Discussion Light on \$200,000 Road Bond Election; Absentee Voting Starts Mon.

Discussion of the \$200,000 bond election set for Feb. 26 seems to be rather quiet this first week after it was called by the Coke County Commissioners' Court.

The election was called Monday of last week after petitions were presented to the court. The pe-

titions asked that the bond election be called to provide funds to seal, coat, repair and otherwise improve paving owned by the county in Robert Lee, Bronte and rural areas of the county. Also, some new paving and bridge construction are planned.

Absentee voting will start Monday in the office of County Clerk Mrs. Winnie Waldrop.

According to figures submitted this week by County Auditor Weldon Fikes, there are approximately 165 blocks of paving in Bronte and 204 in Robert Lee which are in need of sealcoating.

The Feb. 26 balloting will be held in all seven of Coke County's voting boxes.

Notice of the election is being published in this newspaper.

The girls were defeated there 52-46 in a game that went into an overtime period. Rhonda Askins scored 23 points for Robert Lee.

Coke Girls to Enter 4-H Food Show

Entries for the 4-H Food Show of District 7 are due Saturday at 10:30 a.m. at the Sweetwater Coliseum Annex.

Each of the 20 counties participating can bring two senior and two junior winners to the district show.

The show will be open to the public from 2 to 2:30 p.m. Entrants will be on hand to explain their recipes to visitors.

Judging will be done on menus, recipes, record books and nutrition knowledge. Contestants will prepare their dishes and take them to the show.

Twenty-four judges will be supplied by the counties entering. Judges from Coke County will be Mrs. Larry Jameson and Mrs.
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Deadline for filing as candidates in the May 6 primary election is next Monday, Feb. 7.

D. K. Glenn, county Democratic chairman, said the Democratic Executive Committee will meet next week and try to come up with some answers about how the primary election in Coke County will be financed. The long stand-

ing practice of apportioning election costs among the candidates has been declared unconstitutional. He said some form of voluntary contributions may be necessary, as he has been instructed by Secretary of State Bob Bullock to refund filing fees already submitted.

In the meantime, prospective candidates are reminded that they must file by Feb. 7 in order to be on the ballots for the primary elections.

County Politics

A new candidate, Larry Jameson, announced this week as a candidate for commissioner of Precinct 1, bringing the total in this race to four. Previously announced were Albert N. (Bob) Fields, Wilson Bryan and Roy Casey. Incumbent Fern Havins is not seeking reelection.

Two have announced as candidates for commissioner of Precinct 3, Jett Hold and Elmo Bell. Floyd Harmon presently holds the position and is not running for reelection.

Unopposed so far for county offices are Melvin Childress for sheriff and O. B. Jacobs for tax assessor-collector. Ollie Roe also is unopposed for reelection as constable in Precinct 1.

Renal B. Rosson of Snyder, Scurry County, has announced his candidacy for state representative from this district.

Officers Tell of Fire Department Needs

Fire Marshal R. C. (Buzz) Sawyer and Fire Chief Sherman Williams were guests of Mayor Wilson Bryan at Tuesday's meeting of the BCD. All three of the men came to the BCD meeting with a purpose in mind: to present to the civic organization the plight of the Rober Lee Volunteer Fire Department's equipment in fighting fires in 1972.

President Hugh Lewis Jr. presided at the meeting and turned the floor over to Mayor Bryan, who gave a brief rundown on the work and problems of the fire department.

The mayor told the group the first thing he wanted to bring out was that members of the department work strictly on a volunteer basis with no pay whatsoever. He

said he felt men who were willing to work for no pay and risk their health and lives deserve all the support they can get from the citizens whose property they protect.

Bryan said the county for many years has budgeted \$500 a year for helping meet fire department expense. However, the expense of the operation has been running nearer \$1000 a year than \$500 and the city has been making up the difference. This year the city has budgeted \$1000 for the department, making a total of \$1500 to be used for maintenance and operation, with the hope that there will be a small amount left to buy needed equipment. The mayor said the city operates on a very tight budget and cannot afford

much expense in this department without the curtailment of some other service or the assessment of additional taxes.

He said the city has no money to buy new equipment or to replace worn out equipment presently in use. Only recently the city had a demonstration of a new siren to be erected in the north side of town. The \$600 model demonstrated was unsatisfactory, he said, and one which will do the job needed by citizens will run \$1100 to \$1200 with all the required controls.

