Funeral services for Artell Green Roberts, 67, were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in Robert Lee Baptist Church. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery directed by Newby Funeral Home.

Mr. Roberts was pronounced dead about 2:30 p.m. Friday in his pickup on Texas highway 208 one mile south of Robert Lee.

Justice of the Peace Roy P. Ross ruled death by natural causes, apparently a heart attack. He was returning home from San Angelo.

Mr. Roberts was born March 7, 1902 in Brown County. He came to Coke County as a child with his parents. He was married to Lola Taylor in 1926 in Robert Lee. She died in 1941. He was married to Reba Woods Feb. 14, 1948 in Robert Lee. He was a Baptist.

He is survived by his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Kay Pitcock of Lubbock; two sisters, Mrs. Calvin (Leona) Wallace and Mrs. Alice Benton, both of Robert Lee and several nieces and nephews.

### Coke Voters Must Register by Jan. 1

Citizens of Coke County are reminded that they must register in the office of Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs in order to be eligible to vote in the elections held on or after March 1, 1970.

Everyone who wants to vote in any election which may come up during the voting year after this date must register not later than Jan. 31, 1970. However, the registration period began Oct. 1 and eligible persons may register any time. The only major exception to the requirement for registration is for persons who are absent from the county in active military service.

A prospective voter may request an application by mail or he may appear in person in the assessor's office. Application may be made through the following agents of a voter: husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter, provided the agent also is a qualified voter in the same county.

of the Concho Hereford Association Nov. 2 at their annual membership meeting held at Rio Concho Manor in San Angelo.

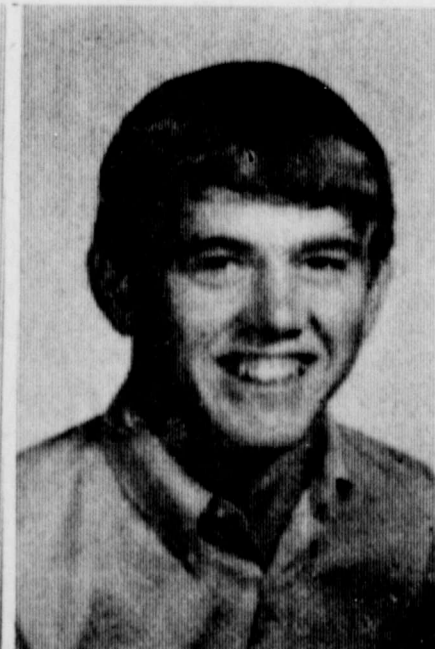
Association members also re-elected Dawson Coleman of Miles vice president; Ed S. Hyman, secretary; and X. B. Cox Jr., treasurer.

### Traveling Cookies

Cookies travel best when packed well; mailable kinds include soft drop cookies, filled cookies and chewy bar cookies.

Use a strong cardboard box or metal container for mailing cookies.

Cookies with honey and fruit improve flavor with age. Applesauce, molasses, oatmeal and mincemeat cookies are good packers.

Bake bar cookies in foil pie pans and mail them in the pans. Line the mailing container with aluminum foil and put a cushion of crumpled paper towels or wax paper on the bottom.

Wrap cookies in pairs, back to back, with foil or plastic wrapping to seal in flavor.

Pack snugly in rows with heavy cookies at the bottom. Cover each layer with a cushion of paper towels and top with a thick layer.

Wrap the filled box in foil and heavy brown paper and tie securely.

For recipes for cookies that will pack well see the new Coke County Home Demonstration Cookbook and Christmas Time at Home. The booklets are available from my office for a small charge.

### Who Develops Diabetes?

Who develops diabetes? The diabetes control section of the United States Department of Health Education and Welfare answers the question.

Diabetes is most likely to be found in those more than 40 years old, obese, blood relatives of diabetics, mothers who have given birth to babies that weigh nine pounds or more at birth, women who have shown carbohydrate intolerance during pregnancy, persons with other related chronic diseases and anyone who has demonstrated hyperglycemia on previous testing.

These seven groups are "high risk" people and are in the greatest danger of becoming diabetic.

The disease can be detected in its early stages by a good screening program and diagnosis. A program also can help discover these "high risk" persons before they become diabetics. Your doctor can help!

### Save on the Grocery Bill

Cooler weather increases appetites and squeezes the family food budget. Here are some suggestions to help get the most for the food dollar this week.

