Robert Lee Housing Authority opened bids Tuesday afternoon on 12 new dwelling units which they propose to construct and operate along with the units already built. Four bids were received.

Apparent low bidder was C. C. Hoerster Construction Co. of San Angelo, who proposed to build the 12 units for \$139,340. Other bids included Rose Construction Co. of Abilene with a bid of \$149,900; Alston Construction Co. of Sweetwater, \$153,000; and Columbine Corp. of Midland, \$159,940.







Mayor Urges City Attention To Fire Hazards

Maya: Wilson Bryan told men. bers of the BCD Tuesday that the city fire marshal and other city officials have been busy this week making a survey of possible fire hazards in the city.

The need for care in fire protection was brought home in last week's disastnous fire at Brown Lumber & Supply. The mayor asked for the cooperation of everyone in the city in an effort to eliminate fire hazards, particularly dead vegetation and other trash close to buildings.

He urged, also, that residents of the city use covered containers for burning trash, and pointed out that butane tanks must be at least 10 feet away from buildings and 50 feet away from service stations.

The mayor emphasized the seriousness of fire threat which is especially dangerous now while everything is so dry.

Along this same vein, he mentioned that the city is not gaining much on its water problems, "but I think we are holding our own." He said city officials feel the method now being used of pumping water into the city lake

have been in consultation with Turkey and Iran in efforts to curb the illicit traffic of drugs to this Country. A subsidy to farmers of both countries to reduce acreage has been considered, with the U.S. contributing.

In the meantime, we are discussing with France her responsibilities of taking action agains' dope refineries. It seems some headway has been made but certainly more needs to be done.

Iran itself has a narcotics problem and has recently invoked the death penalty against peddlers convicted of a second offense. Iranian officials say that numbers continue to grow - the results in treatment appear doubtful.

This is not a dissertation on the moral question of the death penalty-a subject of many dimensions. It is, however, an issue currently debated in many tate legislatures. Also debated is the distinction for punishment between the possession of narcotics by the user and the possession by the dope pusher. There is obviously a great difference if it can be identified.

The observation of President Thomas Jefferson might be appropriate when he noted that 'the choice of two evils is often a necessity of political life." The most severe penalty on the dope peddler, as between the conversion of school children to drugs, is the lesser of evils. It is not a matter of the care of the criminal but rising to the defense of children.

For thousands of years, man has defined crimes against property and against his physical person. It remained for the scientific 20th century to produce crimes against the soul.






