He credited these factors as contributing to the cost leveling:

New controls over medical assistance expenses, improved management techniques, a program utilization review, more effective use of electronic data processing and a reduction of program abuse.

Of one thing they can be sure: the cost of campaigning, like everything else, is rising.

A hasty total of first primary expense-contribution dicates spending statewide candidates in contested races totaled more han \$5 million. There is no telling how many millions were spent by congressional, legislative and local and county candidates in the rush to be first at the ballot box.

For most of the candidates, the race is over, but for a few the big one is just starting.



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