Pomegranates, tangerines, persimmons and pineapples are now in markets. Texas citrus have debuted and their supplies will increase in the weeks ahead.

Fresh fruit and vegetable items in good supply at the most

economical prices include apples, bananas, oranges, Tokay grapes, cranberries, potatoes, turnips, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, tomatoes, hard shell squash and dry yellow onions.

Grapefruit, avacados and cantaloupes are moderately priced.

The beef market is irregular.

The features are a real value with an eye on beef specials, comparative shopping can result in real values.

Attractive prices may be found on round steak, blade chuck and standing rib roasts.

Turkeys, 16 pounds and up, are the big protein value. Check the poultry counters for good buys in whole and cut-up fryers and chicken hens.

In most markets, pork is a good value. Featured specials may include bacon, roll sausage, fresh picnic, canned hams and semi-boneless hams.

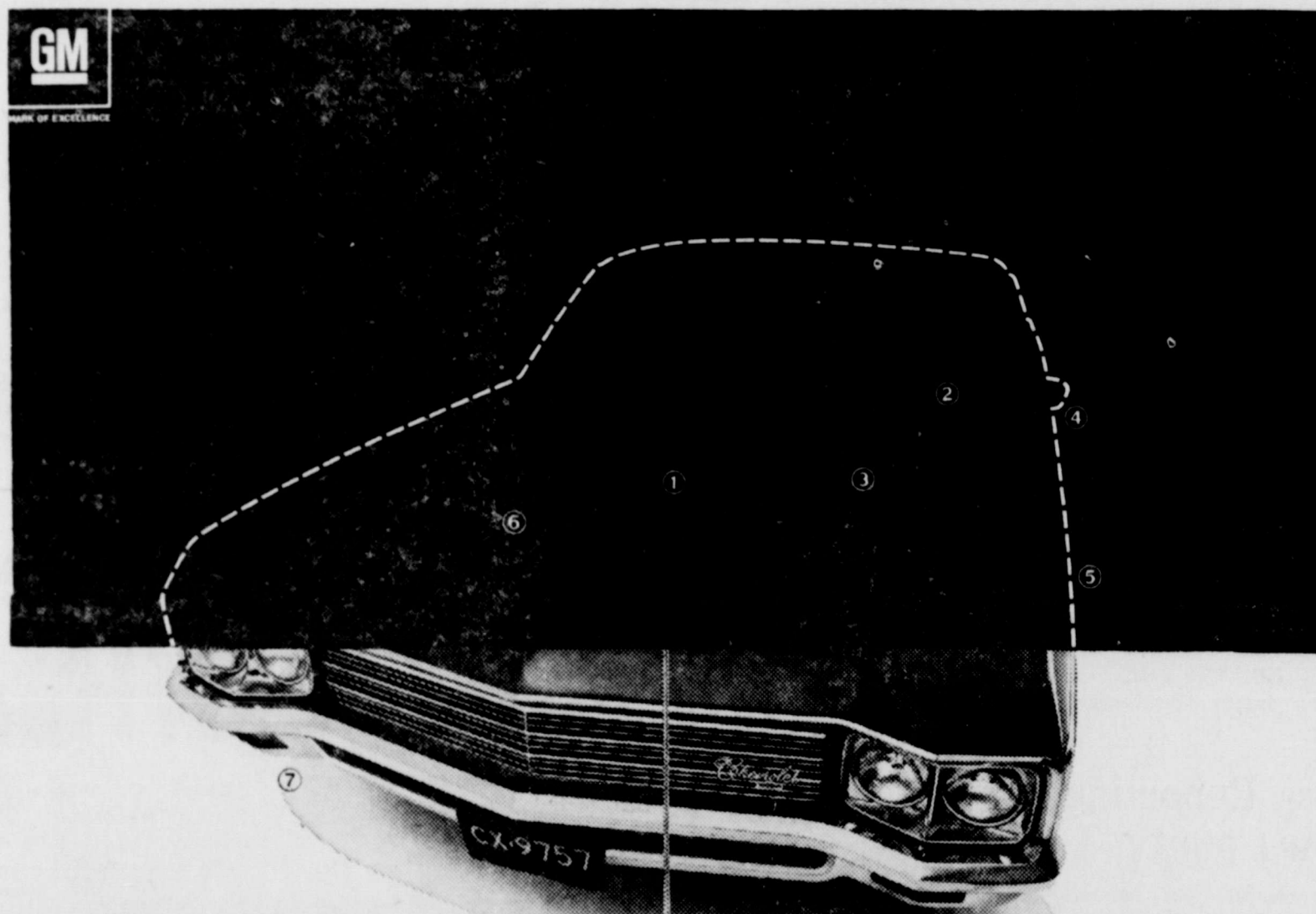

One of the biggest armies of hunters in Texas history — some 700,000 — will be in the field this year, and safety should accompany them.

