* That it should order a five member Legislative Redistricting \$2.00 Board to perform "its constitutional duty" and reapportion the House in line with the 1970 cen-

> * That it should prohibit the Board from reapportioning either House or Senate on the grounds that the new census has not been completely published and that redistricting thus should be delayed until 1973.

* That 150 single member House districts are required.

* That single member districts are not required as long as they do not cause discrimination
