Screwworm Cases Continue to Rise

The screwworm population in Texas seems to be competing with the heat for records. Ordinarily, the hot dry period of the year brings a reduction in screwworm activity. This has not been true to date.

For the second week in a row, Coke County had more than 20 confirmed cases. A total of 22 cases were confirmed last week, coming from throughout the county. The county total for the year is up to 81 cases and changing daily. We are receiving some sterile fly drops, but complete control is not expected this year until cold weather arrives.

We received the following statement from the screwworm control center last week explaining the total screwworm picture:

"In order to release sufficient numbers of sterile flies in some areas of the southwest which are considered critical to the success of the screwworm eradication program, there are other areas where screwworms now exist that will not receive sterile fly releases. The critical areas are considered to be east and southeast Texas due to the threat posed to the southeast United States, and southern Texas where screwworms could continue to be a problem through the winter months.

The first areas of the southwest where sterile fly releases have been discontinued are the

Work began this week on the paving repair project for streets in Robert Lee and Bronte, as well as paved roads in rural areas which are maintained by the county.

Price Construction of Big Spring and Snyder was successful bidder on the project with a low bid of \$112,018.

Work on sealcoating the streets started Monday at Bronte and it is expected that Price employees will soon be working in other parts of the county, as well.

The contractor has 80 days to complete the work, but he told county commissioners that he would probably need only 40 to 50 days. In addition to sealcoating streets and roads, several blocks of new paving are included in the contract.

The paving project was financed with a \$200,000 bond issue approved by voters of the county on Feb. 26. Columbian Securities Corp. bought the bonds, which are to be retired in 10 years.

Also included in the project were four new bridges in the county, which have already been completed.

The bond vote was called when it became apparent that much of the county paving was in need of repair. The paving projects in Coke County were begun in 1954 and only piecemeal repair work has been done since that time. Consequently, voters approved the bond issue to finance the work on all the streets.

Bryan Concrete Co. of Robert Lee will supply most of the material needed for the work.

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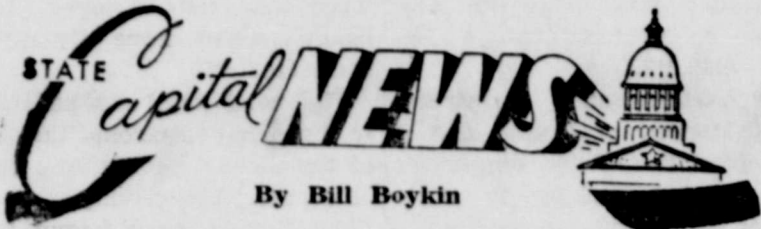
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Austin — Gov. Preston Smith is threatening a special legislative session on insurance reform. In a statewide, televised speech, he announced he will ask the Legislature to abolish the paid, three-member State Insurance Board, which he charges is company dominated.

Angered by Senate rejection July of his longtime friend, Larry Teaver, to the Board, Smith blamed the defeat on the "powerful insurance lobby."

His recommendations to "completely reorganize and reform the regulation of the insurance industry, will be delivered to a special session this year or to the next regular session in January.

Reaction to his speech, the Governor said, will determine whether he goes through with the special session call. He feels reorganization of the Board can be achieved only in a limited special session, but he isn't sure whether the public yet supports reform strongly enough to insure action.

Dallas Sen. Oscar Mauzy, a leader in the move to reject Teaver, challenged Smith to follow through and call the session immediately. He said he opposed Teaver, not because he was a consumer advocate on the Board, but for "lack of character and ability."

Smith in his tv speech announced 19 vetoes of items totaling \$6.35 million from the 1973

appropriations bill. \$200 MILLION TAX NEED SEEN — The House Revenue and Taxation Committee received advice the Legislature may be looking at a \$200 million money shortage for the next biennium when it reports next year.

James McGrew, Texas Research League director, told the Committee spending from general revenue and other key state funds will jump \$700 million over the present level next biennium. But he figured an additional \$375 to \$400 million in revenue is anticipated from present "growth" taxes, and a \$100 million federal welfare windfall is foreseeable.

The Committee also was reminded repeatedly of the likely effect of a federal court decision (now on appeal) holding the present method of financing public schools by ad valorem taxation unconstitutional. And a University of Texas official suggested property, income and sales taxes are all necessary to get "maximum equity" in the tax system.

Governor Smith strongly disagreed with McGrew's forecast and said there is a strong possibility no new taxes at all will be needed next year.