The gun-toting brigade will be in search of game ranging from mourning doves to javelinas on a battleground stretching throughout the length and breadth of Texas.

Many of these hunters won't return from the hunt — victims of their own mistakes or the mistakes of other trigger-happy hunters. Many will die of heart attacks, brought on by strenuous exercise to which their bodies have become unaccustomed during the past year of inactivity. Thousands will come home with head colds and flu, the result of a variety of conditions including wind, rain and cold weather and and over-exposure to the elements.

Thousands of hunters will get away with mistakes, but about a hundred a year don't survive these mental errors.

For example, who would ever climb an unfamiliar tree in the dark, carrying a loaded gun — except on the first morning of deer season?

Or, who would ever snake his way through a barbed wire fence, wagging a loaded rifle behind him — except during deer season?

Who would ever put a loaded gun in the hands of an untrained teenager, admonish him to be careful and turn him loose in the woods — except during deer season?

When would you ever choose a loaded rifle or shotgun for a companion around the campfire or over a hot cup of coffee — except during deer season?

And, who would put a loaded weapon into a car filled with others — except some careless hunter during a hunt?

Planning preparedness and thoughtfulness would eliminate many unnecessary hunting fatalities. Unloading your rifle before you climb up or down a tree takes only a few seconds, so why gamble a few seconds against your life?

It's playing with pretty high stakes when you carry a loaded weapon through a fence instead of first putting it through the fence — and laying it on the ground — before you go over or through the fence. Never lean a gun against a fence; it might fall and discharge.

Never point a gun at anyone—even if you know it's unloaded. You might forget another time. And when you shoot, be sure of your target. If a youngster wants to hunt, prepare him before you take him out. When you take that coffee break or a meal, unload your gun. A loaded gun is a dangerous companion.

# Steers Battle Undeclared Roscoe To 7-7 Deadlock

Robert Lee 7 — Roscoe 7

The Steers and the Bumble Bees got together Friday night before a large homecoming crowd and displayed a little football for them and the visiting Plowboys. The Steers didn't win or lose, score-wise, but they won back the respect of Steer fans that saw the contest. The Bumble Bee defense was magnificent in that they made no costly errors. They gave up the touch-down that the Plowboys made on strictly brute force and a penalty call (question mark). Joe David Key got his 100 yards plus rushing again behind the blocking of Lane Beaty, James Fields, Mike Conley, Jackie Preslar, Jack Thomason, Jim Cox and Doug Burns.

Marshall Millican and Randy Smith got some tough yards with 30 and 25 respectively. Mike Mumford's signal calling kept the Plowboys wondering. Defensively, Ernest Herford, John Service and Waldon Millican made their presence known, with Herford making a stinging tackle on the big Roscoe fullback early in the game. I hope the boys are as proud of themselves as the fans were because they deserve a little praise with the odds against them. Danny Percifull and Richard Guerrant, a pair of up and coming sophomores and Bobby Mumford, a freshman, saw limited action. Keep them in mind, you'll see more of them.

## First Quarter

The Steers received the opening kickoff with Key taking it at the 12 and returning the ball to the Steer 35 yard line. The Steers drove for a 1st at their 49 and then another at the Roscoe 39. There the Plowboys dug in and held the Steers. Fields punted high to the Roscoe 9 yard line where the receiver took a hard blow by Jim Cox and fumbled the ball with Jackie Thomason recovering at that point. The Steers used all four downs from here but they scored with Mumford sneaking over from the one. Lane Beaty kicked one through the uprights and the Steers had a 7-0 lead.

Beaty kicked off to the Plowboy 15 with a return to the 21. The Bees were tough and Roscoe had to punt from the 27, with

the punt going to the Steer 40. The Steers drew a penalty to the 26 and the Plowboys held with little yardage gained. Fields again kicked high and the ball was dead at the Roscoe 40. Roscoe made a 1st at the Steer 44, but the Steers held and Roscoe punted to the Steer 5 yard line, as the first quarter ended.

