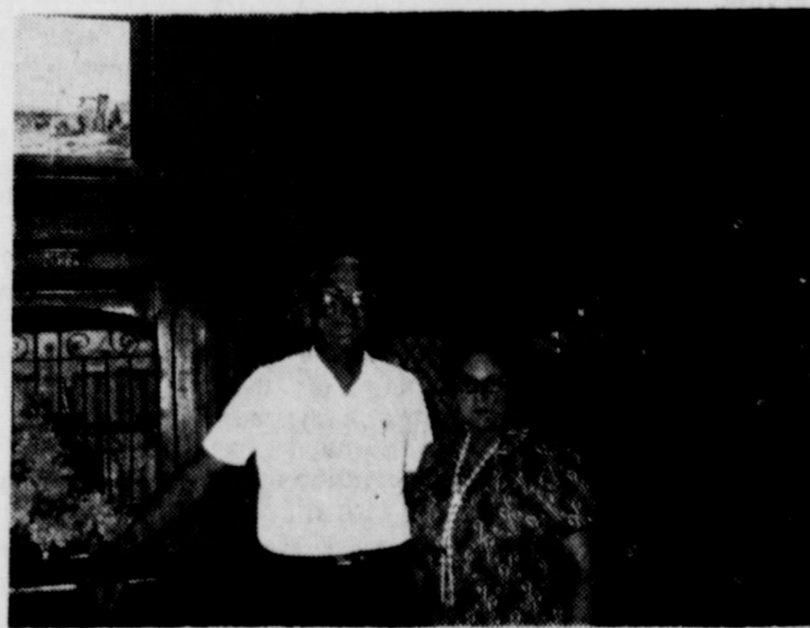

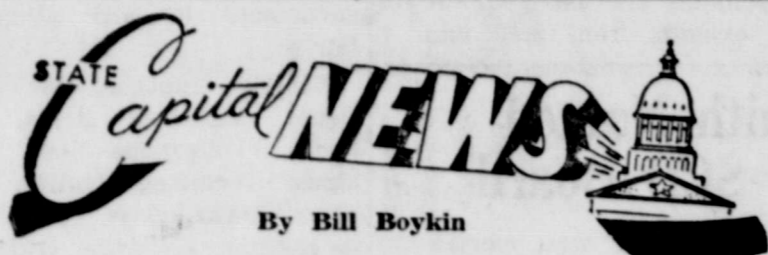
It's time to give some serious thought to the repair of our paved streets. Let the commissioners court know your feelings.



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Austin — Organized labor leaders of Texas have set as political priorities for 1972 the defeat of President Nixon and support of former U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough for any office he seeks.

AFL-CIO State President Roy R. Evans announced the goals were adopted by his organization's executive board and the COPE administrative committee in a recent meeting here.

It is "quite possible," Evans said, the AFL-CIO will make no endorsements in next year's governor's race unless Yarborough is a candidate. He noted a two-thirds majority of delegate strength is necessary for endorsement in a COPE convention.

AG OPINIONS — Texas' nepotism laws are applicable to regional planning commissions and their employees, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

County commissioners may purchase or lease and maintain two-way radio equipment for the sheriff and his deputies, but not for a Parks and Wildlife Department game management officer.

* New law did not change the duty of the Upshur County clerk to write warrants in payment of the salaries of county employees and county bills authorized by law and approved by the commissioners court.

* A bill providing that county commissioners courts of each county shall fix the amount of compensation, office expenses, travel expenses and all other allowances for county and precinct officials and employees paid wholly from county funds is valid.

FEED LOT SHUT DOWN — Texas Water Quality Board ordered a cattle feeding operation near San Marcos shut down when it found a 'constant threat of pollution' to underground water in the Edwards Aquifer.

The Edwards Aquifer is a major source of water for a large area of South Central Texas.

Attorneys for the feedlot, Hill Country Feeders, said the decision will be appealed to state district court.