COURTS SPEAK — The Supreme Court reconsidered and agreed to hear arguments next October in a controversy in which the wife of a Wichita Falls doctor was granted a divorce settlement which included a \$40,000 community property right in his

medical practice. In other cases, the High Court concluded:

* A city can cut off water service for failure of residents to pay a garbage collection fee.

* Lower court rulings should be left standing which assessed a Houston doctor \$134,150 in damages for failure to exercise proper diligence in treating a child for a broken leg. The boy lost his leg.

* Child support payments should be lowered for a once wealthy father who lost his money on the stock market.

AG OPINIONS — Grand juries can only investigate alleged criminal offenses and report as to indictments returned, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

* House of Representatives personnel records can be disclosed "within sound discretion," although there is no law making them public records.

* A county judge (or his bondsman) who signs a minor's application for a driver's license is not liable for any subsequent negligence or misconduct of the minor in operating a car.

* School districts cannot prohibit teachers from participating in political activities.

* No vacancy exists in a justice of the peace precinct where part of land is detached and transferred to another precinct

by commissioners court action. Commissioners have authority to reduce JP salaries during their term.

* Commissioners precincts may be redistricted on the basis of either total registered voters or total population as long as the count remains substantially the same in each.

ALIENS SMUGGLED IN — About 412,000 illegal immigrants were deported from the U. S. last year, according to a Texas Good Neighbor Commission report.

Most of the group were Mexican citizens. The Commission said smuggling of the aliens into the country has become big business and that tougher criminal laws are needed to deal with exploitation of Mexican labor.

Short Snorts

Houston may be a prime area for industrial expansion from Europe and Japan, according to

Texas Industrial Commission.

Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena will serve as governor for a day Aug. 12.

University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports a big swell in non-residential construction.

Twenty million dollars in state student loan bonds were sold July 20 at an effective interest rate of 4.89 per cent.

Texas Welfare Board learned a new federal regulation may force the state to pay assistance to illegal immigrants.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen complained Texas flood victims are not getting equitable treatment from the federal government, and demanded the same helping hand as is being extended victims of Hurricane Agnes in six eastern states.

A statewide food stamp program for the needy will be put into effect this year, with stamps purchased at post office windows.

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northern two-thirds of Oklahoma and all of the Texas Panhandle and extreme northwest Texas. As additional sterile flies are needed in the critical areas, sterile fly releases will be discontinued over other areas to the north where cold weather will eventually kill out screwworms this winter."

The program administrators still need our complete cooperation to keep themselves informed on what is happening. Submitting of samples is just as important now or possibly more important than when the screwworm was under control. Every effort is being made to be in position next spring to keep the screwworm from moving northward when warm weather arrives.

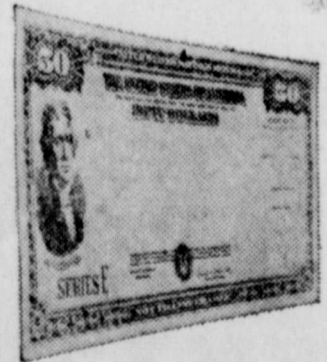

Calf Crop Highest Since 1924... Sheep and Lambs on Feed Down 18 Per Cent... Crops Making Good Progress... Wind Erosion Down from Last Year... Screw-worms Continue Out of Control... Vaccinate Horses Now for VEE...

The Texas calf crop this year is expected to be the highest since 1924, the Texas Crop and Livestock Service reports. A calf crop of 5,444,000 head is expected this year; this compares with 5,286,000 head last year.

Nationwide, the 1972 calf crop is expected to total 48,445,000. This is three per cent more than 46,974,000 head produced in 1971. The 5,444,000 calves expected in Texas this year is more than twice the number expected in second ranking Missouri. Oklahoma is the third leading state in calf production.

SHEEP and lambs on feed in

Texas as of July 1 is down 18 per cent from a year ago. Sheep and lambs on feed totaled 150,000. Marketings of fed sheep during March through June at 226,000 head were 1,000 below the same period last year.

Sheep and lambs on feed are those intended for slaughter being fed a ration of grain or other concentrates or on succulent pastures and expected within the next three months to produce a carcass that will grade good or better.

SCREWWORMS continue to infest Texas livestock as well as wildlife and domesticated animals such as dogs. Little or no relief is expected from the screwworm infestations until cold weather sets in this fall and winter.

