May is Senior Citizen Month, so for the benefit of older persons and for the information of all homemakers, here are some Food Tips that should prove useful, if used.

L-o-n-g life is a common thing now. In fact, one in 10 Americans has passed his 65th birth-

One problem for many of these folks, according to the needs they expressed in over 800 Community Forums held across Texas last year, is meeting adequate nutritional requirements.

There are several common problems in older people's dietis. They forget to eat or eat too little. Very limited snack type modles, rice and spagnetti are meals of "tea 'n' toast" or "bread included in this group. 'n' butter" often replace regular, more balanced meals.

Others have dental problems and the need for various kinds of textures in food is important. Weight watching, special diets and wise spending of the food dollar also give special concern to senior citizens.

Above all, following the basic four food groups for proper eating is as much a must for the older peron as a younger one. The groups include milk, meat, vegetables and fruits, and breads and cereals.

The milk group is composed o milk and milk products, such as margarine, or car grease can be buttermilk, canned and dried removed from washable fabrics milk, cheese and ice cream.