COURTS SPEAK — The widow and mother of a Mexico air crash victim are entitled to collect \$36,579 on his life insurance policy though he had requested it to be discontinued five days before his death, the State Supreme Court held.

Court of Criminal Appeals held a 1967 U. S. Supreme Court decision guaranteeing defendants the right to subpoena accomplice witnesses to testify for them can be applied retroactively. The finding may provide a new way to freedom for prisoners convicted before 1967 and denied testimony of accomplices to the offense for which they were charged.

Criminal Appeals Court upheld a 1,000 year prison sentence for a repeated offender convicted in Dallas of robbery by assault, but the Court suggested such sentences are "impossible" and should not be assessed.

Same Court credited a prisoner with time he did not serve behind bars when he was earlier released by mistake.

OYSTERING REOPENED — A large part of Lavaca Bay which was closed last year to oyster harvesting due to mercury contamination has been reopened.

However, the State Department of Health said blue crab should not be taken for human consumption until further notice.

Excessive mercury densities are still found in some blue crab collected from the bay, the Health Department reported.

There has been a steady reduction in mercury densities found in oysters (which can cleanse themselves as the quality of their environment improves), according to the Department.

SCHOOL FOOD PROGRAM CURBED — A free breakfast program for school children faces insufficient funding, a Texas Education Agency spokesman reports.

TEA has been unable to add schools to the breakfast program this year due to lack of money. About 115 schools have had to be turned down. Schools participating last year increased from 298 in September to 474 in May. Schools receive 15 cents per

breakfast or the cost of each meal, whichever is less, through U. S. Department of Agriculture allocations.

DRAFT CALL SET—The Texas draft call for the rest of 1971 is 588 men. State Selective Service Director Col. Melvin N. Glantz announced.

None will be ordered for induction in October, 363 in November and 195 in December. All are from extended first priority groups.

Glantz said the RSN cut off for 1971 would be 125 men in the first priority group.

Orders for induction for the call were mailed by local boards throughout Texas, with 30 days notice required in all cases. About 6,400 men will be ordered for pre-induction physical examinations in October and November.

Short Snorts

Dr. Elmer Baum of Austin resigned as State Democratic Executive Committee chairman, and

SDEC set a Wednesday (Oct. 20) meeting in Dallas to pick a successor. Latest reports indicate that Roy Orr of DeSoto is favored for the spot.

Legislative Redistricting Board, after coming up with a Senate redistricting scheme, is racing to beat the clock and complete House of Representatives reapportionment by Oct. 23 deadline.

Governor Smith declined to call a special legislative session "for any purpose" after a telephone poll of House members.

Jim Kane, state Republican party executive director, said the GOP expects to pick up 20 to 30 Texas House seats next year if redistricting lines are "drawn right."

Vacuum Cleaners

To make housework easier and more pleasant, consider a lightweight upright or portable vacuum cleaner.

Portable vacuum cleaners are suited for above the floor dusting and cleaning, while lightweight cleaners, called stick cleaners or electric brooms, are best for pickup cleaning of floors and rugs.

Consumers using attachments on standard cleaners will find the portable hand vacuum cleaner more convenient and quite effective. These hand cleaners usually weigh 4-9 pounds and are suitable for cleaning furniture, mattresses, lamps, draperies, stairs and automobiles.

The portable cleaner can be hand-held or hung from the shoulder by a strap. Larger models will also rest on the floor and can be pulled by their hoses.

Hand vacuum cleaners are usually not built for heavy duty cleaning. Suction is normally inadequate for heavy cleaning, and the smaller the bag, the less dirt it will hold.

When shopping for a portable cleaner, check for ease in handling by lifting it and strapping it over your shoulder.

Lightweight upright stick cleaners or electric brooms look much like a slimmed down version of the standard upright. They are mobile, easy to use and easily stored.

Some lightweight models have power driven revolving brushes for carpet cleaning efficiency. Not intended for heavy duty cleaning, they are effective substitutes for

a broom or dust mop in picking up dirt.

