Teaver said profits from underwriting nationally are at an alltime high, as are investment pro its of auto insurance companies. He plans to submit a "personal injury protection" proposal to the board as a substitute for no-fault auto insurance. The Teaver recommendation includes liberalized medical benefits on a no-fault basis, income replacement and life insurance instead of uninsured motorists and medical payments coverage.

Conceivably, Teaver could be out of a job before the July hearing. The Legislature convenes in special session June 14, and Teaver's appointment to the board is pending in the Senate.
