My mother, Mrs. Bruce Clift, has been sending me the Obserreading. I am sending you check for a subscription for her, as I find her subscription has expired.
Some news items you may wish to report are the following - a trip mother made and my visit with her:
I teach in the Religion Department of the University of Denver. Just before coming to Robert Lee to visit mother, I attended the International Congress of Learned Societies in the Field of Religion, which met in Los Angeles, Sept. 1-5. Some 22 different societies held joint metings with about 3000 preofessors on hand from around the world.
