Local merchants or others who answer inquiries from visitors to Robert Lee are requested to pass this information on to those inquiring.





Entertain at Tea

One of the nicest ways to visit with old friends or to introduce a new neighbor is still an old style tea or coffee "Klatch." For refreshments, offer a choice. Bake or buy your favorite fruit and nut bread and feature one special cake. This sponge cake, filled with jelly and dusted with confectioners sugar, is a typical English tea cake.

English Tea Cake

11/2 cups sifted flour 2 eggs, separated 34 cup sugar 1/2 cup corn oil 1/2 cup water

14 cup corn starch 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt

14 cup jam or jelly Confectioners sugar

Grease 2 (8 x 11/2-inch) layer cake pans; line with waxed. paper. Sift together into a mixing bowl, flour, sugar, corn starch, baking powder and salt. In another bowl, beat together lightly with a fork, egg yolks, corn oil and water. Stir into dry ingredients. Beat egg whites until stiff peaks form when beater is raised. Fold into flour mixture. Pour into prepared pans. Bake in 375°F. oven 25 to 30 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched with finger. Remove from pans. Cool. Sandwich layers together with jam or jelly and dust with confectioners sugar.

Makes 6 servings.






