More than 1,000 applications on file will be processed, but no more can be accepted until the interest-rate-bind eases.

ANTIQUITIES RULES State Antiquities Committee, charged with regulating those who dig for historic treasures in the state, has set its rules and issued its first permit.

Rules require that any person or group seeking to excavate or salvage an archeological historical site obtain a permit from the Committee. Supervision by a trained archeologist, recording and publication of results and a scientific manner of working are the major points stressed in the rule.

Committee deleted from its rules a proposal that beachcombens and arrowhead hunters would have to get state permits. They will, however, be required to make reports on their discoveries. Explorers would be required to stop work immediately once a permit is cancelled.






