
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
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

State Supreme Court agreed with an Aug. 2 Austin district court finding that a House redistricting bill passed this year is unconstitutional because it unnecessarily split up 23 counties.

> Since Aug. 30, any industry that will emit air contaminants into the atmosphere must get a Board permit before starting construction. Similar permits are necessary to modify or change existing contaminant causing facilities.



Dual Sleep

Homemakers with a living space problem now have a handy solution—the dual sleep unit.

A dual sleep unit is a sofa that is also a bed by design and purpose. The units have become so popular that in 1969 they totaled \$3 million in sales.

When shopping for a dual sleep unit, know where it will be used in the home, and know what you're looking for.

First, consider a design that will be in harmony with room decor. Fabric choice is important for color coordination, texture and easy care properties.

Another tip in shopping is the sit test. Sit and see which unit is best. Consider the height of seat from the floor, height of arms, and depth of seat. Bolstens and cushions lessen the seat depth for the person seated. Two constructions available are tight back, with no cushions, and softer back with cushions.

Check for ease of operation, by opening and closing the unit while at the store. Also try the mattress to see if it offers adequate body support.

Once the unit is purchased and on it's way home, placement is the next factor to consider. Since the units are usually not as long als sofas (they range from love seat size, 64-66 inches, to 84 inches long), they should be located along a short wall. If the spot selected is along a long wall, you

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may want to flank the setting with a low chest of drawers, arm height, on one side and a large lamp commode on the other. These pieces, rather than slim end tables, will add more weight and importance to the grouping, and also provide extra storage area.

Once placed in a room, allow enough space to open the unit without too much shifting of furniture. Choose coffee squares or snack tables instead of a long, heavy cocktail table.

If the unit is to stand free, back it with a slim sofa table to hold blocks, magazines and a lamp to enhance importance to the grouping.

While sofas are frequently placed in front of windows, it is not practical for a dual sleep unit unless blinds and draperies will give adequate protection from daylight and sunshine.

Also, avoid placing the dual sleep unit on a wood flooor unless the legs are cupped. Cupping prevents the furniture from "traveling" when it is being opened.

Appliance Product Guarantees Be sure to read the product guarantee before purchasing a new appliance.

Certain performance and quality characteristics, things the consumer can expect from the product, are stated in the guarantee. And, it will specify remedial action to take if the product fails to live up to promised performance or quality.

Consider four important points about the guarantee before making a final decision.

First, does it dover the entire product or only certain parts? If only particular parts are guaranteed, decide if these are the important parts.

The guarantee should state who is responsible for appliance repair — the manufacturer, the dealer or a service agency. Check to see that the address of the seller or manufacturer responsible for repair is given. Also determine if it is physically and economically practical to return the product for service or repair



Washington - If much of our, ion. Strange. foreign aid is not already wholly ridiculous and asinine, it has been made worse by recent action of the House of Representativels.


The Foreign Aid Authorization Bill, passed by the House and now before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, contains a section which prohibits military assistance to Greece because the country is run by a military junta considered to be a repressive relating to the recording and redictatorship by the "liberals."

At the end of World War II and for several years thereafter, Greece was in a civil war. At least it was called that but it was obvious that it was not all OF TEXAS: Greek fighting Greek. The 300 joins communist Albania, Yugoslavia and Bulgaria. Elements of these countries joined the Greek communists to bring that nation behind the Iron Curtain with them.

With military aid from the U. S., the non-communists of Greece were able to stand and today it is the only Balkan nation outside the Iron Curtain.

If this personal reference may be pardoned, some 23 years ago, from a front line vantage point, I saw Greeks loyal to their country defending it. Finally a stable government was established and they have been our friends through turbulent times since.

Greece is a strategic imperative in the Mediterranean. She is the anchor of NATO. While flanked by two other NATO nations, Turkey and Italy, these latter show an instability which, to say the least, is not encouraging. The ports of Greece are really the only places in the Eastern Mediterranean where our

Greece took this dourse in April 1967, at a time when again a communist takeover was considered imminent. No one has to approve of this type of government but the fact remains Greece is our friend and vital to the defense of that strategic area.

The same voices of condemnation of Greece are not directed against the dictatorships of Yugoslavia, the Red juntas in Algeria, Syria, Libya and othersnot Red China or the Soviet Un-


