House Revenue and Tax Committee was due to bring out its choice of wringing major new version of a revenue-sharing measure to balance a record budget.

Heart of the measure is a raise in the sales tax rate from 3.25 per cent to four per cent Burleigh of Austin, longtime head (good for \$300 million in additional biennial revenue) and an tion activities in Texas, will beincrease in motor vehicle sales come executive director of the tax from three to four per cent Texas Water Development Board (for another \$70 million).

Proposal to be advanced to the House floor for debate reportedly will include:

- * An increase of 50 cents (to \$3.75) per \$1,000 in the corporation franchise tax rate, \$26 mil-
- * Extension of the sales tax to repairs, laundry, dry cleaning, haircuts and beauty shop services, \$100 million.
- * Sales tax on amusements, including professional sports and tourist attractions, \$35 million.
- * An increase in hotel tax from three to four per cent, \$4 mil-
- * Sales tax on telephone and telegraph bills, \$40 million.

House already has passed a bill to raise out of state students' tuition at state supported colleges and universities from \$200 to \$700 a semester and a \$185 million band bill to finance new college building. Neither measure has moved beyond sub-committee in the Senate.

Under Nixon's plan, the state would be required to pass on 47.9 per cent of its receipts from Washington to local governments via a complex formula. For example, the city of Austin would get \$2.2 million, Travis County \$604,000; the city of San Antonio would receive \$4.68 million and Bexar County \$1.16 million.

Officials warned these figures may not be completely reliable, for federal grants in aid may be

Reports from Washington indicate efforts by the administration to reach a workable compromise on revenue sharing.

VETERANS LAND PROGRAM REVIVED - Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong signed the first three loan commitments to veterans from Jasper, Brownwood and Fort Worth under the newlyreactivated Veterans' Land Pro-

More than 4,500 veterans have requested application forms and information booklets since the program reopened Feb. 1. More than 225 loan applications have been received in the land office, and are being processed, Armstrong reported.

Veterans Land Program began operations again this year after \$25 million in additional state bonds finally were sold.

PENAL CODE REVISE HIT-Attorney General Martin joined leading state prosecutors in urging the Legislature to put off passage of a proposed penal code revision for two years,

Dallas District Atty. Henry Wade blasted the code at a committee hearing as a "monstrosity" which would make it more difficult for law officers to do their jobs.

Martin said a five year study by the State Bar has been available to the public only about two months and that there is not enough known about what it

RATES PROTESTED - A crowd of 500 turned out for the February 23 special hearing to protest a 14 per cent auto insurance rate hike.

Witnesses accused the State Board of Insurance of working "hand in glove" with insurance companies.

Board members, irked at the heated protests, said they had met the test of applying fair and reasonable rates. While the new hearing for a Cameron public was blasting the Board about setting rates too high, the industry grumbled threats of filing legal action attacking them as too low.


