## New Cars To Show This Week

### Vaughan to Show New Chevrolets Here Thursday

New 1972 Chevrolets will go on display in Robert Lee today (Thursday) at Vaughan Chevrolet Co. The local firm, owned by Bob Vaughan and Ben Bessent, will have a number of the new models on display and invite everyone in the area to come by and inspect them.

Free coffee and doughnuts will be served to those attending. There will be free gifts for the children and yardsticks will be given to adults.

In a release from General Motors, the new Chevrolets were described as follows:

## Sanco P. O. to Close Oct. 15

The Regional Postmaster General, Southern Region, United States Postal Service, Memphis, Tennessee, has authorized the discontinuance of the Sanco Post Office at the close of business October 15, 1971.

The above notice was posted at Sanco Monday morning of this week. It followed by several weeks the request of Mrs. Josephine R. Bird, present postmaster, for retirement. Closing of the post office is in line with the policy of the postal service to discontinue all fourth class offices of this size upon the resignation, retirement, or death of the postmaster.

The order from the Regional Office was transmitted by Edgar L. Lee, San Angelo postmaster, who is also acting manager, Section 769 of the postal service which includes the San Angelo area.

In the letter of transmittal, Lee said, "Customers not already served by the star route will have the option of receiving their

mail in Robert Lee or erecting an approved rural type box on the right hand side of the current line of travel at the place most convenient for them."

Lee advised customers to notify correspondents of their change of address effective Oct. 16. Forms for doing this are being placed in the boxes at Sanco.

The Sanco post office was established July 9, 1888, about a year before Coke County was organized and was the second post office established in the area now Coke County, Fort Chadbourne being the first. The Fort Chadbourne office has been discontinued for many years.

With the opening of the present townsite, the office was moved to it in 1907 and located just across the road south of the present location. It was operated there by O. L. Tubb, followed by Will Campbell and L. C. Clevenger.

Discontinued in the early 20s, it was re-opened when H. J. Gartman established a store in the present building. Mr. Gart-

man served for 24 years, the longest term of any Sanco postmaster.

Upon his retirement, his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Alta Gartman, was appointed and moved the office to her residence, which was then in the old school building. Upon her resignation in 1952, Ulmer Bird was appointed and served until it was transferred to Mrs. Bird June 1, 1955.

Mr. Bird moved the office back to the store building and re-opened the store, which they have operated for 19 years. The Birds have announced that the building, which they own, will not be abandoned. Although they will give most of their attention to their ranch east of Sanco, the building will be maintained and used, according to their announcement.

Mail service will be by the star route, and address will be Sanco Route, Robert Lee, Texas 76945.

Operation of the store will be discontinued along with the post office.

# Steers Dehorn Longhorns, 28-0

The Steers retained the Ocke County championship with an awesome 2nd half ground attack that simply overpowered the Bronte Longhorns Friday night. Final score was 28-0. The passing attack was also very effective as sophomore quarterback Bill Rowoldt hit on key plays. As usual the defense was still the thing as it limited the Longhorns to 67 yards rushing.

There were many outstanding plays in the game, but the interior line of Box, Conley, Castillo, Burns and Mauldin enabled the Steer backs to roll up 317 yards rushing and that ain't bad. Johnny Wolfe made an outstanding pass reception and also intercepted two passes. Rudy Abalos played an exceptional game offensively but more impressive was his defensive play. Mumford and Percifull made a good line-busting combination as they combined for 207 yards rushing.

#### First Quarter

The Steers won the opening kickoff and Rowoldt returned to the Steer 47 yard line. The Steers were eager and an offside penalty and 3 short running plays netted very little, so they were forced to punt. Mumford punted high to the Bronte 15 and there was no return. The Longhorns couldn't move and punted to the Steer 42 yard line. But again the fired up Longhorns held and Mumford had to punt again. The ball carried to the Bronte 23 with no return.

Bronte made the first 1st down of the game at their 33. On 3rd down Bronte went to the air and Johnny Wolfe intercepted and returned to the Bronte 23 yard line. The Steers drove in two plays to the Bronte 11 yard line but the ball was fumbled and Bronte recovered. Bronte came alive on the recovery and drove for two 1st downs to their 37 as the 1st quarter ended.

#### Second Quarter

Then the Steers got tough and held at this point, Bronte punted to the Steer 30 and Rowoldt returned to his 45. The Steers put together their first good drive and three 1st downs later they were at the Bronte 21 yard line. But a 5 yard penalty didn't help matters and the Steers stalled. A field goal attempt failed and Bronte got the ball at the 20.

Bronte made a 1st at the 31, but they were stopped at the 35 and quick kicked to the Steer 20 yard line. On the next series Rowoldt unloaded a 33 yard pass to Wolfe at the Bronte 43. On the next series Rowoldt faked the ball too well and the ball was blown dead at the line of

scrimmage, stopping the Steer drive. The Steers got the ball back as Rowoldt intercepted a pass and returned to the Bronte 20. The Steers drove for a 1st at the 9 yard line and from the 5 yard line Percifull plunged over with 30 seconds left in the half. The extras failed and it was 6-0. After the kickoff, the 1st half ended.

