Absentee voting for the May 6 Democratic Primary began Monday at the County Clerk's office in the courthouse in Robert Lee. Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, county clerk is absentee voting clerk for all seven of Coke County's voting boxes.

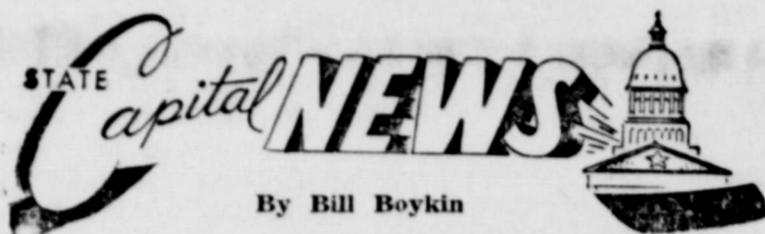
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Austin — An ancient legal dispute involving Texas' sovereignty over its tidelands is in court again.

The U. S. Justice Department has filed a suit against Texas, challenging the state's regulation of fishing within the farthestmost two leagues (six marine miles) of the historic three league (nine marine mile) boundary.

Atty Gen. Crawford Martin has requested President Nixon to intervene in the latest federal attack.

The Attorney General further requested an opportunity for the state to present its position to the State Department and Justice Department. The state, he noted in a letter to Nixon, was not notified prior to filing of the action.

Martin claimed the new action is contrary to the position taken by the Eisenhower-Nixon administration in 1953 and in 1957.

He submitted to the President excerpts from the state's brief

filed in the original boundary suit which was decided in Texas' favor by the U. S. Supreme Court in 1958. He also included a 1957 letter from the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower to then Gov. Price Daniel. Eisenhower expressed the opinion that Texas should "have the right to explore and exploit the submerged lands extending seaward of (its) coastline for a distance of three marine leagues in the Gulf of Mexico."

Martin urged Nixon to inform him if his position as President is the same as that expressed by President Eisenhower.

**COURT REVISION URGED** — A Supreme Court justice and president of the Texas Civil Judicial Council says it's time the legislature submits to voters a constitutional amendment on judiciary reform.

Associate Justice Tom Reavley said Texans are demanding "major surgery" on the court sys-

tem. Suggested Reavley:

\* The State Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals should be merged into a single court of last resort.

\* Fourteen Courts of Civil Appeals should be given jurisdiction over criminal as well as civil cases.

\* There should be fewer levels of lower courts with less overlapping jurisdiction.

\* Appeal procedure should be "simpler and speedier."

\* Judges and cases should be transferred to match resources with needs in keeping with better management of the court system.

The 63rd Legislature, Reavley said, should be asked next year to submit the constitutional amendment proposing court reorganization and modernization.

**SPECIAL TRAINING APPROVED** — The State Board of Education approved contracts for special training next school year of 2,611 children in non-public schools.

Largest single group is the trainable mentally retarded category, with 1,887 youngsters.

Pupils, from pre-school age through high school level, will attend 12 schools operated under the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and 35 independent non-public schools.

The State Board of Education also reviewed a \$1.1 million research program supported by 90 per cent federal and 10 per cent local funds.

Board members voted to uphold orders of Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar sustaining local school board "haircut rules" and dress codes.

**COURTS SPEAK** — The Court of Criminal Appeals refused to go along with an argument that the aggravated assault law discriminated against men—and concluded it's still worse for a man to hit a woman than the other way around.

Texas Supreme Court held a county judge can't prevent a township incorporation election if 200 residents present the required petition. The decision upheld an Athens district judge and the Tyler Court of Civil Appeals.

The High Court sustained lower courts and refused to knock out of operation a Houston legal aid service for the poor in spite of objections to it by some lawyers who claimed it is costing them money.

**PARTIES SLOW** — Secretary of State Bob Bullock complained about early response to his request that county political party officers submit early estimates of May primary election expenses.

Bullock said a week after he asked for the estimates only 99 (of 254) counties were represented in replies. He warned again no state funds will be allocated to local parties until estimated expenditures are submitted on prescribed forms.

Some county chairmen explained they were taking their time since the new state primary financing act makes them responsible for inaccuracies in their figures.

**JUNE 1 PUPIL TRANSFER DEADLINE** — Texas Education Agency has held parents who want to transfer their children from their home school to a nearby district must submit requests by June 1.

