## $\underset{\text { Fashion }}{\text { An Old }}$ REIPE

session of a most interesting old book, containing recipes, house. book, containing recipes, house-
hold hints, home remedies, etc., published almost 100 years ago, in 1874. We plan to reprint it in book form, but in the meantime, we want to share some of its contents with our readers. These recipes, etc., were before the days of refrigeration and modern ranges, and cooking as we know it today-oleo, foil, waxed paper and many items homemakers of today take for granted just hadn't been invent. ed yet. It should be remembered that at that time, all foods no additives, nor take-aways. Food was just as nature let it grow. We hope you will enjoy the ones we have time and space to print. Since we cobit twisters, we will begin with a recipe for rabbits.)

## Fricasseed Rabbits

 The best way of cooking rabbits is to fridassee them. Cut them up, or disjoint them. Put them in a stewpan; season them with chopped parsley. Pour in a pint of warm water (or veal broth, iyou have it) and stew it over a slow fire till the rabbits are quite tender; adding (when they are about half done) some bits of butter rolled in flour. Just be. fore you take it from the fire enrich the gravy with a gill a more of thick cream with some nutmeg grated into it. Stir the
gravy well, but take care not to let it boil after the cream is in, lest it curdle. Put the pieces of rabbit on a hot dish, and pour the gravy over them.

Washington - Probably a of people are becoming a little weary of hearing 'about the big hassle over congressional and legistative reaistricting. Atthough we mate bound to hear the time it in the future and morticubou the next regular session of at the next regul
state legislature.
More strict reapportionment congressional idistrio's became cosessary by a Supreme Court ruling in 1964. Frequently referred to as the "one mam, cre vote" ruling, its purpose was to make ly reflect the distribution of ou national population. It was neces sitated in part by the drastic shist of our poputation from rural to urban surroundings. Redist:icting is the responsibility of state legislatures. They are responsible for maintaining the integrity continuity of congressional districts. The Constitution of the United States provided a census every 10 years. The Supreme Court has told the states they must recistrict to reflect the "on man, one vote" ruling but, course, there is no such thing as an exact proportion in every

Acting as an ami cus curiae (friend of the court) the senator requested the Suprem Doart to stay a decision rendere by the three-judge federal cour: n Dallas. He expressed the houghts of many that the power of edistricting should rest with the
egislature as set forth in the contitution and not with feder courts.
Certainly, continuity of congres sional districts was not medntained in the court's plan when it sliced Tarrant County and San Antonio in half; cut Knox, Has kell and Brown County in two end moved counties in and out of congressional districts with total disregard for "community of interest" and other practical aspects nvolved.
The stay has been granted and
the 1972 elections will be held in
$\qquad$ but what will happen when the wome Court reviews the case
pext fall is anybody's guess. I is highly cikely, however, that the Legislature's plan will be maintained for another two years, al. lowing for consideration at its next regular session in 1973. The stay has accomplished one thing - it has given all concerned time for rational and less hurried thinking on the matter - a ne cessity when it comes to reapportioning a state the size of Texas It will give our legislature time to rework and, if possible, improve its pian to comply with the ruling handed down by the Federal court, which has assumed Jrisdiction over it.
In all reasomableness, it ap pears that the distriets as drawn by the legislature will remain una the reguar session of the legmit when it may have to subproval, as fist the court's apo those of us who feel legis ature is minently feel ourlified to curry out its responsibility for r listricting given it under the Con stitution.

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
