BCD Discusses Routine Matters

Hugh Lewis Jr. presided for the Tuesday noon BCD luncheon meeting when largely routine business was on the agenda. He read a letter from the Edwards Plateau Texas A&M Research and Extension Center notifying contributors that the center is nearing completion and expects to open in February. It was noted that the location is about six miles northwest of San Angelo on the Sterling City highway. It is an extension center and branch of Texas A&M University.

Lewis also told members that the letters and new membership cards had been mailed. He will

appoint a committee soon to make calls in the city if response is slow. He reported that he had talked with Scoutmaster Gene Hinnard and learned there have been some changes made in the past year in regard to rechartering scout organizations. A film on scouting will be shown at BCD as soon as it is received from scout headquarters.

Fern Havins, commissioner of precinct 1, said that petitions, asking that a bond election be called to finance the seal coating of Coke County paving, are ready to present to the next commissioner's court meeting which will be Jan. 24.

G. C. Allen, UCRA president, announced that the UCRA board of directors would meet at 4 p.m. Tuesday in San Angelo.

Wilson Bryan said the city council, in its last meeting, had agreed that the city would buy and install another siren for the new water tower in the north part of town. It will be a 5 h.p. siren and will be blown in conjunction with the 7½ h.p. siren which is on the old water tower. He also said plans were made to replace some light fixtures downtown and to add some new poles and lights where needed. This has not been done since Mayor Bryan went into office. New stop signs are also to be added within the city limits, he said.

Austin — An interesting political poll was taken at the Gulf Coast Press Association's board of director's meeting in Houston Jan. 8. Fourteen newspaper publishers were asked: "Who do you think will win the 1972 Governor's race in Texas?"

Seven said Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, four named Dolph Briscoe and two listed Gov. Preston Smith.

The same editors were asked about their vote.

Eleven voted for Dolph Briscoe, two for Ben Barnes and one for Preston Smith.

SENATE CAMPAIGN — The 1972 political campaigns moved into full swing with announcement by former U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough that he would make a comeback try for a Senate seat. Yarborough, 68, revealed his plans in a series of whirlwind news conferences at Austin, Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth and San Antonio. He seeks the Democratic nomination to oppose Republican

Sen. John Tower.

Barefoot Sanders of Dallas, already running for the Senate as a Democrat, welcomed onetime political ally Yarborough to the race as "one of our fine senior citizens." He said both Yarborough and Tower "are out of touch with the majority of Texans."

Yarborough said he had never had so successful a campaign opening day. He stressed his nearly 14 years' experience as a progressive senator, and said in answer to questions about his age: "I'll be around campaigning as long hours as anybody else, if not longer."

The former senator's entry took some of the spotlight away from the warming governor's race where Gov. Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Uvalde rancher Dolph Briscoe are starting to mix it up.

Five Democratic candidates are moving around the state in the lieutenant governor's race.

Treasurer Jesse James, Comptroller of Public Accounts Robert S. Calvert and Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White during the last week announced for reelection. Calvert and James are expected to draw some opposition.

State Rep. Frances Farenthold of Corpus Christi announced she is "taking a serious look" at

prospects for a gubernatorial race, but has not ruled out challenging Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

SCHOOL DECISION APPEAL — The State Board of Education voted unanimously to appeal the monumental federal court decision that the Texas property tax method of financing schools is unconstitutional.

Meanwhile, the Board assumed responsibility for drafting a new plan for supporting the school system and ordered a task force to be formed to do the study job in the event an appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court fails.

The state, according to Texas Research League, has several options. One is full state financing, which by 1974 would require an expenditure of a billion dollars a year just to maintain the status quo.

Another alternative is state-local financing that would provide approximately equal resources for each child. The League suggested redrawing district boundaries to redistribute property values or superimposing multi-district taxing regions over present operating districts to provide equalization by regions.

A decision, the League noted, must be made as to whether the goal is educational expenditures at the present level in rich districts or at a lower "average level." The latter would mean reducing the number of teachers and lowering salary supplements in some districts to create more positions and higher salaries in the poor districts.

REPUBLICANS EAGER — Texas Republicans in a recent meeting here boasted of wide open opportunities in 1972 presidential and U. S. Senate races, for doubled state legislative strength and possible election of a governor.

Scandals in state government and prospects of single member House (legislative) districts offer the GOP its biggest chance to elect candidates and achieve reform through two party government, the Republican State Executive Committee was told repeatedly.

The GOP issued verbal invitations to unhappy Democrats and Independents, regardless of political philosophies, to enlist in Republican ranks.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin declared the controversial new code of ethics for state and local officials unconstitutional, and was commended by Governor Smith and Secretary of State Bob Bullock.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

* A school of veterinary and zoological medicine at Texas Tech University can be approved by simple majority vote of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System. New and separate institutions require a two-thirds vote of the Board.