Livestock owners are urged to continue to check their livestock regularly and to treat wounds on livestock for screwworm control. LESS pollution from wind ero-

sion has been noted this year compared to last year. Wind erosion in the Great Plains moved downward from damage totals a year ago.

Texas, with 1,145,150 acres, or about one-half of the total nationwide, reported the most wind erosion damage this season. Nationwide, land in condition to blow is reported at 3,269,060 acres this year compared to 6,693,695 acres for 1971.

CROPS are continuing to make generally good progress throughout the state. Cotton is reported to be making excellent progress on the High Plains and Low Plains due to recent rains. The crop is doing nicely in the Blacklands and East Texas except for insect problems. Harvest in the Lower Rio Grande Valley has been delayed by rains.

Corn is making good growth in most areas of the state. Grain sorghum harvest is more than 20 per cent complete. Yields have ranged from good to excellent in Blacklands and parts of south and south central Texas.

Soybeans and peanuts are making good to excellent progress. Rice harvest is making fair progress but rain has delayed harvest operations. Harvest for the state is nearing the 20 per cent completion mark.

As for commercial fruit, peach harvest continues in most areas with Elberta varieties now in production. This year's pecan crop

shows good potential with most trees having moderate to heavy nut set.

VACCINATE now for control of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE), authorities recommend.

VEE is now about 600 miles from the Texas border. Several

hundred head of horses have died from VEE in Mexico. VEE appears to be moving northward in a pattern similar to last year when the disease invaded Texas.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative."

Sec. 2. The foregoing

amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

NUMBER 13 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 82)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows:

"Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a non elective State officer may hold other non elective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

Washington — The United States Senate has again passed the Bill entitled "The Comprehensive Headstart, Child Development and Family Services Act of 1972." In December of last

year the Congress passed a similar measure as an amendment to the Economic Opportunity Act which was vetoed by the President.

"Child Development" should not be confused with "day care" which provides facilities for children of working mothers. There are provisions for these services in other legislation.

The Bill passed by the Senate and which will soon be before the House of Representatives is more than just "child care." As described by the advocates it is "an activist's program intent upon perfecting the child's early environment." Dr. Reginald Lourie, president of the Commission on the Mental Health of Children,

in testifying before the Senate Committee said "there is serious thinking among child researchers that we cannot trust the family alone to prepare young people for this new kind of world—not only are parents unnecessary, but they are too inept to rear their own children."

Well how do you do, Dr. Lourie!! — The "new kind of world" Dr. Lourie refers to must be that novelized by Huxley who foresaw test tube children and regimented adults whose pleasure was dispensed in governmentally prescribed doses.

The assumption of those who promote and support these ideas seem to be that an institution, run by an impersonalized staff, can substitute for parental love and care.

As Dr. Ernest van den Haag, New York University psychoanalyst testified, "the assumption that social science has as yet produced a tested theory of child rearing is sheer fantasy. Only a few variables have been detected and they suggest that family care should be encouraged, not replaced."

No one argues that there is not a need for remedial services for disadvantaged and neglected children. There are programs already in effect for this purpose. The "Child Development Bill" as passed by the U. S. Senate and now to be considered is much, much more. The whole concept appears to be that the Government and its agents know how to provide "healthful and stimulating development" of children. Dr. Van Den Haag further testified: "If the government has such knowledge it is a well kept secret of which the scientific community is quite unaware."

Mr. George Gilder in a recently published article had this to say: "When these havens (family and home) are eliminated, where does one go to find love and individual affirmation—to be accepted for who one is, rather than for what one does or how much money one makes? Where can one find meaning and a sense of the future—of human transcendence? Not in a day care center, I trust."

The concept of communal child rearing is alien to America and would deeply affect the traditional values found in the family unit.

The "standardizing" of children has historically been the practice of totalitarian countries. Probably Communist China has the most far reaching of any in modern times. Political and social direction are the principle motives. This sort of regimentation just does not represent the American family life which has been the mainstay of the moral fiber of our nation.

We cannot demand on one hand more academic freedom, more freedom of mobility and more freedom of speech while on the other hand abdicate to the government the responsibility for teaching these freedoms to our children. Not only is it glaringly inconsistent, but the chances are these and other principles would never be taught.

The greatest objection of all to these proposals is the simple proposition of substituting a building for a mother's image.

NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7)
 General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.

"(b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence

homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has theretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)
 General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers in-

cluding sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

 NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)
 General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in of-

ice. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
 NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)
 General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.

"(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.

"(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.

"(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants

shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them.

"(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article.

"(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.

"(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."
