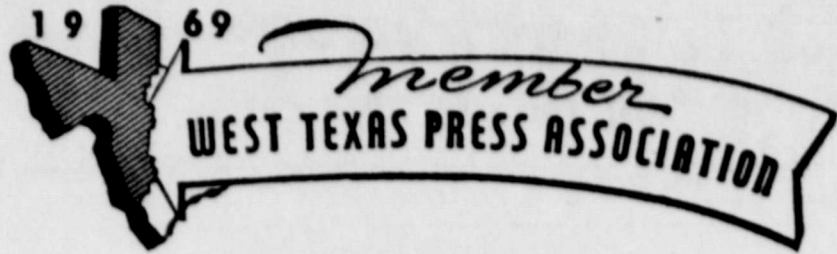
I.A.B. Extended

King Resources Co. of Midland No. 3 R. H. Harris Estate has been completed to pump 90 barrels of oil and 30 barrels of water, with a gas-oil ratio of 400-1. Location is 2,173 feet from the north and 1,787 feet from the east lines of Section 480, Block 1A, H&TC Survey.

The hole was drilled to 5,776 feet and plugged back to 5,757 feet. Production was through perforations which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons.

Penzoil United Inc., No. 1 Gardner, wildcat located two miles northwest of Water Valley, has been plugged and abandoned at a total depth of 7,771 feet. Location was 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of Section 1, A. G. Atkinson Survey, A-1886.

WSCS To Observe Week of Prayer

Wylie Downs Steers In District Opener, 21-20

Wylie 21 — Steers 20

A few ifs here and a few ifs there and we might have won this one real easy, but the score was in their favor. A slow first half put the Steers in the hole and the second half surge just didn't quite make it. This one was an important one to win, but its not over yet. The Steers have what it takes. If they can get all their marbles in the circle at the same time, they can get rolling and still win this thing.

First Quarter

The Steers won the toss and elected to receive. Waldon Millican took the ball at the 5 yard line and returned it to the Steer 23. The Steers lacked the punch and Wylie held at the 29. Fields punted to the Wylie 39 with the return there. Wylie made a big quick 1st down at the Steer 44. The Steers held on downs at their own 36 yard line. The Steers couldn't move yet and Fields punted to the Wylie 39 yard line.

Wylie got going on a 28 yard pass, putting the ball at the Robert Lee 33 yard line. They made another 1st at the 6 and two plays later went over to score. The kick

was good and Wylie led 7-0.

Wylie tried an on side kick which didn't work and the Steers got the ball at their 48. Wylie held at midfield and on the 4th down punt, the kick was blocked. Wylie scooped it up and covered 40 yards for an easy six points. The kick for extras was good and it was already 14 to 0. Wylie kicked off into the Steer end zone and Waldon Millican returned it to the Steer 30 yard line. Wylie held at the Steer 34 and Fields punted to the Wylie 35 as the first quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Wylie made a 1st down at the Steer 44, but that was all and they punted to the Steer 15. The Steers started a little punch at this point, racking up a 1st at the 34, then another at the 45, but Wylie held there. Fields got off a good punt that went out of bounds on the Wylie 5 yard line. Wylie started a surge as they went for a 1st down at the 42, then at the Steer 46 and another at the 31. The Steers held at the 26 on downs with little time remaining. Mumford passed 22 yards to Marshall Millican, then 20 more to Lane Beaty and the Steers were on the Wylie 30. A deep pass was intercepted at the 15 as time ran out in the first half.

Third Quarter

Robert Lee received the second half kickoff and were a different ball club. With the ball at the Steer 40 yard line and with Joe David Key totting the ball, in 7 plays they moved to the 4 yard line. Randy Smith exploded over

for the touchdown. Smith ran the points over also and the score was 14-8.

Lane Beaty kicked off into the end zone and the ball was returned to the Wylie 24. But the Steers had new life and held Wylie at the 30. The punt went out of bounds at the Steer 44. The Steers got rolling again as the line opened up holes for 5 and 6 yards at a lick, but at the Wylie 15 yard line, the Steers fumbled and Wylie took over. The Steers held at the 23 and Wylie punted to the Wylie 39. Two plays later the third quarter was over.

Fourth Quarter

The Steers began another surge and moved rapidly down field on a 30 yard pass from Mumford to Doug Burns which set the ball on the 4 yard line. Key hit for 3 yards and the next time he went over for the score. The extras failed and the score was tied 14-14.

The Steers kicked off to the Wylie 15 with a real good return at the Wylie 47 yard line. Then the breaks came as Wylie got a first at the Steer 42 on a penalty. Then they made two more 1sts to the Steer 15. Their quarter back circled the end for the remaining 15 and a score. They kicked the extra point and the score was 21-14.

Randy Smith took the kickoff and a good return put the ball at the Steer 45 yard line. Two plays later came the Steers longest play from scrimmage this year. Joe Key went through a beautiful hole 53 yards for a touchdown. The hole was there and all he had to do was pour on the gas. The deciding extra points failed and the score was 21-20. This sort of wrapped it up as time was nearly out and Wylie was content to run out the clock.

