### Service Held Here For Roy Conner, Coke Pioneer

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Monday in Southside Church of Christ for Jasper (Roy) Conner, 85, of Robert Lee, Burial was in McKenzieville Cemetery near Silver under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

A retired rancher, Mr. Conner died at 1 a.m. Saturday in West Coke County Nursing Home after sustaining a broken hip in a fall Monday.

He was born Jan. 8, 1887, in a settlement known as Grubb's Canyou in Tom Green County, two years before the area was cut out of Tem Green and annexed to Coke County. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Silas Conner, pioneer settlers here, and a nephew of J. Frank Norfleet.

Mr. Conner moved west of the Pecos River when he was about 19 and worked in the Fort Stockton-Sanderson areas as a cowhand before returning to Coke County. He was married to Ava Lou Aldridge Jan. 31, 1915, in Wingate.

They lived several years at Silver and Colorado City before moving to Sanderson where they lived and ranched a number of years. After Mrs. Conner died in 1969, he moved to the nursing home. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

### **Bond Election Drawing Near**

The election to determine whether or not bonds will be issued to sealcoat and repair the county's paved streets and roads is slated for Saturday, Feb. 26.

The election was called after petitions were presented to the Commissioners' Court, asking for the \$200,000 bond election.

Also included in the project are several additional blocks of paying and some bridges in the rural areas of the county.

Seven polling places will be set up over the county.

Coke County has no bonded indebtedness at the present time, as the last of several bond issues was paid off in 1969. Only indebtedness of the county is approximately \$62,000 owed on machinery warrants.

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

trict of Columbia - each accompanied by a faculty advisor will be given an expense paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington D. C. Personal observation and interviews during the tour, added to the earlier state level judging results, will culminate in the announcement of the 1972 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow at the conclusion of the tour. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000, with those of three runners-up raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

In addition to the awards for school, state and national Homemakers of Tomorrow, a special \$1,000 Nutrition Scholarship has been added to the Betty Crocker Search program this year. To earn this award, a girl must be planning a college major in nutrition or a related field, rank among the highest in her state in the overall Search examination and achieve the top score, from those meeting the first two criteria, on the test's nutrition questions.

During the 18 years since the program's inception, enrollment has totaled over eight and onequarter million, and, with this year's grants, scholarship awards will reach almost \$2 million.

Miss McBroom is active in club work in high school and is a member of the Beta Club, Science Club, Spanish Club, FHA and FTA and has been a member of the band during her four years in high school. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell T. Mc-Broom.