**Short Snorts**

Texas cities and counties would get about \$202 million this year under a federal revenue sharing bill before a U. S. House committee.

College teachers in a meeting here endorsed the idea of collective bargaining rights for public employees.

Likely date for the next special session of the legislature on appropriations and taxation appears

to be the week of June 12.

The State Treasury, declares Treasurer Jesse James, had a greater net return on its time deposit interest "than any billion dollar bank in Texas."

Texas National Guard units have reached the highest rating level in 10 years, according to Adjutant General Ross Ayers.

The attorney general is being asked for an opinion interpreting the state's nepotism law gov-

erning state officials and legislators hiring each other's relatives in view of new disclosures.

Warm season grasses should be seeded some time between Jan. 1 and June 1. The optimum seeding dates are in March and April. In order to obtain a better stand of grass a good seedbed is needed. Seedbeds, following rootplowing, need to be firmed and smoothed by a roller chopper, root rake or other means. This will insure a better establishment of grass. Treedozed rangeland should have the seed placed in the disturbed areas before the soil crusts, old fields to be seeded should have competition from weeds reduced by plowing, which will also prepare a suitable seedbed.

The livestock producers named above plan to defer pastures that have been seeded until the grass plants become well established. This normally takes about two years. However, the grass may be lightly grazed during this time during the winter season while the plants are dormant.

To keep grass productive, proper grazing use must follow. A good rule of thumb is to graze half and leave half. This will allow the better grass plants to stay healthy and spread. The grass plants should also be rested for a period of three or more months during the growing season, at least every two or three years.

Financial assistance to do brush control and range seeding may be secured through the Agricultural Stabilization Program or the Great Plains Conservation Program. For technical assistance in determining kind of grass adapted to your soil and the amount needed, contact the Soil Conservation Service office in the courthouse in Robert Lee.

A report from Stephenville Tuesday night after the first round of regional golf play indicated the Sonora Broncos had a 23 stroke lead, shooting 335. DeLeon was second with 358; Joshua was third with 361; Robert Lee was fourth at 362, 27 strokes behind the leaders.

The tournament was concluded Wednesday. First place team and leading individual qualify for the state tournament.

## UCRA Studies Pipeline Proposal

At a meeting last Wednesday the directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority discussed the proposal to make water available to the City of Robert Lee from Lake Spence.

Gerald Allen, UCRA president, said the board agreed that the city does need the additional source of water.

The city has made application to Farmers Home Administration for a grant which would pay 50 per cent of the cost of building a pipeline from the lake to Robert Lee's water treatment plant.

If the grant is approved the city will have to raise the other 50 per cent of the cost. Allen said the city has not yet come to the UCRA with a request for the money.

Main business of the meeting last week was to review engineers reports on specifications and costs.

## Notes From The Oil Field

Sun Oil Co. will re-enter its former No. 2-U Jameson Reef Unit as the No. 2 J. S. Walker and plug back to 5,990 feet for a recompletion attempt. The project is 1/4-mile east and 1/2-mile north-northeast outpost to the two-mile Jameson, Southeast (Strawn Sand gas) field of Coke County, two miles south of Silver.

Location is 1,750 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of 326-1A-H&TC.

Originally drilled to 6,544, plugged back to 6,414 feet, it produced in the Jameson (Strawn reef) field through perforations at 6,168-400 feet.

With 131 team points, Eldorado girls took the district track meet held here Tuesday. Robert Lee girls came in third with 64 points, and qualified several girls for the regional track meet to be held April 28 and 29 at the ACC track in Abilene.

Robert Lee girls qualifying for regional were Pam Heck in broad jump and 440 yard dash; Debbie Hendry in hurdles; and the mile relay team composed of Hendry, Heck, Susan Prentice and Audrey Walker.

Garden City came in 2nd Tuesday with a team total of 99. Other team totals were Christoval 58; Menard 46; Wall 42; Miles 21; Mertzon and Sterling City 14; Sonora 12; Mason 10; Blackwell 8; Water Valley 6; Paint Rock 2.

Pam Heck scored 28 of Robert Lee's points, winning the 440 yard dash in 60.5 and the long jump with 16-1 3/4. She was also a member of the mile relay team which finished second with a time of 4-29.2.

