Both starch and fabric earn their keep by improving the appearance and feel of many items and restaring body lost in washing. Though both can be used on either damp or dry washable fab rics, they ares. Starch gives firm bo
substances dy or crispness while fabric fin
substances. Starch gives firm bo ish provides light body. Also, fabric finish is especially suitable for synthetics, permanent press and blends because it responds well with the lower iron temperature settings recommended for these fabrics.
These laundry aids make wash ing and ironing easier. Dirt is deposited on the coated surface
rather than embedded in the firather than embedded in the fi-
bers. Thus, soil washes out easily. Glidability is an ironing plus. But it is important to understand that sticking can result from excess moisture or improper iron temperature setting. When this hoppens starch or finish can build up on the iron and under continued heating this buildup will scorch. To avoid this situation, don't overly dampen material and do use the iron setting for the type of fabric being ironed. It
