D. J. Walker Jr., president of Coke County Livestock Association, sponsors of the show, said, "We think the show will be one of the finest in West Texas."

The show will get underway at 9 a.m. and will be concluded in the afternoon following an auction which is scheduled to begin at 3 p.m.

Sale of Coke County oil and gas production accounted for \$18,092,664 of the county's economic output in 1971, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In producing 4,246,797 barrels of crude oil and 20.7 billion cubic feet of natural gas, the county ranked 70th in Texas. Value of its crude oil was \$14,948,725; natural gas value was \$3,143,939.

The county is among 190 Texas counties with oil and gas production value topping \$100,000, although 211 counties produce oil and gas.

"Coke County oil and gas wells made a significant contribution to Texas share of the nation's energy needs last year, but growing demand is sapping reserves in Texas faster than they can be replaced," Robert A. Buschman, association president said. "As fewer fields are discovered, due to less drilling, the continuing strong economy and tax base of many Texas counties may now depend on updating Texas oil conservation laws to encourage wider use of new recovery technology," he said.

The association study showed that Coke County farmers, ranchers, and other royalty owners received \$2,261,583 as their share of the production.

The county's wells generated \$687,641 in crude oil production taxes for state government and \$235,795 in state taxes on natural gas. Oil and gas producers spent \$1,186,284 in drilling 22 wells in the county last year, \$600,068 of which was lost in drilling 14 dry holes.

Texas Employment Commission figures showed 72 oil and gas industry employees in the county last year, with an annual payroll of \$619,004.

Processing plants also added to the county's economy. The Oil and Gas Journal lists two natural gasoline plants, with a daily combined capacity of 130 million cubic feet.

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Coke on Low Flying Routes of Dyess

The world wide commitments of the 463rd Tactical Airlift Wing (TAW) at Dyess AFB require continuous low level flying training. The highest possible degree of proficiency must be maintained and the 463rd-TAW aircrews must be current in all modes of aerial delivery. As a result the wing's C-130 Hercules aircraft are flown at low altitudes over the "big country" on a daily basis, according to officials of the big SAC base near Abilene.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 a.m. and midnight, Monday through Friday, and less frequently on weekends. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the terrain while night low level activities are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle, man made or geographic, within three miles of the prescribed route. Airspeeds will vary from 150 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are approved by Tactical Air Command. Minimum disturbances of farms, ranches and communities is the primary consideration in selecting low level routes. Towns, local airports, resorts, hatcheries and stocker pens are avoided when planning the routes and will not be overflown under any normal circumstance.

463rd officials would like to em-

phasize that, even though training must be conducted at low level and high airspeed in order to be realistic, all possible precautions are taken to prevent disruption of local agriculture and community activities.

These training flights occur over the following counties: Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Baylor, Garza, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Stephens, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Brown and Tom Green.

Although the primary mission of the 463rd TAW is a military one, its aircraft and crews are ready, able and willing to assist in a non-military role. In the past the wing has provided help in flood relief, hurricane assistance, air evacuating burn patients to the burn treatment center in San Antonio, air dropping hay to stranded cattle and pursuing aircraft hijackers.

A map showing the routes of the planes shows one which runs west of Blackwell, north of Robert Lee, then southwest to due east of Sterling City, thence south and slightly east toward San Angelo; then to a few miles north of San Angelo; thence east and slightly north to a spot northeast of Ballinger; thence north and slightly west back to Dyess.

Another route goes to a point a few miles west of Blackwell; thence south to a point west of Bronte; from there an almost U-turn is made toward a northeasterly direction back to Dyess.

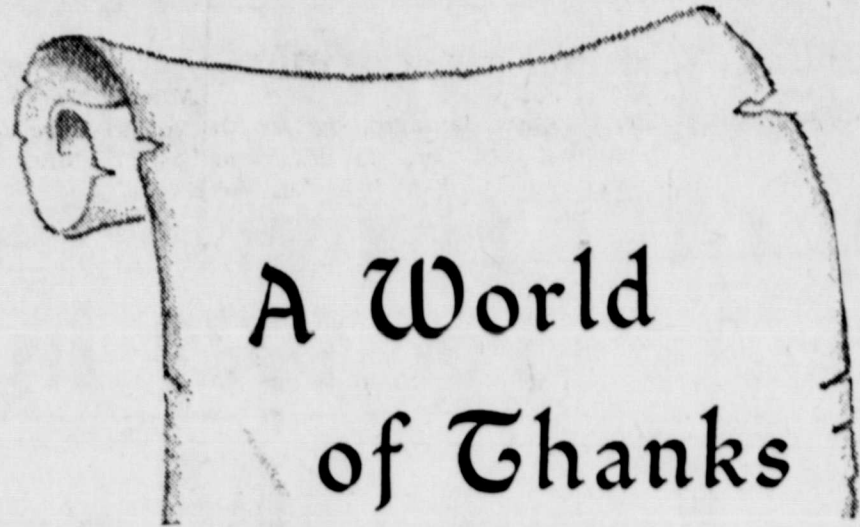

Drouth Loans Available to Farmers

Farm emergency loans by the Farmers Home Administration, a rural credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, have been authorized in Nolan and Coke Counties to help farmers recover from damage caused by a drouth that occurred during the first six months of 1972.

The agency's county supervisor, Alton R. Pyburn, announced that applications from eligible farmers will be received at the Farmers Home Administration office serving Coke County, located in the courthouse and is open on Thursdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m.

Emergency loans are made to finance crop and livestock production and meet other expenses necessary to restore a farm to its condition and level of operation prior to the disaster. Purposes for which loan funds may be used include purchase of items such as feed, seed and fertilizer, replacement of stock and equipment, and repair of farm installations damaged in the natural disaster.

Up to \$5,000 of a loan may be canceled when losses are not compensated by insurance or otherwise. Borrowers agree to repay the uncanceled portion of a loan as soon as possible, consistent with their repayment ability, at an interest rate of one percent. Loans are secured as required to protect the government's interest.

Pyburn emphasized that the emergency loan authorization announced today applies to farms

and ranches damaged by drouth beginning last Jan. 1, 1972, and ending June 19, 1972, in Nolan and Coke Counties. Applicants must show that losses for which they seek loan assistance resulted from that disaster. All applications are processed without regard to race, creed, color or national origin.

Veterans School Benefits Raised

Bob Nance, local Veterans Service Officer for Coke County, wishes to advise all veterans that the Congress recently passed a law which increases the monthly payments of educational assistance allowance for those in training under the GI Bill.

Nance said it is generally felt that the increased training allowance rates will enable many veterans either to remain in school or now consider beginning a new career. Many veterans have been forced to drop out of school because of the high cost of education. The increased rates of Veterans Administration training allowance will enable them to return to the classroom to complete their education.

In order to be eligible for GI Bill educational benefits, a veteran must have been in service for more than six months, any part of which was after Jan. 31, 1955, and he must have been discharged from service under other than dishonorable conditions.

A veteran is entitled to one and one-half months training for each month he was in service with a maximum entitlement of 36 months of training time. If he had as much as 18 months continuous active duty, he is entitled to the full 36 months training time.

A veteran with no dependents is now entitled to a monthly training allowance of \$220; with one dependent his rate is \$261; with two dependents the monthly rate is \$298. The increased rates will be retroactive to Sept. 1, 1972, for those who were in training at that time. Increases were also authorized for veterans taking on-job-training under the GI Bill.

Additional information on this and other veterans programs may be obtained at the Veterans Service Office located at City Hall in Bronte and the Courthouse in Robert Lee.
