HOSPITAL CONSTRUCTION RUSHED - A multi-million dollar construction program due for completion this spring will provide more and better facilites for Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.





Barnes' staff calculates Aid to Families with Dependent Children rolls are increasing by 3.10 per cent per month. Where 288,826 AFDC beneficiaries are anticipated by Sept. 1 this year, 906,236 are seen by Aug. 31, 1973. The latter figures would bring the AFDC cost to \$76 million a year -\$16 million above the proposed new \$55 million annual ceiling to be voted ion May 18.

The Lieutenant Governor also noted that Medicaid costs have increased from \$22 million in 1968 to an estimated \$144 million for next year. He said state medical services to the needy financed through Blue Cross family insurance policies which will cost nearly \$72 per family next year-are better than those received by all but the very wealthy.

"I am convinced we are going to have to reduce the cost, or the state is going bankrupt," said Barnes.

A bill to create a special pool to guarantee coverage to property owners in "catastrophe areas" (subject to hurricanes, tornadoes and other diaster) won final passage. The pool will be effective May 14. A pool arrangement may be ordered later for fire and explosion insurance if that is found difficult to obtain in some areas. Another major bill passed by the Senate would create a statewide guaranty fund to assure payment of claims against insurance companies which go broke. Hospital-medical insurance policyholders, under a House passed bill, could be reimbursed for treatment by any licensed, qualified practitioner of the healing arts-physicians, osteopaths, dentist, chiropractors, optometrists and doctors of podiatry.

As our society becomes more compact and State lines less distinguishable, uniformity in matters of safety, pollution and other problems not especially peculiar to any community or State. may become desirable, if not necessary, to be efficient and effective. On the other hand, this trend toward Federal direction is further eroding States' authority and control.

Take automobile insurance as an example. It is not the fault of the local agent that our automobile insurance is high and seems to be getting higher. His rates are fixed and he can do nothing about it. Complaints of cost increases and difficulty in settlement of claims is nationwide.

Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe established the Administration's position favoring a modest start in the "nofault" insurance concept. This concept provides that no matter who is at fault in an automobile accident the claimant collects. This, it is reasoned, would provide faster adjustments, reduce bureaucracy and court litigation in many cases. The theory is that it would eliminate costs all along the line and thus trim cost of insurance. Actually, there is little experience to provide guidance for this idea. Massachusetts, from which State Secretary comes, has had "no-fault" insurance since last January. A number of States have the matter under consideration by their Legislatures. Senator Hart of Michigan has offered a bill which would in fact, nationalize the idea. His Committee has held a series of hear-

There seems to be some parallel between these ideas. Would it encourage irresponsibility, sometimes maybe on the part of the victim as well as the trespasser?

Whatever may develop toward a more equitable system of auto insurance or indemnity for the victims of crime, nothing to reward the wrongdoer should be included.






