



### January Garden Tips

Care of Gift Plants

How do you care for the beautiful platted plants which are such attractive gifts during he holiday

Mos of us wish they would last several months and may be quite unhappy when they become unattractive in only a few weeks.

The flowering plants from the florist usually aren't the type that may be kept as permanent house plants. These plants were raised in a cool humid greenhouse and don't take kindly to the hot, dry conditions of our homes. So treat them as long lasting cut flowers. Enjoy their beauty as long as possible, but don't be sad when they falde and must be discarded.

Keep gift plants cool with a temperature of 70 degrees F. during the day and 60 degrees at

Take notice of these points for preserving plants:

1. Set the pot on crushed stone or gravel in a pan of water. The water will evaporate and increase the humidity of the air around the plant.

2. Place the plant so it will receive as much sun as possible during the day, but avoid putting it in a hot, southwest window.

3. Water the plant regularly. It will use more water in a dry home than it did in the green house. square feet of area of established Apply just enough water to moisten the soil.

4. Keep the plant out of drafts. This is particularly true of poinsettias. If located in a draft, the leaves often drop.

5. Wash the leaves with soapy

If serious foliage diseases develop, the plant should be thrown out to reduce the possibility of crapemyrtle, rose, althea and its spreading to other plants you may have.