#### Third Quarter

Bronte received the 2nd half kickoff and returned to their 38. Again the Steers held and Bronte kicked to the Steer 35. Then Mumford racked up 19 yards to the Bronte 44. Another 1st at the Bronte 32, then again at the 20. With another 1st at the 10, a plunge was made to the 7. From the 7, Mumford followed his blockers over left tackle and scored. Abalos kicked the extra point and it was now 13-0.

Doug Herford kicked off to the Bronte 15 with a return to the Longhorn 32. Bronte made a 1st at the 50 yard line on a penalty call? But the Steers got the ball back as Wolfe intercepted again and returned to the Bronte 45. The Steers drove for a 1st at the Bronte 30. On the 1st down play a little razzle daz-

zle and Rudy Abalos scooted around right end for another Steer TD. A Rowoldt pass to Abalos for the extras and the score moved up to 21-0.

Herford kicked off to the Bronte 15 and it was returned to their 37. Bronte got a little assist as a 15 yarder gave them a 1st at the Bronte 49. But the Steers held and Bronte punted to the Steer 15 with a return to the 26. The Steers made another 1st at the 42. Then Bronte intercepted a deflected pass and returned to their 48. Bronte moved for a 1st at the Steer 42. Then at the 35, the defense held and Bronte punted out of bounds at the Steer 3 yard line. The ball was moved to the 5 as the quarter ended.

#### Fourth Quarter

The Steers started the last quarter with a ground eating attack that ate up the yardage behind the Steer front wall. A 1st at the 20, then to the 43, then to the Bronte 44 and on to the 34. At that point, the Steers pulled a goodie—a fake to the middle by Rowoldt and Mumford, and Rowoldt dropped back and hit Randy Flanagan running wide open and he just coasted in for

the TD. Doug Herford kicked the extra point and the score stood at 28-0.

Herford kicked off to the Bronte 20 with a return to the Bronte 37 yard line. Bronte made a 1st at the 50 yard line. Next play they fumbled and Burl Davis redovered at the Bronte 49. The Steers made some more 1st downs down to the Bronte 8 yard line. A bad hand-off at that point brought on a Steer fumble and Bronte recovered at the 13. Bronte made a 1st at their 34, but the Longhorns fumbled again and Lyn Sockwell redovered at the Bronte 36. The Steers drove for a 1st at the Bronte 21. Then with just a few seconds left, Rudy Abalos skirted left end and was

knocked out of bounds at the 1 yard line as the game ended—28-0.

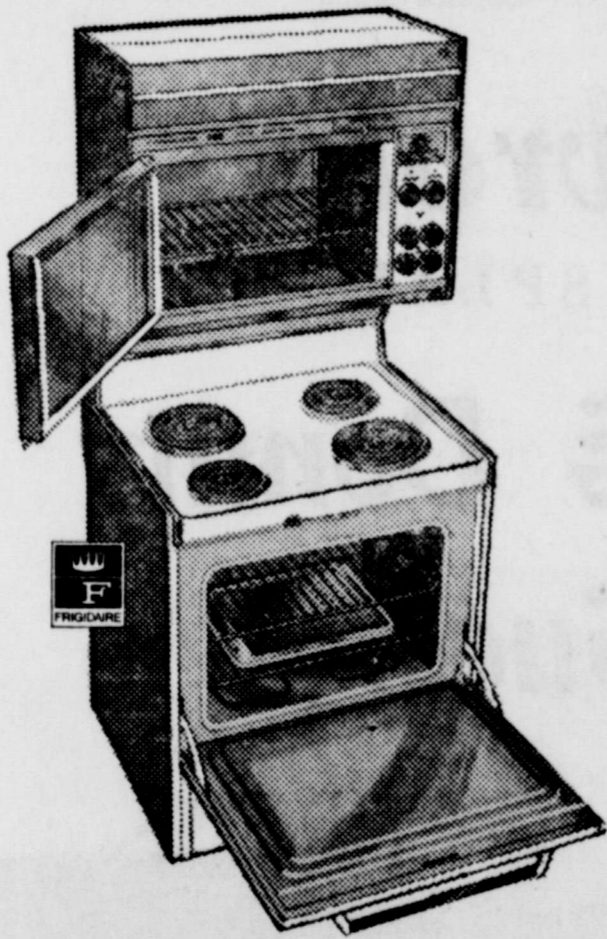

AN ACT

relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in re-registering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485, and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three