Washington — Since only lawyers are likely to read the Texas Bar Journal, most people will not have had the opportunity to see an article by Mr. James C. Watson, president of the Texas Bar Association. The article is entitled "Bastions Against Tyranny."

Mr. Watson starts off with an explanation in laymen's terms of our jury system. The terms "jury" and "juror" are derived from the Latin terms "just (right)" and "juris (law)." He explains that basically we have two types of juries in Texas—the Grand Jury and Petit Jury. The Grand Jury has broad powers of investigation into any suspected illegal activity with the right to summon witnesses by subpoena. Mr. Wat-

son opines that the Grand Jury system is probably the most important instrument to protect society against oppression from wrong-doers and from overzealous or even malicious governmental officials.

The Petit (or trial) Jury determines factual issues in disputes in civil matters and guilt or innocence in criminal matters. As Mr. Watson wrote, "It, too, is a bulwark in a broad sense but probably not as much so as the Grand Jury." In criminal cases the jury protects the individual against the government and, if it be necessary, it guarantees the individual protection from the judge himself.

The president of the Texas Bar Association observes that presently efforts are being made by some to do away with the right of trial by jury for the sake of expediency. There are also advocates for altering the number of jurors and modifying the requirement for a unanimous verdict. There have been suggestions that agreements by a certain percentage of jurors, such as two-thirds, be sufficient to render a verdict.

The jury system serves a fundamental purpose in our society and the right to trial by jury should be the right of every Texas citizen. As Mr. Watson observes, "there must be substantial justice, not necessarily precise justice; the jury gives that common sense approach..."

Service as a juror is accorded only to free men. It is an essential element in a free democratic society. It often brings the average citizen in touch with his government in a substantial and awesome manner. The juror is called upon to judge and to make important decisions. It becomes his vital civic duty as well as a privilege.

Judge Watson says that he exhorts those called to jury service not to seek to be excused, if at all possible for them to serve. He believes that if a particular time for which one has been summoned is critical to him the citizen should seek to rearrange his appearance for jury duty instead of seeking to be entirely excused.

It is a duty, a responsibility and even a privilege to serve as a juror and something to be taken seriously. It can also be found intensely interesting.

Our bar association president ends his comments by quoting a current tv commercial which says, "Try it, you'll like it."

**Knowing Onions**

Ever wonder how the expression, "He knows his onions," came about?

It's possible we started "knowing our onions" the year the 13 volumes of the Oxford English Dictionary were published. One of the editors was a Mr. Onions.

At any rate those who know their onions are considered smart. And you may want to know a little about onions, too. For instance they're in plentiful supply now, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. So plan on using these zesty vegetables to spark your spring menus.

And if you're wondering about selection, take some tips from fruit and vegetable experts in USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service who really know their onions.

Granex-Grano onions, which you will find in good supply now, come from the warmer growing areas of the country. Most are yellow skinned—a few are white. The shape tends to be less round and less symmetrical than the Globe onions, for instance, ranging from somewhat flattened to top shaped. Rather mild in flavor, they are considered ideal for slicing and eating raw. They're fine for cooking, too. They range from medium to large in size.

When buying, select hard or firm onions which are dry and have small necks. They should be covered with papery cut scales and reasonably free from green sunburn spots and other blemishes.

Avoid onions with wet or very soft necks, which usually indicates immaturity or decay. Also avoid onions with thick, hollow, woody

centers in the neck, or with fresh sprouts.

**Special Power of Onions**

Onions have been attributed special powers down through the ages.

For instance, people in Bohemia and Spanish lands once fed their watch dogs, fighting cocks and ganders onions to make them fearless, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. In other European countries onions were sometimes hung in rooms to ward off evil spirits.

Even if you don't believe in the onion's magical powers, you probably believe in its culinary powers. For today's imaginative cooks uses onions to ward off blandness and monotony in her meals.

Now is an especially good time to add onions to the menu.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reports especially plentiful supplies.

This Onion and Cheese Soup gives a special lift to mealtime.

- 1 cup chopped onions
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1½ quarts milk, scalded
- Salt and pepper
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 cups grated sharp Cheddar cheese
- Paprika
- Minced chives

Saute onion in butter until soft, add flour and mix. Add milk gradually, stirring all the while, and heat to just below the boiling point. Season and stir in cheese. Serve with sprinkle of paprika and chives. Makes two quarts.