* A witness in a criminal case under subpoena is entitled to mileage and witness fees.

* Jim Wells County commissioners redistricting of commissioners precincts Aug. 11 is void due to failure to publish notice of changes.

Short Snorts

Governor Smith is considering a recommendation for a state-wide food stamp program which would call for about \$17 million in state aid to counties and would produce \$286 million in federal assistance for the needy.

Industrial development of Texas last year may rank second only to record 1969, according to Texas Industrial Commission.

Rural development may be the answer to pollution, urban crowding and rural poverty, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White contends.

The 1972 Miss Texas Universe beauty pageant will be held in San Antonio April 10-15.

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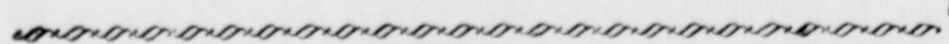

Registering Consumer Complaints

A key to promoting consumer power is learning how to register an effective complaint about an unsatisfactory purchase or service.

Instigating a complaint against a company is often so frustrating that the consumer abandons her right of retaliation altogether. But retreating only helps to prolong the poor service.

Most businessmen and manufacturers want to learn shoppers' complaints so they can identify and correct their mistakes.

Organizing an effective complaint means gathering all the facts.

The first step is to make sure a complaint is justified. Read the label or instructions for the manufacturer's directions for care and use. Check the guarantee or warranty. Know what is covered and what is not.

If the complaint is justified, plan your attack carefully, listing all reasons for dissatisfaction with the product or service. The list should also report information of where and when the product was purchased, its model number, brand name, price and a brief description of its faults.

The consumer is now ready to fire her complaint. Begin with the business or service organization with whom the original deal was made. If the complaint cannot be settled on the spot, ask to see someone in higher authority.

If you write the store, address the complaint to the person most likely capable of helping you. In the letter present all facts as you would verbally, and keep a carbon copy.

Shoppers who telephone their complaints should record the name of the person they speak to in case the situation is not cleared up.

If these efforts fail to produce results, it's time to contact the Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce.

Fabric Care Labeling

Care labeling of textile products for home sewers is a great convenience to the homemaker due to the development of numerous new fibers, fabrics and finishes. Proper laundering is important to the appearance and performance of fabrics.

By law, fabric content must be

stated on yardage, either on a hangtag or printed on the bolt end. Many manufacturers also include care information. One fiber maker is taking the guesswork out of caring for fabrics made with the company's fibers. Care and sewing instructions are printed continuously on tape which is then inserted along the fold of the fabric as it is being wound on the bolt. Thus, even a small cut of the material will contain a complete set of instructions. This procedure should certainly make friends among home sewers everywhere.

Income Tax Book On Sale at P. O.

A booklet that gives information on how to fill out federal tax returns will be sold at the Robert Lee Post Office, Postmaster H. S. Lewis announced this week.

"Your Federal Income Tax" was written by the Internal Revenue Service and contains many examples to illustrate how the tax law applies to actual situations. A special feature of the booklet is the sample, filled in return, Form 1040, keyed to page where explanations can be found for each entry on the return.

The 160 page booklet is now on sale and costs 75 cents a copy. Lewis said, "By selling this booklet at postal facilities in the Robert Lee area we are offering a convenient service to our customers. We are participating in a nationwide program to make the tax booklet available to the public in 15,000 postal facilities."

Another popular IRS publication, "Tax Guide for Small Business," will also be sold for 75 cents a copy at the San Angelo Post Office. This publication answers many questions businessmen have about federal income, excise and employment taxes and also contains a 1972 calendar with due dates and information for various tax returns and payments.

WHOPPER STRIPER CAUGHT AT SPENCE

The striped bass population in Spence Reservoir must not be doing too badly, if one specimen caught here recently is any example.

Tom Sawyer of George West caught a six pound striper and then left it for Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials to study and identify.

The six pounder is the largest recorded caught out of a freshwater lake stocked by the department. The state record for freshwater striped bass is 12 pounds, 12 ounces. However, that fish was one of a group of stripers stocked in the Sabine River by Louisiana officials.

Stripers are anadromous fish—that is, they live in salt water but seek freshwater streams for spawning. It was discovered several years ago that saltwater is not necessary for the fish to survive and grow. They can be successfully stocked in freshwater lakes to provide another game fish for anglers.