Fire Chief Williams took the floor and told the BCD that probably the most important equipment needed now was air pack breathing equipment which would enable firemen to enter burning

buildings. They have never had this equipment, but have been lucky that no one has perished in a burning building who might have been saved if properly equipped firemen had been able to search burning structures. Williams said the air pack breathing units cost about \$325 each and the firemen need at least two. They strap onto the fireman's back and are self-contained. They will provide necessary power and oxygen for 30 minutes.

Williams said the department is in need of some new hose to replace worn out hose. He said small hose costs \$1.00 per foot while the larger size being used costs \$2.50 per foot. He said four hose joints now in use are unsafe unless they are repaired.

The fire chief pointed out that the newest of Robert Lee's three fire trucks has given excellent service and is one of the best grass fire fighting units in the area.

Fire Marshal Sawyer told the group that modern fires are different from those of a few years ago. Changes in building materials, heavy use of plastics and synthetics and other recent changes make it impossible for a fireman to last more than 30 seconds in a burning building without breathing equipment, he said. Most homes have 25 to 30 items in daily use which would put out deadly poisonous gas if they were on fire, the marshal said. He said the presence of the Robert
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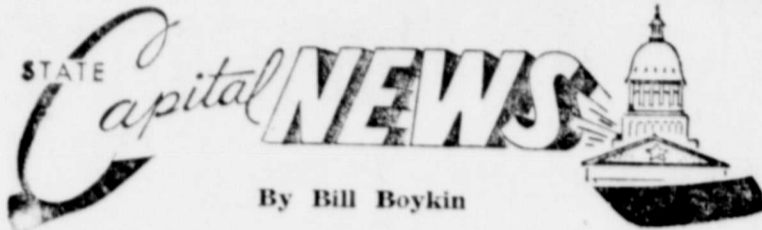

Austin — One adverse federal court decision after another fuels the feud between Gov. Preston Smith and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes. Smith was quick to blame on Barnes the failure of a 1971 filing fee statute which threatens to force a special legislative session.

While that issue was still raging, another Dallas three judge court struck down the legislature's congressional redistricting plan. Once more, Smith accused the lieutenant governor of "reluctance" and

"inaction" on redistricting.

When a third court frowned on House of Representatives redistricting in major counties as done by a board Barnes served on, Smith once more leveled at the lieutenant governor charges of 'immature action' and lack of leadership. Single member districts were ordered for Bexar and Dallas counties.

Sen. J. P. Word of Meridian, speaking in Barnes' defense, said Smith offered the legislature no leadership himself and reminded that the governor could have vetoed the congressional redistricting measure if he didn't like it.

Meanwhile, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin succeeded in getting a temporary postponement of the congressional redistricting order. The U. S. Supreme Court agreed to delay the new plan pending appeal.

U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, who intervened as a friend of the court in support of the stay, said congressional candidates for this year, at least, can run in the districts given them by the Legislature.

That would be a relief for Congressmen Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls and Omar Burleson of Anson; Jim Wright of Fort Worth and Ray Roberts of McKinney and O. C. Fisher of San Angelo and Abraham Kazan of Laredo who had been pitted against each other in the federal district court plan. If he has to call a special ses-

sion on primary election financing, said Smith, he will expect "those responsible for creating this problem" to come up with "workable alternatives."

GOVERNOR'S POLL TAKEN—Dolph Briscoe won another editor's poll last week at the Mid-winter meeting of the Texas Press Association. Editors were asked first who they thought would carry their county—if the vote were taken on that date (Jan. 24). Forty-eight editors responded to the poll with this vote: Briscoe, 18; Preston Smith, 13, Ben Barnes, 12; Barnes-Briscoe tie, 2; and three undecided.

They were asked: "How will you vote in the 1972 Governor's race?" This was the result: Briscoe, 28; Smith, 6; Barnes, 5; Grover, 1; and undecided, 8.

CRIME FIGHT PROPOSED — The governor's Criminal Justice Council promises a legislative drive for laws to help stamp out organized crime in the state.

Mafi-type operations have been noted in Texas by the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice and other investigators, the Council's new 1972 plan points out.

Further, states the Council, many bets on sports events are being taken by bookie shops with national "confederation" affiliation.

This legislation was recommended:

* Power for the attorney general to bring suit in criminal cases.

* Subpoena power in a statewide grand jury or crime prevention council.

* Permission for electronic surveillance (including wiretapping). The Council proposes to spend about \$1 million of its \$25 million 1972 allocations for action against organized crime.