- Herb Onion Saute:
- 6 medium onions, peeled
- 6 tablespoons butter
- Salt and pepper
- Dried marjoram

Cut the peeled onions into thin slices. Melt butter in a large frying pan, add the onions and salt to taste. Cook slowly, stirring occasionally, for about 30 minutes

or until onions are golden and very tender. Stir in pepper to taste and a pinch of crumbled dried marjoram. Makes six servings.

**French Fried Onion Rings:**

- 1½ pounds onions
- 1 egg white, slightly beaten
- ½ cup milk
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- ¾ cup fine dry bread crumbs
- Fat

Peel onions under water and cut into slices about ¼ inch thick. Slash each slice to center and pull rings apart. Combine egg white and milk and dip onions into mixture. Dust with salt and pepper and roll in bread crumbs.

Place in frying basket and plunge into deep hot fat (365 degrees) and fry until browned. Drain on absorbent paper. Makes six to eight servings.

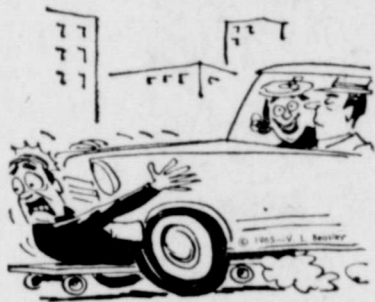

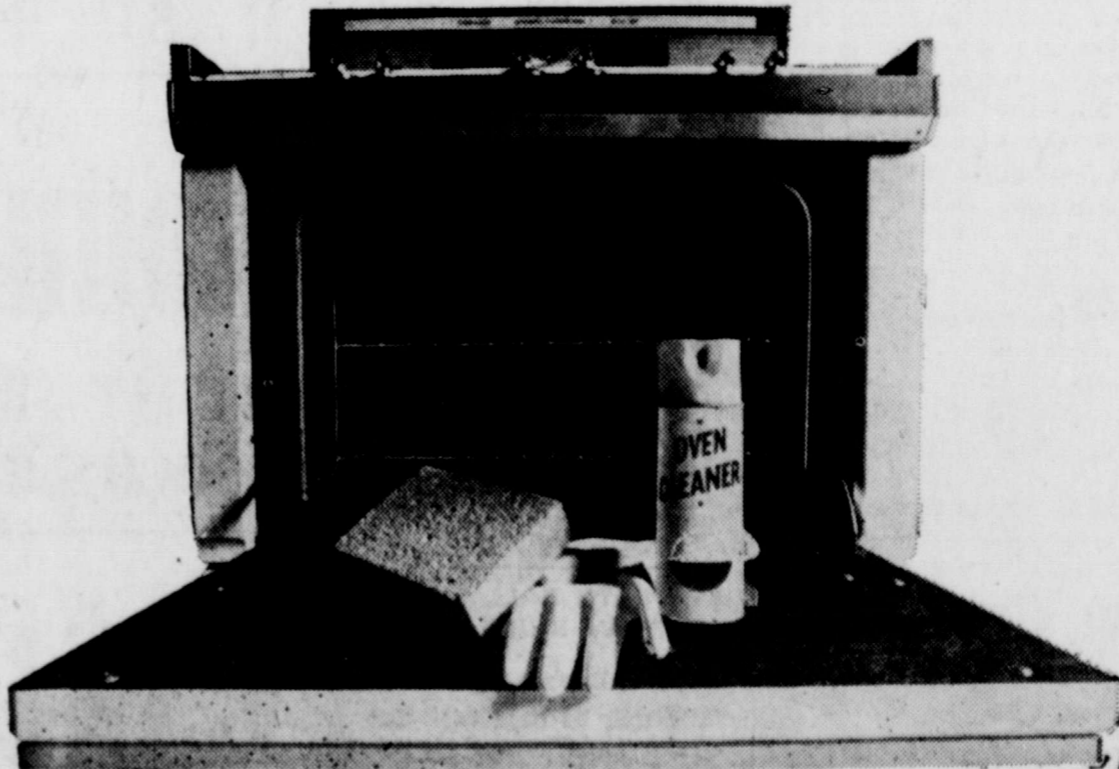
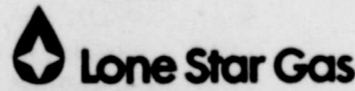
