Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, having headed the FBI all these years, of elight Presidents without ever having the criticism which has recently been heaped upon him. At the age of 76, he is vigorous, alert and unquestionably dedicated to serving the best interest of our country.
In 1917 J. Edgar Hoover was a 22 year old lawyer who became Assistant Attorney General in the
Department of Justice Seven Department of Justice. Seven
years later the Attorney at that time, Harlan Fiske Stone, appointed Mr. Hoover as Directo of the Bureau of Investigation He was directed to reconstruct the Bureau "According to the highest ethical and executive standards and remove all actions from partisan politios." He was instructed to remove from the Bureau any man as to whose character there was any ground
for suapicion. Mr. Hoover with drew the Bureau from all extralegal activities and made it an efficient organization for the investigation of criminal offens gainst the United States. In 1934 the FBI, adapting t the wave of Federal crime, par robberies, became the national law enforcement arm of the United States. Under law it assumed the internal security pro-

decline, Mr. Hoover has remain ed an American symbol of lav and order. Striving for exce lence and integrity for the entire organization, he has himself

The FBI does not conduct its usiness apart from other law