several days in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

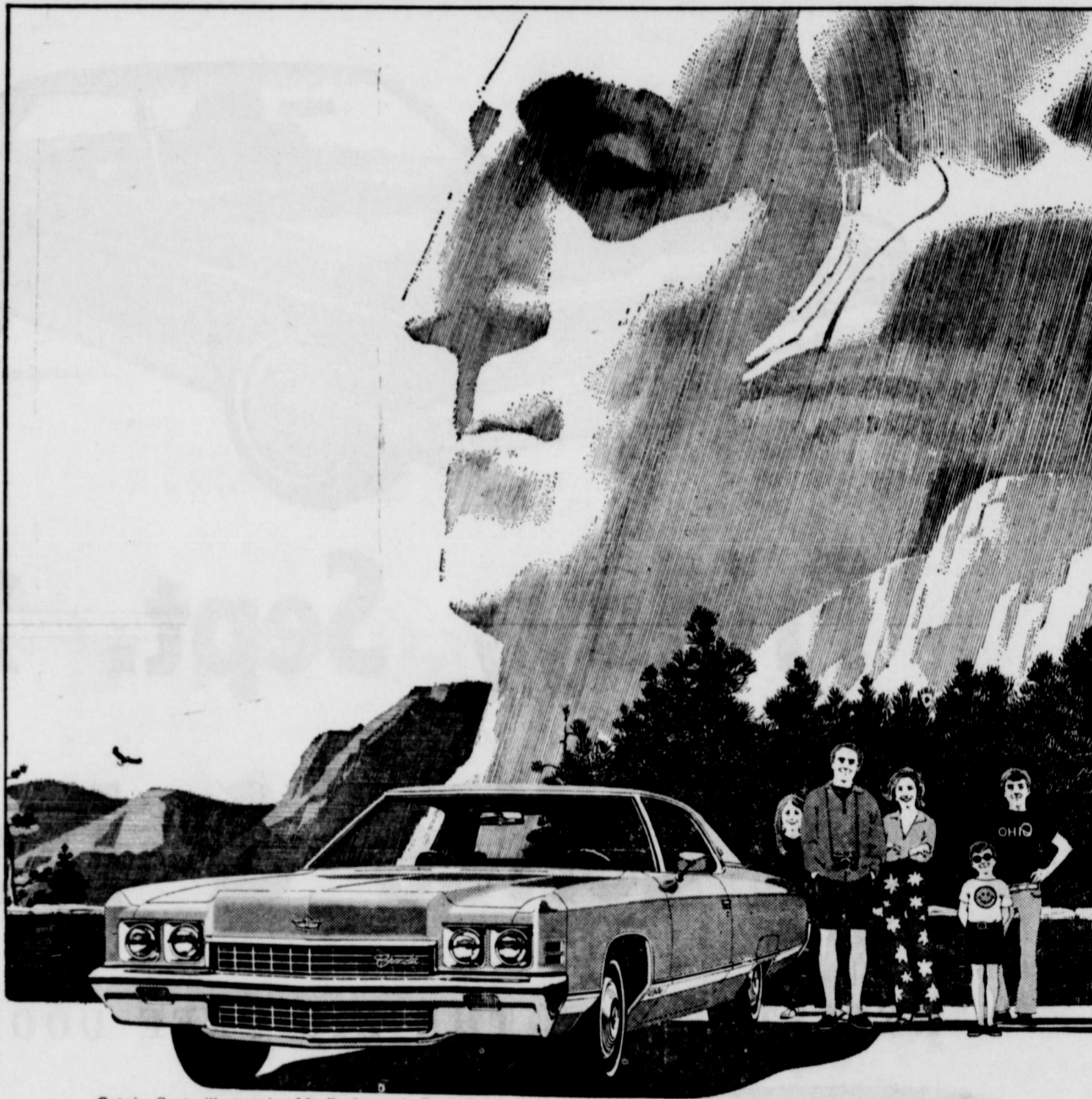

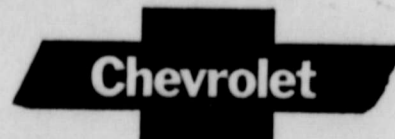

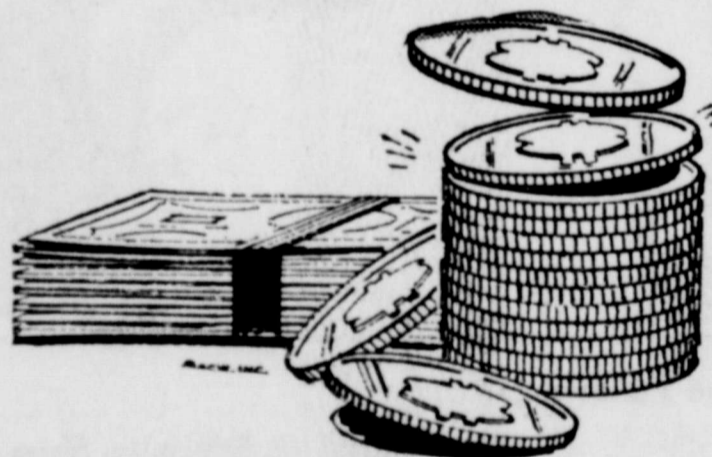
