### **New Laws Affect** State Boat Owners

Boat owners in Texas will operate under new rules as a result of actions of the 62nd Legislature.

Of immediate interest to boaters is the new law requiring children 12 years old or under riding in a Class 1 or Class A motorboat while underway to wear life preservers of the sort the Commandant of the Coast Guard.

The only such approved life preserver is a U. S. Coast Guard approved preserver.

If a boat is underway, and if the child does not have the life preserver, the operator will be ticketed, says the new law.

The new law does not apply to canoes, rowboats or sailboats, but these boats after Sept. 1,

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

### condensens. Canned foods will keep as long as nothing happens to the container to make it leak. Extremely long periods of storage at high temperatures may result in some loss in color, flavor, appearance and nutritive value, but the foods will remain wholesome. A regular turnover about once a year, however, is best.

Unused portions of canned foods can be stored in the refrigerator in the can. Acid foods, such as grapefruit juice, may dissolve a little iron from the can if they stand in the refrigerator for a long time. This is not harmful, but it does produce an unpleasant taste. So if you aren't going to use an acid product within a short time, at's best to empty the contents into some other container. As new fruit and vegetable crops are harvested and processed, storage space in the supermarket is in demand. As a result, processed foods are often offered at special prices, such as four or five cans for a dol-