COURTS SPEAK — A candidate for state senator must live in his district only one year before the date of the general election, the State Supreme Court held.

Overruling the Austin Court of Civil Appeals, the High Court found legal the University of Texas' acquiring 280 acres of its UT-Permian Basin campus site at Odessa through donation of park land acquired with county bond funds.

The Court of Criminal Appeals relaxed rules on admissibility of gory pictures in murder trials, holding, in effect, that use of the photographs is largely up to the trial judge's discretion where it is "competent, material and relevant to the issue on trial."

Grocery Shopping Etiquette

Most consumers probably don't give much thought to shopping courtesy, but it's just as important as any other form of courtesy. Bad shopping manners can even cause accidents. For example, if children race all over the store, they may knock glass containers off the shelves and cut themselves. Or they may trip and fall.

Of course, shopping etiquette isn't always that serious. It's just a case of applying the golden rule when buying groceries.

Be careful when shopping. If you accidentally bump your car into someone, stop and apologize.

Another suggested rule, be gentle. Avoid unnecessary handling of fresh fruits and vegetables. Also, be neat. If you knock something off a shelf, put it back. If you accidentally break something, ask a clerk to clean it up.

If you change your mind about buying something, put it back where you found it. And complete your shopping before moving to the check out line. Don't ask someone else to push your cart forward while you pick up forgotten items.

Have your money ready so you don't delay the check out line while you write a check or fumble for your money.

Shopping courtesy is just a matter of common sense. If you show consideration for others, you'll find that your shopping can be an enjoyable experience instead of a drudgery.

Home Economics Tips

Arm chuck, sold as steak in some stores, is best used as Swiss steak or braised. It's a less tender cut, but has a well developed flavor. Arm chuck may be identified by the round arm bone.

Large stackable pillows can provide easily stored, extra seating places. They may even be used as part of the room decor.

To prolong life of stainless steel cookware, use medium to low heat for top of range use. Never use high heat.

To aid the blind or visually impaired, cookbooks are available in Braille and large type editions. They contain sections on soups, main dishes, casseroles, stews,

gravies and sandwiches. To obtain a copy of the "Easy Ways to Delicious Meals" cookbook, write to Volunteers Service for the Blind, 332 South 13th Street, Philadelphia, Pa. 19107.

When cooking vegetables, cook only until tender. Overcooking causes them to lose color, shape and much of the food value.

Eggs cooked too long in boiling water will taste tough and rubbery. For tender, hard cooked eggs, try cooking them a shorter time in water that is simmering. As soon as the eggs have finished cooking, pour off the hot water and cover them with cold water. This keeps a green film from forming around the yolk. (The green is harmless, but looks unappetizing.)

When using a double boiler, start with warm, not hot, water in the lower pan so the food won't stick.

For a drink that's different, serve "cafe-au-lait." Simply mix equal portions of strong coffee and milk. Or try "Vienna coffee." That's just coffee served with whipped cream.

To reduce your food bill, try using molasses instead of sugar in such foods as baked beans, cookies, puddings, and bread. Children like it and it adds flavor to food value.

