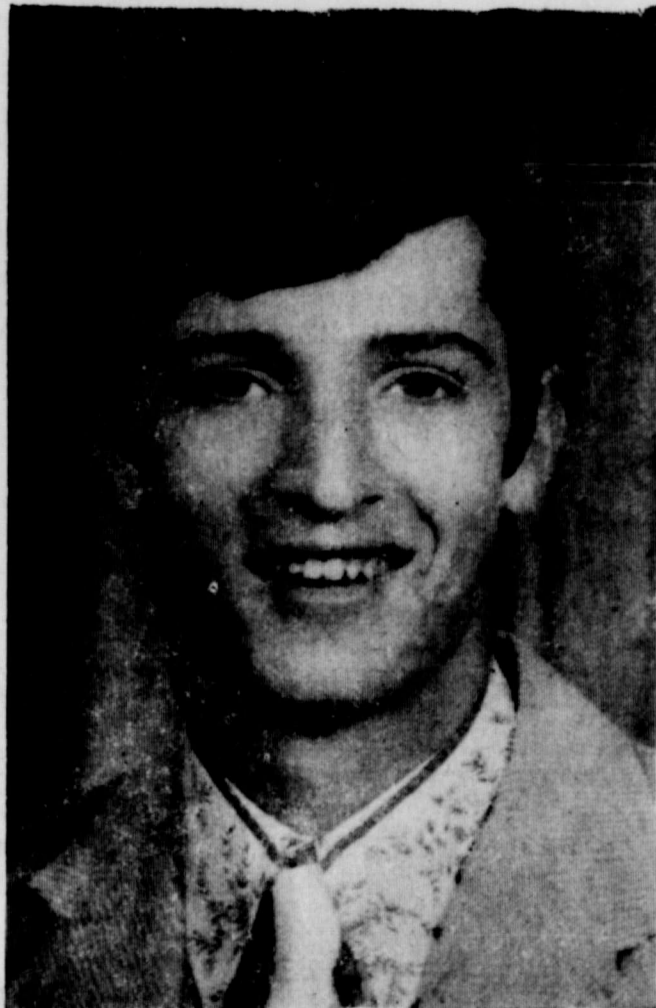

## Homecoming Big Success

Last week was a busy time for everyone in the Robert Lee area. A bonfire Wednesday night kicked off a merry time which lasted through homecoming activities Friday and a carnival Saturday night.

The eighth grade won first prize of \$10 for the largest and neatest stack of wood for the bonfire. Following were the freshman class, second and the sophomore class, third. Prizes were presented by the Student Council.

Thursday activities included a B team and junior high game with teams from Eldorado. The Dogies lost and the B team won.

### Homecoming Starts

Homecoming activities started with a parade Friday at 3 p.m. Prizes for the best floats were awarded as follows: first place, freshman class, \$10; sophomore class, second place, \$7, and the FFA Chapter, third place, \$5. The prizes were given for the best and most decorated floats.

After the parade route from the courthouse to the school was covered, a pep rally was held in the gym to get everybody in the proper frame of mind to defeat the Eldorado Eagles at 7:30 p.m.

The homecoming football game was a thriller, with Eldorado taking a 13-0 lead in the first quarter and keeping it until the fourth quarter when the Steers struck back to score two touchdowns and take a 14-13 win.

Halftime activities included crowning the Homecoming King and Queen. The honors went to Randy Flanagan and Dee Anna Percifull. Flanagan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Flanagan and has played football for four years; run track four years; basketball, two years; on the Student Council one year; member of the Steer Band four years and was named one of the 10 most valuable bandmen in his junior year; member of the Stage Band and was named Band Beau in his junior year.

### Dogies Lose As B Team Wins

The Dogies met a bigger and deeper team from Eldorado last Thursday night. They didn't overpower the Dogies but came out on the big end of the 13-0 score.

Eldorado scored in the first and fourth quarters but they had to earn it. The Dogies are still short-handed on players but not short on desire. Dennis Wolfe and Randy Prince recovered a fumble and intercepted a pass to lead the Dogie defense.

The B team was fired up as they overpowered the Eldorado B team on defense. Score was 21-14. Eldorado scored on a long pass and a good drive but that was all the B team would permit. The whole team was outstanding, so to name names would be too much. I still say you ought to see them play.

### Fall Weather Brings Rains

Heavy clouds moved into the area late last Wednesday evening, bringing more rain, drizzly weather and cold winds. The fall weather has been the general menu, lasting until late Tuesday night, when a cold front helped clear the skies. Clear skies, warm sunshine and some wind were on hand Wednesday until press time.

Those reporting rain measurements Wednesday morning, covering the general period of a week were: Silver had 1.5 inches; Sanco, 2.4; J. W. Service Sr., to the northeast, 2.6; Floyd Harmon at Edith, 4.7; Frankie Percifull, to the southeast, 2.3; and 3 inches for Robert Lee.

