ging or sagging. It is highly wrinkle resistant and packable The fabric is comfortable wear, combining a softness and a crispness which prevents the knit fabrics. As for care, such clothes can be machine washed hand and drip dried washed by in either case. 2. The fabric is adaptable. easy to handle and sew. Poly casual or dressy wear. In most cases, it doesn't ravel, requir
stay stitching, tape or seam finishing. Set-in sleeves and fulla lining or interfacing is not needed except occasionally for a interfacing is desired, choose the new lightweight nonwoven washable type designed especially for
knits. Here are sewing pointers. If a slight shrinkage of fabric might present a fitting problem, preshrink fabric by washing and tumble drying. Preshrink zipper as well.
Pin pattern on grain using sharp dressmaker pins.