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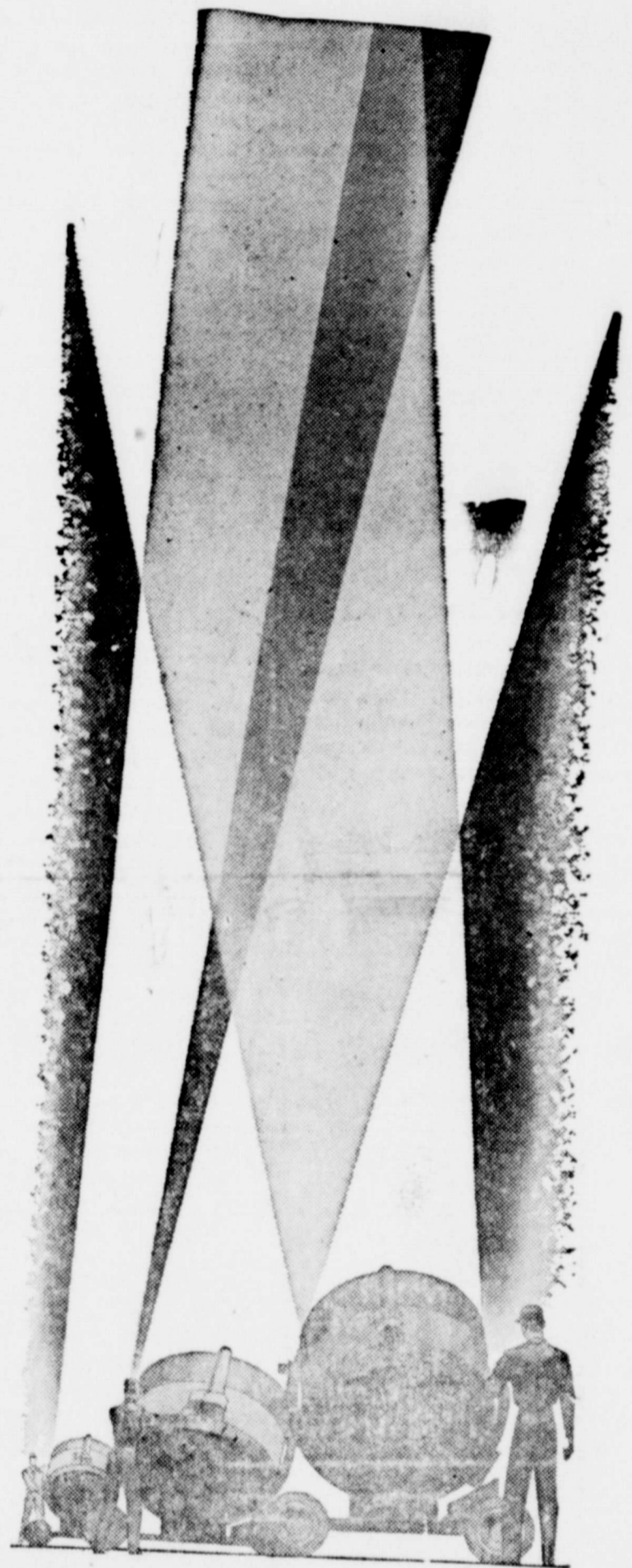
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Washington — Throughout our history the waters which wash our shores have been friendly. They have given us geographical protection making it practically impossible for another nation to attack us. In our history they have given us time to build up our strength when danger seriously threatened. The tempo of modern technology has changed all this, as it has changed so many other things. It has stripped this country of our friendly protecting oceans.

The bearer of bad news is always punished. In ancient times one who bore adverse reports to the ruler, even though the truth, might be put to death. Today he simply becomes an "alarmist" but if there is one subject about which the American people must have a conscious concern it is our military position compared to that of the Soviet Union.

"Peace in our time" became a slogan after declared by Neville

Chamberlain. What followed was six years of bloody conflict, which came near wrecking western civilization. We must hope that lessons of appeasement and unpreparedness have not receded into the dimness of shadows of past history.

If history teaches us anything, it surely must be that weakness invites attack; that it takes only one aggressor to plunge the world into war against the wishes of peace loving countries.

Some of our weaknesses and vulnerability have been pointed out in this space from time to time. Another one has recently been proved. A defecting Cuban pilot flew a Russian MIG fighter plane to a Florida air base in 1969 and more lately a Russian built transport flew from Havana to New Orleans carrying some uninvited delegates to a sugar conference. The question is how were the unannounced flights made without triggering an air alert.

The chairman of the Armed Services Committee of the House of Representatives gives the answer. There is virtually no air defense system along our southern border and the Gulf Coast.

A Defense Department statement attempts some reassurances. It says that the Soviet Union could not launch a major manned Lumber attack without the United States knowing it. Besides, it is reasoned, strategic manned bombers are not worth worrying about in this age of far more formidable nuclear missiles.

True, perhaps. But it is hardly "alarmist" to recall that most of the American people and their leaders were convinced in 1941 that the Japanese either would not or could not carry out an attack on Pearl Harbor.

The glaring gap in our defenses to our southern approaches has gone virtually unnoticed during the long period of sustained hostility towards the United States by Castro's communist Cuba. During the same time there has been established a Soviet Union presence in the Caribbean. There are visible efforts by both the Russians and Chinese communists to gain a foothold in Latin American governments.

Even if our country was not vulnerable to manned bomber attack, the Soviet submarine presence off our shores, capable of launching missiles half way across our nation, should be enough to bring us out of apathy to the possibility.

If this is not enough, there is reason to believe that the Russians will soon have bombers capable of flying over the United States at the speed of sound and back without refueling.

If some of the strategists believe that manned bombers are obsolete, it is obvious that those running the business of military preparedness in the Soviet Union do not.

Under the influence of those both in and out of government who think the manned plane is obsolete and unnecessary, the B-1 bomber has not been put into production. Those who believe that it is safe to let down our defenses gamble with the very future of our nation.

