Growing Papaya

I. H. Devoll Sr. of Kerrville has successfully grown several papaya trees in his garden, one of which is shown here full of the fruit. He had another tree in the late fall.

Devoll said he was given the seed two years ago by a friend who lived in the lower Rio Grande Valley. The young trees were kept in a greenhouse until a year ago when they were planted in the garden and were thriving this past summer.

The fruit, which is native to Hawaii and also grows wild in the lower Big Bend country, is very delicious and is often used in fruit salad.

Mr. and Mrs. Devoll live at 1701 First Street in Kerrville and were longtime residents of Coke County, having lived in the Sanco area before moving to the Hill Country in 1952.

-Need for judicial reorganization. The court system was termed a hodgepodge of independent operations with "nobody minding the whole store."

> Criminal Appeals affirmed a 1,000 year sentence assessed a Dallas black for raping a white girl, ovenruling a defense complaint that no blacks were on the trial jury.

The State Supreme Court affirmed a Plainview jury and Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals, finding that an insurance company owed damlages for accepting health insurance premiums from an old couple without intending to pay claims.

A Tyler man lost an appeal to the Supreme Court in a suit for \$25,000 in insurance on his wife who died of gunshot wounds nine days after she applied for coverage.

CANDIDATES SPEND MIL-LIONS - U. S. Sen. John Tower and Gov.-elect Dolph Briscoe spent a record \$5 million in their campaigns.

Tower, best financed congressional candidate in the country, reported expenditures of \$2.6 million.

Briscoe reported he spent \$2.4 million.

Tower's Democratic opponent, Barefoot Sanders, said he spend \$625,674. Briscoe's Republican opponent, State Sen. Henry Grover, reported outlays of \$1.2 million.

Tower listed contributions of \$2,597,466 and debts of \$19,371. Briscoe itemized contributions of \$1,939,896, indicating he picked up and paid for out of his own personal wealth a \$500,000 deficit. Short Snorts



Economical, vitamin rich and versatile-that's how to describe peppers.

They can be an important source of vitamin C when used in generous amounts.

Since the human body can't store this vitamin, it must be supplied daily in the diet. Raw peppers contain more vitamin C than cooked ones because some of the nutrient is lost during the

Peppers also contribute a good share of the daily vitamin A allowanice.

Since they are perishable, peppers should be used as soon as possible after bringing them home from the store. After washing them, store in a covered container in the refrigerator.

Take care to prevent bruising and to remove excessive moisture before storing.
