## Pros and Cons of Constitutional Amendments Given

(Editar's Note: Below is a
short analysis of each of short analysis of each of the
four Comstitutional Amendments four Comstitutional Amendments
which are to be vited on Tuesday, May 18. The amendments are discussed for and against and no attempt is made to tell vot-
ers how they should decide no atte
ers ho
them.)

| Amendment No. 1 <br> Establishing a State Ethics Commisision empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the legislature, state officers, and legislative officers and to invertigate violations; to recommend ompensation far members of the legislature and the lieutenant governor; and to recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process. <br> ARGUMENTS FCR: servants of the citizens of A s members of the Legislature should be required to give an accounting of their stewardship. This amendment, which embrace: many of the recommendations of the Speaker's Committee of 100 to imprave ethics, standards conduct, and compensation of members of the leglislature, provides a tool for this type of accounting and a commission to regulate enflorcement. (2) It should go far toward improving public confidence in state officials and legislative officers with its potovision requiring them to file with the State Ethics Commisson a sworn financial statement within 10 days of taking office. (3) It would make it unethical for a state official to receive any compensation during his term other than his compensation from the state. It wtould make possible for the commission torecommend salaries that whuld |

Providing that the legislatur may propose amendments to the regular sessions of the legtila regular
ARGUMENTS FOR: (1) The Texas Constitution of 1876 is old and unwieldy and situations arise requently that require emergency action, and present restric-
tions limiting proposed amend ments to the regular biennia sessions could cause an unneces sary wait for the needed chang
es. Recent welfare crises in th state Recent welfare crises in the state have served to emphasize ars of the constitution had in mind that ease of amending the constitution would lead to ill-ad vised and too frequent changes However, the fact that it has is invalid and the limitation only serves to slow the processes of and government.
ARGUMENTS AGAINST: (1) The constitution has been amended too frequently, even with the restriction. Often the constitu when is ill-advisedly amended or an amendment of the statute have better met the needs Only matters submitted by the governor can be acted on in the cial sessions, with the call fre quently flor the purpose of solv ing deadlocks on such matters as appropriations and taxation, and submitting controversial proposed amendments during the
short session would be a furthe complication and lead to mor contro
ings.

dent children and the caretak-
eis of such children.
ARGUMENTS FOR: (1) Texas
Department of Public Welfare receiling, funds allocated for pubic welfare assistance grants will lic welfare assistance grants will
be exhausted shortly after the be exhausted shortly after the
amendment election. It should be approved to prevent a drastic cut in aid to welfare recipients working an extreme hardship on those who have little or no other means of subsistence. (2) I would remove inflexible limita tions on welfare expenditures for the needy aged, blind and dis abled which have caused welfar crises time and time again. Most rexans have no quarrel with th public assistance. (3) The dan er of "run-away" appropriation o needy dependent children and their caretakers is removed by the proposed amendment's proviston for a $\$ 55$ million ceiling on stat funds granted to these recipientr (4) Legislatons voted $27-4$ in the Senate and 122-17 in the Hyus approving the proposed amend nent, showing an overwhelming confidence in the amendment's provisions.
ARGUMENTS AGAINST: (1) Welfare costs are spiraling up ward, and unless a halt is called and larger tax burden. In the current period of inflation the tight money, it might be wise to seek cost-saving reforms in the welfare programs. (2) The entire program of welfare, since ules and regulations are mad in Washington, should be the function lof the federal govern ment and should be financed en rely by taxes already being col ected at the federal level. Defea of this amendment could do much are where it belongs, in the fed ral budget. (3) Although ther ans on state welfare rolls, ther re also many "freeloaders," and no more latitude should be per mitted under the Texas Constitu
tion until welfare reforms are in
stituted that will remove $t$ h 'freeloaders."

Authorizing the issuance of vion million in bonds to prond ather public agencies for wa er quality enhancement purpos s; provding for the improvemen and continuance of the water reources pnogram, and establish ing an interest ceiling on Water evelopment Bonds at 6 per cent ARGUMENTS FOR: (1) Tex as' future depends upon the uality and supply of its water This amenament would make ore funds available to assist 10 al governments in providing fa lities to treat and dispose of astes, enhancing bath the qual ty and quandity of the state' water. (2) Adoption would make possible for the state to rea ze a greater return on tax dol lars going to Washington, since he federal matching share of costs would increase from a max num 30 per cent up to a maxi num of 55 per cent, as the state nters the program with grants and loans. (3) Increase in the naximum interest rate from o 6 per cent, would make it pos-
sible for the Water Development Eoard to sell the bonds in today's etitive bond market
ARGUMENTS AGAINST: (1) Interest which the state will inder the provisions of this amendment will increase the revenue responsibilities of the stat $t$ a time when it already ha serious financial and taxation problems. (2) Adoption would permit cties, townis and other political subdivisions to pass on o the state another financial urden which is their responsibil ty and they should bear them it. (3) Interest rates in the ffter a number of yous down tinuing to rise It appears unwise to raise the interest ceiling just when rates in general
