Removing Mustard Stains Spring means home runs, roaring crowds, hot dogs with lots of mustard-and perhaps a
Mustard, because of its chemical makeup, is one of the hardest stains to remove. Treat mustard stains as soon as possible. If you don't, and the stain is left in the garment for several days, it is almost impossible to remove.
To remove mustard from washable fabrics, rub soap or detergent into the dampened stain then rinse. If the stain is not removed, soak the article in a hot detergent solution for several hours lor overnight if necossury. If the stain sthin remains, use a bleach. Bu fabric has a permanent press or wrinkle resistant finish, unless the manufacturer states on the label that chlorine bleach is safe.
For non-washable articles, sponge the stain with alcohol. But first, test the fabric for color fastness by sponging alcohol on the seam allowance or scrap of material. A non-washable article may also be sent to a professional drycleaner, but be sure to tell him what the stain is.