Abilene to Have College Program

Junior and senior high school students who are planning to go to college, and parents of these students, will have an opportunity to meet and talk with representatives from various colleges at a College Night program at Abilene High School on Tuesday night, Oct. 28, at 7:30 p.m. Letters have been sent to principals of high schools within a 75 mile radius of Abilene issuing an invitation to the college-bound juniors and seniors and their parents to attend this meeting.

Representatives from 26 colleges and universities will participate. There will also be representatives from Air Force, Army and Navy ROTC to provide information about these programs. Each student and parent will have an opportunity to attend three different discussion groups to obtain information about three different colleges in which they are interested.

College representatives will discuss such matters as entrance requirements, application procedure, estimated yearly cost, course of study or fields of specialization offered, type of housing available, financial aid and opportunities for social development.

This is the fifth consecutive year that College Night has been co-sponsored by the Parents Club of Abilene High School and Cooper High School. Each year hundreds of students and parents of the area have attended in order to secure first-hand information about colleges early in the school year.

HILL COUNTRY ANGUS BULL SALE TO BE HELD NOV. 1

The Hill Country Angus Association Bull Sale will be held Saturday, Nov. 1, at the Gillespie Livestock Auction Co. at Fredericksburg. The sale barn is located off the San Antonio Highway. Judging of sale animals will begin at 9 a.m. and the sale will start at 1 p.m.

Ninety-four bulls will be sold, including 42 which were selected from an offering of 500 bulls for the production gain program. These animals were weighed and fed together in a large pen on a high roughage ration formulated by Texas A&M University for 140 days. Hence, each bull was on his own merits from the start.

There will be half brothers or closer kin to the San Antonio 1969 Grand Champion Steer; one-fourth brothers to the State Fair 1968 Reserve Champion steer, and half brothers to the 1969 West Texas Fair Grand Champion Bull. Other top blood lines are included in the offering.

Nineteen of the bulls are sons of one of the first certified meat sires in the state, and over 80 per cent of the animals offered have certified performance records on a 140 day gain test.

Everyone will have an opportunity to judge the cattle before the sale.

Good News About Guarantees

Although a guarantee or warranty may insure repairs and services, it often provides little protection for the consumer.

But warranty conditions seem to be changing for the better.

Manufacturers have been simplifying guarantees by eliminating legal jargon and making them easier to read. Government pressure and consumer complaint caused this.

The new warranties do not necessarily provide more protection. Many warranties cover only parts or a selected group of parts. Some precautions to follow for self-protection are:

1. Insist upon seeing a copy of the warranty before you buy the product.
2. Check the warranty carefully to determine how much protection you have.
3. Find out who will service the product.
4. If the product has been purchased on a 30 day charge account, you will be in a better bargaining position to receive service before you make the payment.
5. Keep the warranty in a safe

place, record date of purchase and store on it.

6. Do not be afraid to take action in getting proper service. If necessary, take your complaint to the president of the manufacturing company.

Sewing Fall Fabrics

A number of fall fabrics woven with heavy yarns ravel easily. The sewing machine can help prevent raveling in several ways.

Some machines have special patterns for overcasting or edging. A blind hemming pattern may be used to let the stitch overcast the seam edges.

For this, reverse the usual procedure for holding fabric under the machine. Put the edge to be finished to the left of the needle and pressure foot instead of to the right side. Stitch one fourth inch from the edge of seam.

Adjust the machine for easy tension so the edge of the fabric is not curled from too tight tension.

For a straight stitching machine, shorten stitch to 15 stitches an inch and sew a fourth inch from the seam edge. To slow the raveling process hand overcast or pink the seam.

Whatever the finish, remember that seams should be flexible and not bulky.

Re-potting House Plants

It's time to re-pot house plants, and here is the recipe for soil mixture for potting:

Mix two parts good garden loam, two parts of peat moss and one part sand. Well rotten manure or shredded leaf mold may substitute for peat moss.

Garden soil usually is not suitable for potting plants. It is usually too low in organic matter. The homemade mixture provides the three things most needed by potted plants; support, good soil aeration, and ability to hold

adequate moisture and nutrients.

To kill disease organisms, insects and weed seeds, pasteurize the soil mixture by placing it in a shallow pan for 30 minutes in an oven preheated to 200 degrees. The soil should be moistened before placing in the oven.

Always use clean tools and new pots or soil may be reinfected with harmful organisms. Used clay pots should be given the same pasteurization treatment as the soil. Plastic pots should be washed thoroughly in hot soapy water.

A simpler and much easier way to handle pot plants in the home is to purchase the prepared mixes available in your nursery or garden supply center.

along the Colorado River in Coke County. Mims told about six of the officers who were stationed at Fort Chadbourne rose to staff rank during the Civil War, and mentioned the various trails traversing the county, including the military trail, the Butterfield Overland Mail trail, and one known as the western trail, used by cattlemen.

A personal story related to his family was told by Mims concerning Betty Putnam, who was captured by the Comanches and later returned to her family in a prisoner exchange. She came to this area in 1912 to visit a grand son-in-law, Sam Mims, and while here identified the pecan groves and Shelving Rocks as spots she remembered while a captive of the Indians.

Mims said that six of the 53 big ranchmen who are in the Cattle-men's Hall of Fame, once operated in Coke County, including L. B. Harris and Winfield Scott.