The Russian bear may not be yet 10 feet tall and fully matured but he is exercising and growing rapidly. The future of our country is too dear to take chances on only living for the moment.

ON THIS, the 24th day of January, 1972, the Commissioners' Court of Coke County, Texas, convened in session, being open to the public, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Robert Lee, Texas, the meeting being open to the public and notice of said meeting, giving the date, place and subject thereof, having been posted as prescribed by Article 6252-17, Section 3A, V.A.T.C.S., the following members of the Court being present and in attendance, to wit:

There came on to be considered the petition of Cumbie Ivey, Jr. and 102 others asking that an election be ordered upon the proposition hereinafter stated; and

IT APPEARING TO SAID COURT that said petition is signed by resident property taxpayers of said County equivalent in number to one percent (1%) or more of the total votes cast in Coke County in the last preceding general election for Governor, so that this court is obligated and empowered to call said election; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS:

THAT an election be held in said County on the 26th day of February, 1972, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election in accordance with said petition the following proposition shall be submitted:

"WHETHER or not the bonds of said Coke County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$200,000), to bear interest at a rate of not to exceed FIVE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (5½%) per annum, and to mature serially over a period of not to exceed THIRTY (30) years from the date thereof, in conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 52 of Article III of the Constitution, as amended, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof, in Coke County, Texas; and shall ad valorem taxes be levied on all taxable property in said County subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity?"

SAID election shall be held under the provisions of the Acts of the Thirty-ninth Legislature, First Called Session, Chapter 16, as amended.

ALL RESIDENT qualified electors of the County, including those who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. That at said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such a manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.S. Election Code, and printed on such ballots shall appear the following proposition: "THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear to the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST" and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the County Clerk's Office in the Courthouse, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V.A.T.S., Election Code.

ble, McCulloch. District six — Stephens, Young, Clay, Jack, Palo Pinto, Burnet, Parker, Hood, Somervell, Eastland, Erath, Comanche, Hamilton, Bosque, Brown, Mills, Coryell, McLennan, San Saba, Lampasas, and Bell.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Box 1486, San Angelo, Texas 76901 before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced sheep or goats for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any persons qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board as a representative of the district in which he resides or as a director at large by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to March 13, 1972, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

Lee Volunteer Fire Department has lowered the key insurance rate here to 32 cents for all property owners, adding that the better equipped the fire department is, the lower the insurance rates will be.

Barbecue Planned

Sawyer said the department is making plans to give every citizen a chance to donate to the fire department. A barbecue is being planned, he said, and everybody will be invited. There will be no charge for the meal, but everybody will be given an opportunity to donate to a fund to buy the much needed new equipment.

Mayor Bryan gave BCD members something else to think about when he brought up the city's water supply. He said in 1968 Mountain Creek Reservoir was full and with only a small amount of runoff that supply of water lasted until June 1971, with the help of water wells which were drilled when it became apparent the water shortage was becoming acute. Mayor Bryan said the present supply in the city lake will last until fall without any runoff. However, he emphasized that unless there are some spring rains and runoff "we are in trouble."

Bryan said the city has used 42 million gallons of water in the last nine months and there are 60 million gallons in the lake. With heavy evaporation during the summer, all this water will not be available for use, he said. Per capita use of water goes up every year, the mayor said, and more water will be necessary every year, particularly if Robert Lee is to enjoy the expected growth.

The city has six or seven more years to pay off the cost of the old lake, no longer in use. However, the mayor said there is no assurance that Mountain Creek Lake will provide all the needed water through that period. Consequently, the city council has been discussing the idea of asking cooperation of the UCRA and CRMWD in getting an engineer in here to determine the cost of needed equipment and a line from Lake Spence to the city's treatment plant. Bryan said the council felt it would be good to have these figures on hand in case the need should arise to tap the big lake for the city's use. "It's something for everyone to be thinking about," he said.

Four winners will also be named in the junior division, but they will not advance to state.

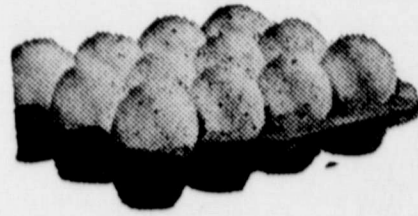
Senior 4-H Club Girls representing Coke County will be Karen Blair in the fruit and vegetable food group and Donna Scott in the bread and cereal food group.
