

* Reform of the legislative process itself and state government in general, including a new code of ethics law, a revised lobby act and revision of campaign finance reporting requirements.

* Overhaul of state election laws to provide a new method of financing party primaries and possibly moving voting dates for primaries.

* Court reform.

* Redoing the legislative and congressional redistricting of 1971.
