



Traveling Cookies

Cookies travel best when packed well; mailable kinds include soft drop cookies, filled cookies and chewy bar cookies.

Use a strong cardboard box or metal container for mailing cookies

Cookies with honey and fruit improve flavor with age. Applesauce, molasses, oatmeal and mincemeat cookies are good packers.

Bake bar dookies in foil pie pans and mail them in the pans. Line the mailing container with aluminum foil and put a

or wax paper on the bottom. Wrap cookies in pairs, back to back, with foil or plastic wrap-





Who would ever put a loaded gun in the hands of an untrained careful and turn him loose in

When would you ever choose a loaded rifle or shotgun for a or over a hot cup of coffee -except during deer seasn?

And, who would put a loaded weapon into a car filled with others - except some careless hunter during a hunt?

Planning preparedness and thoughtfulness would eliminate many unnecessary hunting fatalities. Unloading your rifle before you climb up or down a tree takes only a few seconds, so why gamble a few seconds against your life?

It's playing with pretty high stakes when you carry a loaded weapon through a fence instead of first putting it through the fence - and laying it on the ground - before you go over or through the fence. Never lean a gun against a fence; it might fall and discharge.

Never point a gun at anyoneeven if you know it's unloaded. You might florget another time. And when you shoot, be sure of your target. If a youngster wants to hunt, prepare him before you take him cut. When you take that coffee break or a meal, unload your gun. A loaded gun is a dangerous companion.






