



Enzyme Detergents and Skin Irritation

Do enzyme detergents cause skin allengies? Testing points out that enzyme laundry products are equal in safety and mildness to the detergents which have been in use for more than 20 years.

The amount of enzyme that can remain in clothing after it has been washed, rinsed and to dry, that they make painting dried is exceedingly low. As a matter of fact, the most sensitive analytical procedures cannot detect any enzyme residue in such clothing.

The reverse was true in five cases. Two men reported similar symptoms with both products. Thirty-nine showed no symptoms. The results indicated that

Feel That Urge to Paint Up? Sometimes you just can't stand it any longer—you simply have to do a few paint jobs around the house. And try to paint one piece of furniture, and see if you! can stop at that! You can't, of

It's fun to paint and you get such rewards from your efforts. The paints available today are Fip easy to apply, and so quick more sport than work. But it doesn't pay to rush into any paint job.

First, wash whatever it is you are going to paint. You may no-To further check for possible tice the light film of grime on may have become imbedded over the months or years. This can make your paint job uneven and the results disappointing.

> If you intend to do a reallythorough-going job, sand the surface before applying new paint. But if you're not paticular, at least start with a clean surface. Go over the piece with soap or detergent suds, rinse it with a damp sponge or cloth, and let it dry thoroughly before you pick up a paint brush. There's no sense in putting new paint over a dirty surface.

> And don't make the mistake of sticking the paint brush into a can of something or other after the job is finished—and leaving the brush there till next season! A good brush deserves good care. When latex paints are used, brushes may be washed in warm suds and rinsed thoroughly. For lother types, use a commercial solvent designed for the purpose. Be sure to get all the paint out of the bristles you possibly can. But don't stiop there. Wash the brush in warm suds. Rinse it thoroughly, and hang it up to

Tie a piece of string onto the handle. Let the bristles dry naturally, at room temperature or outdoors. When the brush is dry, wrap it in foil, or put it into a plastic bag. You'll be glad you took this extra trouble. A good paint brush can last for



County Agents News Column

about this time of the year. This seven to 10 days away. year is no exception.

Several people have asked when they should spray their pecan trees to control the pecan nut casebearer, the insect that feeds on the pecan nutlets Based on the casebearer emergence in the lower part of the state plus what we have found in local checks, the optimum spraying time is seven to 10 days away. The casebearer larvae are already in the nuts in South Texas. Our peak infestation period hits one to two weeks after the down state reports are received. The weather we have can change the peak period from one to several days. A few cool nights delays the maturity of the moth and also elongates the egg

We have found a few pupa in the twigs. These emerge as the adult moth, mature a few days then begin laying eggs. The eggs usually hatch in five to six days. Summing up the local situation, Interest in pecans increases the natch period appears to be

hatching period.

Comparing this year to last year, we have found fewer twigs infested with casebearer. hope this means a lighter infes-

Spraying twice will usually insure better control of the casebearer. Two applications, five days apart, starting with the first hatch is a good practice when the egg lay indicates a heavy infestation is eminent.

We found a few walnut caterpillar larvae feeding on pecan leaves. Again, present indications point to a lighter infestation than we experienced last year. Despite the outlook, the let us hear from you. only way to stay ahead of the casebearer and walnut caterpillar is to make daily checks in your pecan trees. Check the small nutlet for a single, pale white egg about the size of a small dot. These are casebearer eggs. Spraying should begin when you find one or more hatched and feeding on the side of and near the base of the nutlet. A small pile of fross will be visible when the casebearer begins feeding on the nutlets.

Check the foliage for frayed or stripped areas when checking for the walnut caterpillar. They hatch in mass and stay in a cluster to feed. If you find them one to three days after they hatch, usually you can remove them by breaking off one small twig. I have found all on one leaf. After they are a few days old, the cluster may be large

Rosette shows up at this time of the year on pecan trees. Be sure to add zinc sulfate to your casebearer or walnut caterpillar spray. A zinc deficient tree does not grow properly and will eventually die back to the tips of the limbs. One spraying per year is usually sufficient, but two applications will speed up the growth of your trees. Make the applications about a




