Numerous witnesses have been before the committee, including Medical Assoctiation, hospital associations, insurance carriers, private physicians and others who give an appraisal of present operations of these programs and make recommendations for change.
About everyvne agrees that failures and weaknesses in medicare and medicaid have not re-
sulted from a lack of dollars from the Federal Government. As has been mentioned here before, the cost of medicare an medicaid has skyrocketed, much of $\pi$ due to inflation but other factors have influenced it also The effort is to search out th difficulties in our health care system and seek ways of reme dying the faults.
A doctor member of the Congress proposes that the Federal Government purchase annual in surance for each one qualified for medicare. He suggests that the Federal Government pay 85 per cent of the average $\$ 400$ state assume the balance. the Under this system, the dist the Federal Government woul be approximately $\$ 1$ billian more a year but would not be subject to unexpected escalation
 eliminate medicasd, which is problem to the Statek, and to operz.
The cost to thase who contribite to Slacial Security for insurance would be .4 per cent of their taxable earnings. ings would salaries or earn tax return. It is estimated tha receipts f.6m this source would total roughly $\$ 2$ billion annually which would go into a pool of funds from which the Social Security Administration would reimburse 90 per cent of medical expensds under a prescribed formula. Persons over 65 , because hey have medicare protection expenses, would apply to the extent of those actually paid by the individual in excess of 25 per cent of his gross income. The present medicare program is heavily burdened with large administrative costis involving processing rather small claims it takes about as much time and ffort to work out a small claim as it does one for catastrophic r high cost illnesk.
The American Medical Association recommends a type of prepaid insurance shared by the Federal Government and the vafouls States. Some hospital associations of which there are a number recommend a "group practice" system something like as is the present case. The parion a mutual insurance armangement.红