## Second Quarter

The Steers drove for a 1st at the 17, then another at the 37, but another penalty put them back to the 23, where Roscoe held and Fields punted to the Roscoe 25 yard line. They returned it to the Steer 49. Roscoe made a 1st at the Steer 38, then the Bees broke through and threw the Roscoe quarterback for a large loss. They punted to the Steer 25.

Roscoe held at the 31 and Fields boomed one high to the Roscoe 20 with no chance for a return. Roscoe made a 1st at their 31, but on the next play they were jarred loose from the ball and Marshall Millican recovered it at the Roscoe 35. The had the same trouble and with a loose ball at the 50, Ernest Herford saved the day and recovered for the Steers which forced Fields to punt again. He kicked to the Plowboy 17 with no return again. Roscoe made a 1st at the Roscoe 36, then the Steers drew a penalty to the Steer 45. Roscoe went for the bomb here and Mike Mumford made a beautiful save for the Steers as it looked like the receiver was in the clear. The Steers then stopped the Plowboys with two seconds remaining. One play later and the half ended with the Steers in the lead.

## Third Quarter

Roscoe got the honors for the second half and received the ball at the 15 with a return to their 48. Then their brute force began to show as they went for a 1st at the Steer 41, the 30, and the question mark penalty made a 1st on the 5 yard line. They

scored on the next play, their extra point kick was good and it was 7-7.

The Plowboys kicked off to the Steer 15 with a return to the 39. The Steers made a 1st at the Roscoe 48 but the Plowboys held there and Fields punted high again to the Roscoe 26. Roscoe made a 1st at their 42, and another at the Steer 43, but the Steers stopped them there and they punted to the Steer 5 yard line with a return to the 16. He also said that any piece of mail should include the sender's return address. 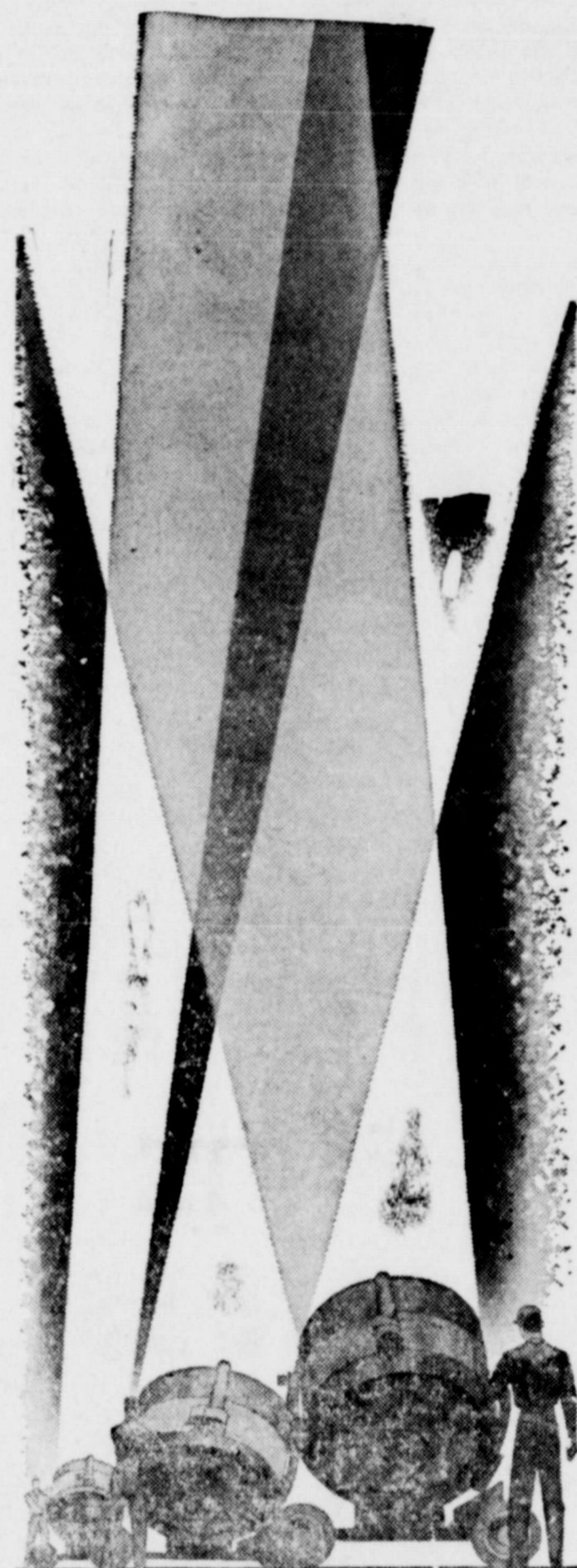