Coke County citizens will join the rest of the nation Tuesday in a General Election. Polls will be open in all 50 states to elect officials from the President and Vice President of the United States on down through various state, district, county and precinct offices.

Residents of the seven voting precincts of Coke County will cast their ballots at the following places:

Precinct 1, Rec Hall, Robert Lee.

Precinct 2, City Hall, Bronte.

Precinct 3, Courthouse, Robert Lee.

Precinct 4, Schoolhouse, Tenneyson.

Precinct 5, Old Santa Fe Depot, Bronte.

Precinct 8, Education Building, Silver.

Precinct 9, Community Building, Green Mountain.

Three pairs of candidates are running for the two top offices in the land: Republican incumbents Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew; Democrats George McGovern and R. Sargent Shriver; Socialist Workers are Linda Jenness and Andrew Pulley.

Republican Senator John Tower has four opponents: Democrat Barefoot Sanders; Socialist Worker Tom Leonard; and Raza Unida Flores Amaya.

Veteran Democratic Congressman O. C. Fisher is opposed by Republican Doug Harlan in the 21st District.

Four candidates seeking the office of Governor are Democrat Dolph Briscoe; Republican Hank Grover; Socialist Worker Deborah Leonard; Raza Unida Ramsey Muniz.

For Lieutenant Governor it's Democrat Bill Hobby; Socialist Worker Meyer Alewitz; and Raza Unida Alma Canales.

Democrat John Hill is opposed by Socialist Worker Thomas Kincaid for Attorney General.

For Comptroller of Public Accounts, Democrat Robert S. Calvert is opposed by Socialist Worker Anne Springer.

Longtime Democratic State Treasurer Jesse James is opposed by Republican Maurice Angly Jr. and Raza Unida Ruben Solis Jr.

For Commissioner of the General Land Office, it's Bob Armstrong, Democrat, and Howard Patrick, Socialist Worker.

Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell, Democrat, is opposed by Jim Segrest, Republican, and Fred R. Garza, Raza Unida.

Unopposed for Commissioner of Agriculture is John C. White. Also unopposed are Supreme Court and Courts of Appeals candidates, Joe Greenhill, Price Daniel, Wendell A. Odum, Sam Johnson and John C. Phillips, all Democrats.

State Senator W. E. (Pete) Snelson has no opponent. State Representative Renal B. Rosson of Snyder is opposed by Republican Rich Anderson of Big Spring.

Also unopposed are the following Democratic candidates: For Member, State Board of Education, Frank M. Pool; for District Judge, Earl W. Smith; for District Attorney, Frank C. Dickey Jr.

County Democratic candidates who are unopposed are Sheriff Melvin Childress; Tax Assessor O. B. Jacobs; County Attorney Roy Ford. Candidates for Commissioner who are also unopposed are Albert N. (Bob) Fields, Precinct 1, and Jett Hood, Precinct 3. Also unopposed are Constables Ollie Roe of Precinct 1 and Sam Sissom of Precinct 2.

### Amendments, Too

In addition to voting on candidates for office, Texans will vote on 14 amendments to the Texas Constitution.

### Services Held for Roger Pitcock, 62

Funeral services for Roger Pitcock, 62, were held Monday at 2 p.m. in First Baptist Church at Anson. The Rev. Bill Beaty of Robert Lee officiated. Burial was in Mt. Hope Cemetery under direction of Lawrence Funeral Home.

He was a retired farmer and a long time resident of Hawley. He was found dead about 9 p.m. Saturday at his residence. Justice of the Peace E. M. Spraberry ruled death by natural causes.

Mr. Pitcock was born Sept. 29, 1910, in Brown County and moved to Jones County at an early age. He grew up in the Anson area and served in the Army during World War II. He lived and farmed in the Wilson community for a number of years before retiring.

He is survived by three brothers, Teddy Earl Pitcock of Sanco, Brookie Pitcock of San Antonio and Prince Pitcock of Anson; one sister, Mrs. Willie McCarty of Anson, and several nieces and nephews.

# Steers Squeak By Eldorado Eagles, 14-13

Before a homecoming crowd the Steers gave the fans a few seizures and a lot of thrills as they outplayed the Eldorado Eagles in the final three quarters and won the game by the narrow margin of 14-13.

Spotting the Eagles a few points, the 1st quarter, the Steers looked like they were in for another District 9-A defeat but they came back the last three quarters and simply overran the Eagles at times. In the 1st quarter it was all Eagles and it was the 4th quarter before it was all Steers. It was thrilling and that's about it.

### First Quarter

Eldorado received the opening kickoff at the 5 and returned to their 37 yard line. The Steers held and they punted to the Steer 34. The Eagles held at the Steer 41, and Johnny Wolfe punted to the Eldorado 10. The Steers held at the 17 and the Eagles punted out of bounds at the Steer 47. Robert Lee fumbled on first play and the Eagles took over. They quickly made a 1st at the 29, then another at the 19. On first play the Eagle quarterback pulled a good fake and skirted the right end himself for an Eagle touchdown. The kick for extras was good and the Eagles led 7-0.