Bright colors and sophisticated designs characterize the new lightweight cleaner. These colors and designs are psychological lifts to the drudgery of cleaning. But most important are the features which contribute to the vacuum's performance, including flexibility, safety and ease of use and storage.

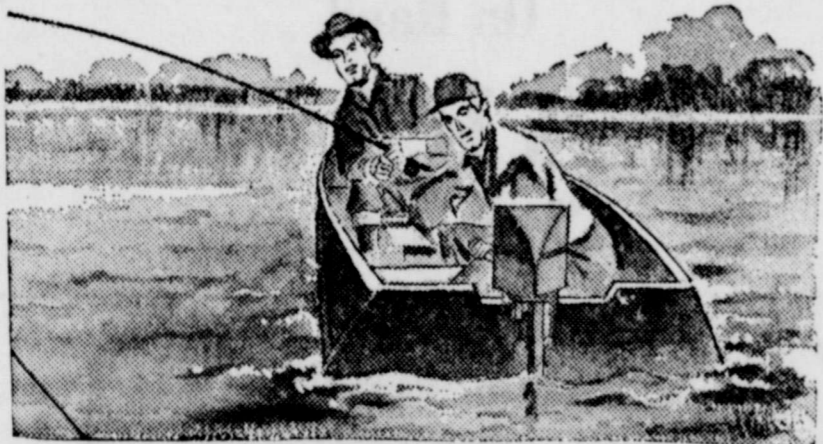
Use these plentiful foods to plan festive menus, such as pork crown roast with rice and apple stuffing, rice cooked in equal amounts of apple juice and water.

Washington — The AFL-CIO has for years taken a pre-eminent and consistent anti-communist position. The union's president, George Meany, has long been known for opposition to policies of cold war weakness and has been foremost with warnings against Communist incursions.

Just recently the AFL-CIO has produced an excellent document entitled "Who Is the Imperialist?" This publication puts together a fact-laden study of trends, incidents and policies in the cold war since the epoch of World War II. It answers with clarity the charges of the Marxists and the New Left that the United States is an imperialist nation, with designs to subjugate other countries to her will.

The AFL-CIO pamphlet cites chapter and verse in a remarkable sequence of events to show that it is the Soviet Union and Red China who are the imperialists in today's world. Both have pursued a course of global expansion while the Free World has steadily reduced its perimeters.

Set forth in detail is the historical record, giving names, places and dates of direct aggression and how the Communists have created the largest slave empire in modern times.

The union's study describes with accuracy how the communist powers have annexed near 825,000 square miles of territory, involving at least 25 million people in 11 nations. In addition they have gained virtual control over another 13 satellite countries with about a million square miles and more than 146 million inhabitants. Adding up the attainment by aggression, not counting Russia and Red China themselves, comes to an imperialistic empire of almost two million square miles, inside of which live 172 million human beings.

Communism has grown to a gigantic force which controls all or parts of at least 20 countries, approximately 16 million square miles and over a billion people. To this can be added those people of Cambodia, Laos and Vietnam under communist domination, the extent of which is difficult to estimate.

While the communists have been running up their score of domination over nations who had little or no chance to resist, the free nations have granted independence to just about all their colonial holdings. The AFL-CIO lists 68 states which achieved self-determination between the end of World War II and the present, comprising more than 13

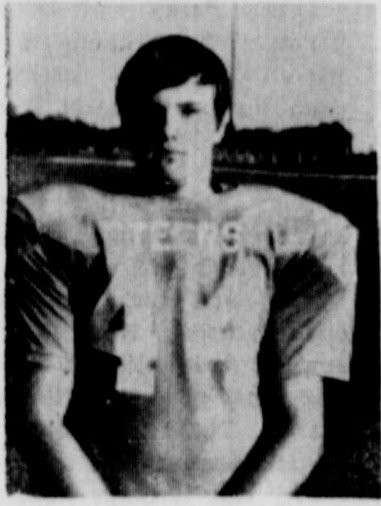
