Texas State Department of Health reported the findings on March 26. The increases were not regarded as presenting any public health hazard, but simply as evidence of sensitivity of the air sampling network.

Stations are part of a comprehensive radiological surveillance activity conducted throughout the state. They are operated by local health departments in cooperation with the Texas State Department of Health and the Environmental Protection Agency's Las Vegas off-site monitoring net-





April 13, 1972 Dyess Presented Conservation Award for County

John Dyess and his wife, Wanda, were recognized at the April 6 meeting of the Bronte Noon Lions Club for their work in soil and water conservation. Dvess was awarded a plaque as outstanding conservation farmer for this year in the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District. The presentation was made by Joe Rawlings, chairman of the Coke County SWCD.

The award is made each year to the farmer or rancher who has been doing an outstanding job of conservation work. This award is part of the Annual Texas Conservation Awards Program sponsored by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce and is made locally by the Lions Clubs.

District Conservationist W. E Jacoby listed the practices used by Dyess:

Sinces the Dyesses bought this farm they have carried out a complete conservation program. Some of the practices that are completed include: rootplowing and seeding to native grass, 86 acres; drilled two water wells and built two concrete storage facilities for livestock water; built fences for better grazing management of livestock: constructed little over 13 miles of parallel terraces, built two diversions; and constructed about six acres of grassed waterways.

They plan to put in about 20 acres of Coastal Bermudagrass pasture this spring for livestock grazing. They are carrying out good management practices on all their cropland and rangeland Jacoby said.

The Dyesses bought their farm. located three miles northwest of Bronte, in 1969.. The couple has three daughters, Sharon, Karon and Deanna.

The operation will extend during the period beginning about 1 June 1972 and ending about 1 August



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
