Spruce Up the Hearth

It happens every year. Warmer weather comes and the call of
outdoors is irresistible. Chances are the temperature will by well on the sunny side when you notice the uncleaned fireplacs that kept things cozy this past winter. Spread newspapers by the hearth and take out those chunks of logs. Scoop ashes into bags and discard. Finish preliminar ies by vacuuming any remaining ash dust.
Give fireplace brick and hearth a good scrubbing with thick suds applied with a stiff brush. Rinse and let dry. If possible, take the screen and fireplace tools outside for a thorough cleaning. Use a scrub brush and plenty of lather to shine things up. Rinse with a hose, or dip the tools in a pail of water and pour the rest ever the screen. This could be a go cleanup project for children.
If the tools are made of solid
brass they will benefit from buffbrass they will benefit from buffing with metal polish. Steel and wrought iron don't need any extra treatment, but might be wiped table oil.
After cleaning, select an inter esting large container to fill with seasonal fresh fllowers and leaves or arrange with artificial varie
ties. For example, an early


American theme can be carried ou: with a brass or copper coal scuttle, medium sized milk can or an old pickling crock. A contemporary flair can be achieve
with a wicker basket or by with la wicker basket or by covering a large potato chip can or
plastic waste basket with a mod design adhesive backed vinyl. A large, but squatty vase is suitable with traditional decor and the Mediterranean motif is earried out with scrolled wrought iron containers.
When using cut flowers and leaf branches, they and the water have o be replaced from time to time and the container washed. Beside a glass or metal vase to hold the water and arrangement may be necessany to use with some decorative containers that have open work or are not waterproof. In any event, use florists' tape, clay or frogs to secure the arrange ment.
Place the arrangement on the hearth in front of the fireplace to one side, or even in the fire p.ace itself, replacing the usua $\log$ grate. Such flowering bring the outdoors in and adds a color ful freshness to a room.

Remember, egg whites hold air when beaten. The more sugar added to beaten egg whites, the to reach a thick or firm stage. Surface skin forms when milk heated in an uncovered pan. It' due to a drying out of fat, mine rals and protein on the surface The skin holds steam in, causing milk to foam and boil over. Pre vent this skin formation by us ing a lid or stirring the milk. Don't use whipped butter as substitute for butter in a recipe since the shortening power isn the same for unwhipped butter. Making a meat loaf? Handlo ground meat as little as possible because excessive mixing gives firm, seemingly less tender food Broiling a steak? Remembe that high heat coagulation occur rapidly on the exposed surface of meat leaving meat crisp and brown on the outside.
