

Tax supported hospital and other state agencies which bought the antibiotics will share in the \$4.6 million recovery against five large drug companies named in the anti-trust suit. The U. S. Supreme Court denied the companies' last appeal Oct. 12.

SPANISH TREASURE PRAISED - Appraisers have completed the preliminary process of putting a value on treasure recovered from four centuries old shipwrecks off Padre Island.

Final reports will go to Federal District Judge Reynaldo Garza of Brownsville who directed the lappraisal be made as the result of a lawsuit.

Platoro Inc., the Indiana firm which receivered the treasure in 1967, seeks title to lat least half the artifacts. The state claims all of them, and has threatened to take its case for possession to the U. S. Supreme Court.



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Dyess Planes Fly Low Over Area

The world wide commitments of the 516th Tactical Airlift Wing (TAW) at Dyess require continuous low level flying 115 to 290 miles per hour. training. The highest possible degree of proficiency must be maintained and the 516th TAW aircrews must be current in all modes of aerial delivery. As a result, C-130 Hercules and C-7A Caribou aircraft are making the flights over this area.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 a.m. and midnight Monday though Friday, and less frequently on weekends. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the terrain while night low level activi-

> All flights are made along specific routes which are approved by Tactical Air Command.
