> County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs said Wednesday morning that 1,089 persons had registered.

Jacobs emphasized the fact that everyone, regardless of age, hal; to register in order to be eligible to vote in any election.

The tax assersor also is taking applications from young people between 18 and 21, who have recently been declared eligible to vote in federal election only by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Residents of the east side of the county may pick up applications at First National Bank in Bronte. They may fill them out and leave them at the bank or mail them to Jacobs' office.

Jacobs also called attention to the Jan. 31 deadline for paying state and county taxes without penalty and interest. The deadline also applies to city and school taxes.

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Changes Made In Welfare Program

The changes were implemented on Jan. 4, as follows:

1. Use of a simplified eligibility application in the adult programs old Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; and a "client-completed" form in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) pro-

2. A switch in social services from meeting long term needs to meeting short range, specific

3. A change in staffing patterns to allow the Department to meet the caseload explosion with available personnel.

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The new year saw three major, termining eligibility works much that the new staffing plans allow of them, without regard to in-

The applicant fills out the form himself, eliminating the need for a face to face interview with a caseworker.

"The procedure has built-in controls to guard against error and fraud," said Carrol D. Crum, regional administrator in San Angelo. "Extensive tests in three regions for approximately a year showed very little error. Less than one per cent of those applying and approved for assistance actually were ineligible.

"This simplified application shows faith in the dignity and responsibility of those who must ask for assistance," Welfare Commissioner Burton C. Hackney said. "On July 1, 1971, this method will be a mandatory federal requirement. Sheer numbers of applicants gave us the impetus

Hackney explained that pilot tests on a similar AFDC application produced "disappointing results," but that the Department is still trying to perfect the form.

"However," Hackney added, "the new client completed form will be a time saver. Applicants can meet in groups in which one capeworker can instruct them all to supply the necessary informa-

"Then each client will be contacted and the information verified in the traditional manner Of course applicants can still apply individually," he sad.

The change in philosophy on social services for families and chidren serves two purposes, Hackney explained.

It spreads the available staff further by limiting the length of time in which specific services

Comprehensive studies have shown that meeting a specific,

"Our new job is mainly a referral and counseling service to help people overcome the barriers that stand in the way of their reaching the community resources at their disposal," Crum continued.



Jack Scudder, Concho Valley Council commissioner, presented the awards during ceremonies at San Angelo Country Club. Recipients of the Silver Beaver citation are chosen by the National Council, Boy Scouts of America, for their outstanding service to boyhood, on recommendation of the local council's award committee.

Gene Hinnard has been secutmaster of Troop 461 for more than eight years, taking the job in 1962. He has worked four years in the Tri-Rivers District Leadership Training Program. The snacks, now commercially produced, are available in 2-sunce jars in many specialty food stores and supermarkets throughout the country.

Meats, Hosiery Sales Gain

Checkout registers in grocery stores clicked out \$73.2 billion in sales in 1969, according to private industry statistics.

Food sales, at \$53.4 billion, showed about the same 5 per cent gain they made the year be-

Nonfoods and alcoholic beverages, at \$19.8 billion, slowed their advance for the first time in several years. Sales gained only 3 per cent compared to 10 per cent in 1968.

Across the board, nearly all the sales increases in '69 came from price rises.

Gains in food sales ranged from about 3 to 7 per cent - with meat, poultry, flish and beverages the leaders. Higher prices were responsible for larger sales of meat and eggs. They also represented most of the increase in sales of poultry, fish, cereal and bakery items, and dairy products.

Among nonfoods, women's hosfery sales rose 17 per cent, and toys 4 per cent. Phonograph records, pet foods, and tobacco products gained slightly.

Soap, paper items and housewares held onto their traditional shares. But sales of a big, nonitemized category of mixed merchandise - some relatively new among grocery store offerings fell 41/2 per cent after sharp gains in preceding years.