Eldorado kicked off to the Steer 5 with a return to the 24. Eldorado held at the Steer 15 on losses the Steers punted to the Eagle 25 with a return to their 41. The Eagles made a 1st at the Steer

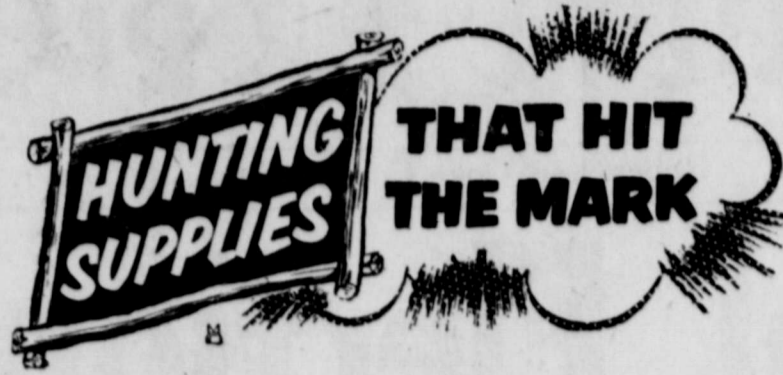
41. On second down the Eagle QB faked again and lifted a pass to his flanker back for a 40 yard pass and run TD. The extras 1st quarter ended.

The Steers returned the kick-off from the 10 to the 24. The Eagles held and Wolfe punted to the Steer 37. The Eagles were hit hard and fumbled at the Steer 41 where Jeff Eubanks recovered for Robert Lee as the 1st quarter ended.

### Second Quarter

The Steers made a 1st at the Eagle 40, but then the Eagles held and Wolfe punted into the end zone to give the Eagles the ball at the 20. The Steers held at the 26 and Eldorado punted to the Steer 49. The Steers made a 1st at the Eagle 37. Then they

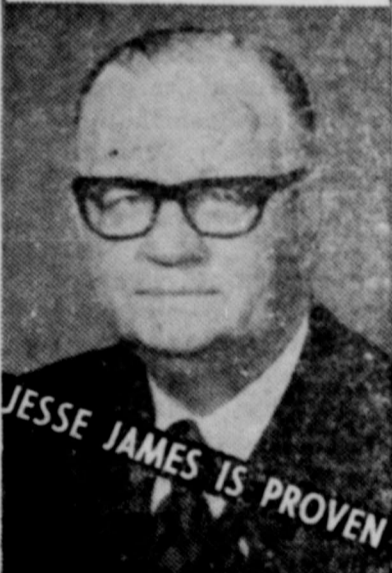

made another at the Eagle 19 on a tricky fake punt and pass, Wolfe to Flanagan. Then the drive was stopped as the Eagles intercepted a pass at their 14. The Steers gave them no yardage and they attempted a punt when Bobby Mumford came charging in and blocked it at the 4 yard line. But in four tries, believe it or not, the Steers got only 3 yards and Eldorado took over on downs at the 1. The Steers held also for 3 yards and the Eagles punted to the 50 where Rudy Abalos took it and returned to the Eagle 17. The Steers made little gain and attempted a field goal as the first half ended.

**Third Quarter**

The Steers took the kickoff at the 10 and returned to their 26. The Eagles held and Wolfe punted to the Eagle 40. Eldorado made a 1st at the Steer 45 and a penalty made it a 1st on the 20. The Steers got the ball back when Wolfe intercepted at the Steer 16.

The Steers started a good drive as they made 1st downs at their 38, the Eagle 44 and 34. A fumble gave the Eagles the ball and then another fumble was recovered by Harvey Wink at the Eagle 39. The Steers made a 1st at the 19 but that was it and Eldorado took over on downs. The Eagles made

at 1st at the 33 as the third quarter ended and the fabulous fourth began.

**Fourth Quarter**

The Steers held and the Eagles punted to the Steer 37. On 1st down old Bloody Nose Flanagan took off and Runt Rowaldt zeroed in on him for a 63 yard pass and run TD. Abalos kicked the extras and the lead was cut to 13-7.

Abalos kicked off to the 5 and the ball was returned to the 15. The Steers were fired up and held and Lyn Sockwell broke through and blocked the punt, giving the Steers the ball at the 10. Hold it! ## FACT VS. FICTION

Q. If I voted in the primary of one party, can I vote for the candidates of another party in November?

A. This question seems to concern a number of Texas voters this year. But you need not worry. Voting in a preferential primary like we had in May and June places no restrictions on your vote in the general election in November.

Remember, in the general election, there is no penalty for failure to support or vote for the candidates of the party in whose primary you voted.

Your right to vote for the men and women of your choice in a secret ballot cannot be altered. You have the right to vote for any or all, or none of the candidates of any party. This is one reason election supervisors are appointed in every precinct, to assure you the right to vote as you choose on Nov. 7, not as you did on any other day.