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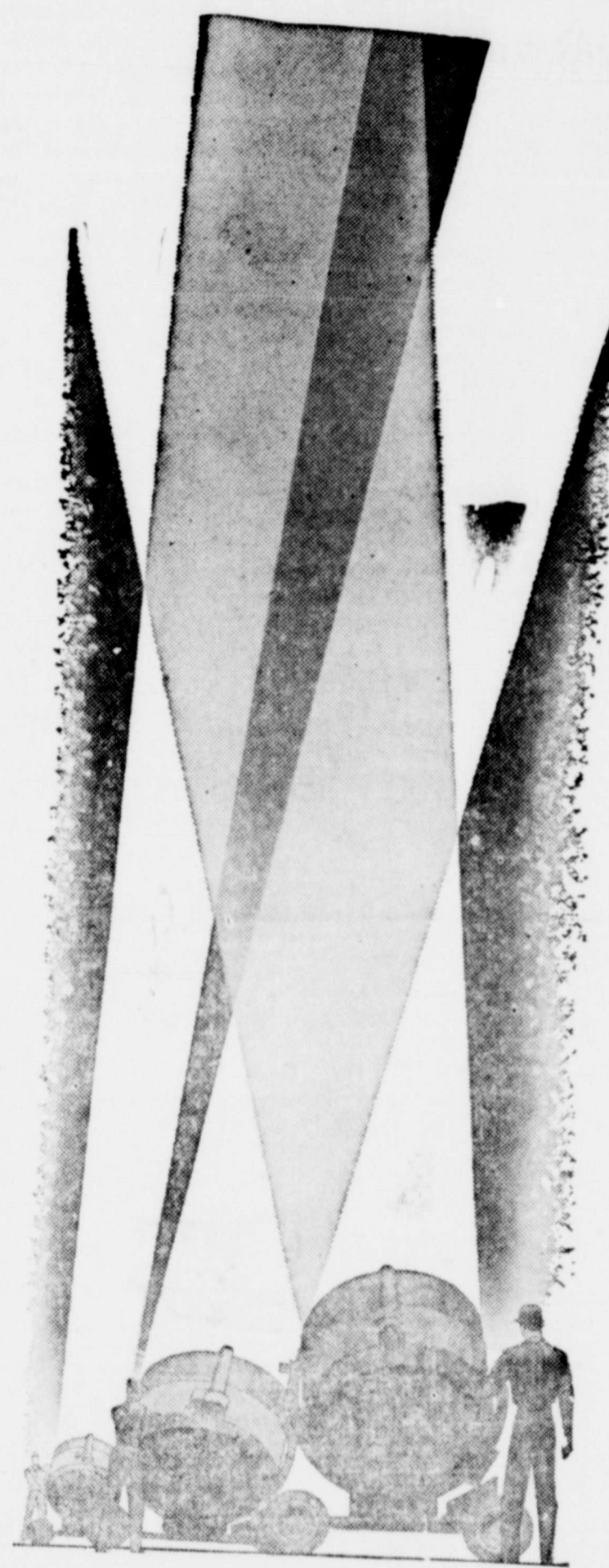

ganization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to March 13, 1972, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

REGIONAL PLANNING GRANT AWARDED CVCOG BY STATE

The Concho Valley Council of Governments (CVCOG) has been awarded a \$28,756 regional planning assistance grant, Governor Preston Smith announced today.

In a letter to Judge W. W. Thetford of Coke County, president of CVCOG, Governor Smith commended the regional council for its work in the West Texas area.

The state grant, for use in 1972, is designed as general assistance support for a variety of CVCOG programs, the Governor's office said. Past projects of the council have included regional water quality planning, rural water and sewer planning, establishment of in-service training schools for law enforcement officers, criminal justice planning, review of federally assisted projects, housing inventories, youth services bureau and technical services to member governments. New programs in-

clude activities associated with health planning, transportation planning and manpower development.

Under the leadership of President Thetford and Executive Director James F. Ridge, the Concho Valley Council of Governments has become one of the state's most responsive regional councils. One of 24 such associations in Texas, CVCOG has over 30 member governments including 11 cities, 11 special districts and Coke, Concho, Irion, Kimble, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Sterling and Tom Green Counties.

Texas is one of only a few states granting direct general funding to regional planning commissions. At the request of Governor Smith, \$1.6 million was appropriated by the 62nd Legislature.

The CVCOG's 1972 grant of \$28,756 is an increase over the 1971 allocation of \$10,000.

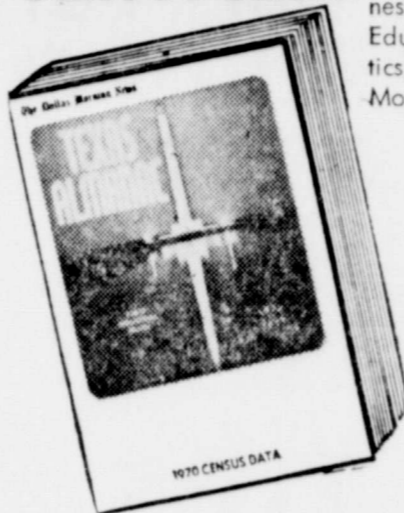