AUSTIN, Tex. — Prospects of whopping new tax bills may face Texans in 1971, 1973 and 1975 and a critical housing shortage within the next decade is likely.

Texas Research League heard the bad news at its 17th annual meeting here.

James W. McGrew, new Executive Director of the League and one of the state's top fiscal authorities, warned of the coming "decade of tax crises" like that of the 1950's.

McGrew sized up the 1971 tax bill as at least \$270 million and maybe as much as \$400 million. Furthermore, he predicted, a bigger one will be in store two years later and one not quite so big in 1975.

Standby sales tax (now at four and a quarter per cent in many areas) may be near its "political limitation." Implication was clear that new tax trails will have to be blazed.

Gov. Preston Smith said half the state's 2,803,000 housing units are "inadequate or sub-standard." He requested the League to study the problem and come up with recommendations as to the state's role in the housing field.

Housing shortage may reach "crisis proportions" in two years, Smith told League members. Needs over the next decade, he forecast, will demand \$1.5 billion worth of construction a year in Texas. Within the same period, he said, housing will have to be found for 875,000 new Texas families, and slums and overcrowding must be eliminated.

Greatest prospect for solving problems of slums, contended the governor, lies in "effective programs of governments to assist slum residents in becoming home owners." Public housing and rent supplements, he maintained, "tend to isolate, segregate and spotlight the poor, while providing no long-range changes in their situations."

Smith suggested a statewide building code may be needed and State Housing Authority may be helpful to coordinate efforts of the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development with local governmental units.

**BALLOT SPOTS PICKED** — Proposed constitutional amendment to legalize the sale of liquor by the drink will be in the second spot on the Nov. 3, 1970, general election ballot.

Here's how drawings for other ballot places by Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. came out last week:

No. 1 — Provision for removal, censure or retirement of appellate court judges and justices of the peace by a new Judicial Qualifications Commission.

No. 3 — Uniform methods for assessing farm, ranch and forest

lands on a capability to produce basis.

No. 4 — Making the State Building Commission a three-member appointive agency.

No. 5 — Authorizing counties to issue road bonds up to a fourth of assessed valuation on vote of taxpayers.

No. 6 — Increasing value of homesteads exempt from froced sale.

No. 7 — Providing for consolidation of local government functions and interagency contracts for performance of governmental services.

**COURTS SPEAK** — Supreme Court split six to three in upholding the constitutionality of the controversial Saturday-Sunday closing laws. Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert wrote the dissenting opinion, contending that the statute prohibiting the sale of 46 items on consecutive days of weekends should be knocked out.

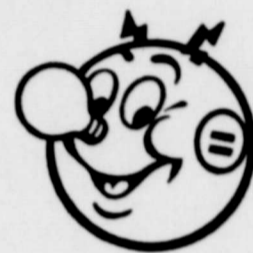
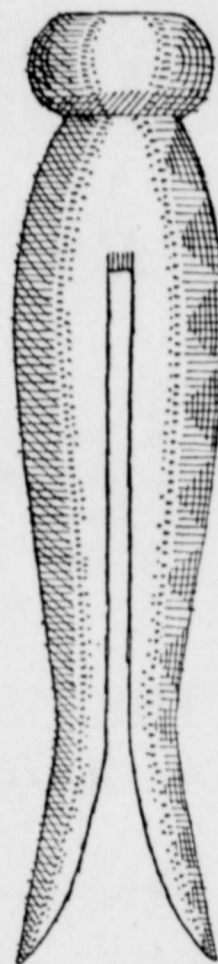

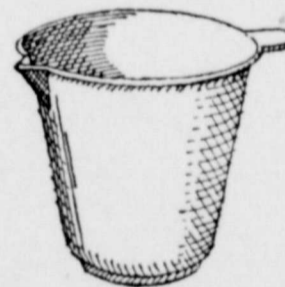
