LOOPHOLE COSTS - State has lost millions in land revenue due to an old loophole in the law, which was temporarily closed last year.

State Land Office has been forced to sell submerged land for \$1 an acre to any navigation district that wanted it. Another law permitted district to declare land so acquired surplus to their needs and sell to the highest bidder.

So, Aransas County Navigation District, for example, acquired 604 acres near Rockport (in Little Bay) for \$1 an acre then resold to a corporation. Some 165 acres of property now is selling for \$33,098 an acre.

Now, no more state owned beaches, islands or submerged land may be sold or leased until the Interagency Natural Resources Council makes its final report to the legislature - or until May 31, 1973 - whichever date is first. Unless the legislature takes a permanent step, the Land Commissioner once more could be forced to sell land requested by navigation districts flor \$1 an acre.

GAS PRICE RISE URGED Federal Power Commission at hearings on natural gas prices in the Permian Basin was urged to end pricing controls or raise rates fast and substantially.

Commission examiner reopened the Permian Basin rate case that resulted in the establishment in 1965 of ceiling rates at well-head.

Witnesses, including producers and political officeholders, called upon the commission also to halt "two-price" system for wells drilled before 1961 and new wells.



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H D Agent's News Dept.

Foliage for arrangements during the winter months may be preserved by using glycerin. The leaves of many plants may be used to make interesting arrangements when flowers are not available from the garden.

The procedure is simple. Ah you need to do is stand the etems or leaves in a mixture of one part glycerin and two parts

Midsummer is a good time to get started on this project. The leaves will be in an active stage of growth and will rapidly absorb the glycerin. This usually takes about two to three weeks.

Many kinds of leaves may be preserved by the glycerin process. Magnolia, oak, peach, eucalyptus and poplar leaves are satisfactory. Of the shrubs, try barberry forsythia, summac, privet, rhododendron and rose leaves. The leaves of many perennial herbaceous plants may be used such as aspidistra, canna coral bell, genaniums, iris and devil's ivy. Leaves of small herbaceous plants may be submerged completely in a half and half glycerin-water solution.

Select only perfect specimens and waish the foliage with water to remove dirt or spray residue. If the material has woody stems, cut off the lower inch with a sloping cut before starting the treatment. Then stand the stems or leaves upright in a jar of the glycerin solution.

The leaves will change color as the solution is absorbed, and good air circulation and warm weather will speed up the absorption. Few tapes will adhere to a damp, porous surface, so before applying strips or patches to a bathtub, clean and thoroughly dry the tub. It should be allowed to stay dry for several hours after applying the tape.

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
